FOREWORD

A Year Book, such as this issue, is written and compiled, as an annual report of an Executive Secretary, and provides each member school of the Association with a complete and a fairly complete history of the Association. The facts from the Year Books, all important events of the Association for the school year 1954-1955 are listed in the order in which they took place.

All member schools should have complete files of these Year Books, and by circulating these books they could have a very complete history of the Association, since as early as 1906. This does not mean that a Year Book has been printed annually. The first book was printed in 1926 and it had a summary of events extending back to the first school year held in 1906. The second volume was published in 1941, and in this volume, the years between the first and second volumes were included. Again, a volume was published in 1949 and 1952, and again in 1953. Since 1953 a Year Book has been published annually.

The SD. SAA office contains several volumes of some of these reports, but none except for the more recent issues, are available to our member schools.

The 1955 issue was the first to contain pictures of all volumes, in all events. This present book also contains pictures, and from year to year we hope to continue this practice. We sincerely hope that you like this year book and hope that this copy will be kept in your school files for a permanent record.

SDSAA HISTORY

1954-1955

1954-1955 was one of the finest years of all times as far as High School Athletics is concerned. Participation seems to continually increase. Coaching is apparently better, fan income seems to be good, and the management of athletics locally and regional schools, with their administrators, athletic directors, and coaches, have greatly improved their ways of handling crowds. Student bodies are sportsmanlike and, in general, management of athletics is growing with the improved coaching.

As far as the SDSAA is concerned, there was less trouble and unpleasant situations reported than ever before. This matter still is the biggest problem confronting High School Athletics today. We must stay all control where it belongs—in the hands of the properly authorized personnel, and we must constantly strive to keep it there. We cannot let down for one minute.

The events of the Association are here briefly mentioned in the order in which they happened and summaries of all events will be found on the following pages, along with pictures of winners in each school's event.

The first events of 1954-1955, which really belong to the second year of 1955-1956 were the Tennis and Golf Tournaments held in Brookings August 7 and 8, 1954. Participation in these events was not too satisfactory, but it seems a shame that the numbers are not greater.

The Annual Bowling Session was held in Murdo on August 17, 18, 19 and 20, and the number in attendance remained at about 215. This is very satisfactory, but it is still to be understood why all of our schools could attend.

A series of three Executive Board Meetings was conducted by your Executive Secretary and attendance was up. Several officers increased in numbers and we believe there was improvement in football officiating.

The number of football teams in the State was not as great as in 1933. There were a few more schools playing six-man football, while the eleven man game was the dominant one. The quality of football played was better.

All member schools of the SDHSAA play interscholastic basketball, so there could be no increase in the number of varsity teams. However, more schools played T-10 and consequently the total number of boys participating in interschool competition was probably up.

As in Football a series of Basketball B-10s Meetings for coaches, officials, fans and players was conducted by your Executive Secretary and again the number attending was up from 1933. A set record of 1416 was set for total number of fans ever before.

District, Region, Section and State Tournaments continued to be very popular with the fans of the State. Statistics show that attendance was probably down a little in some of the district tournaments, but the State Tournaments were completely sold out.

South Dakota enjoyed one of its best track seasons, and again there was a very definite gain in participation in the field of track. The 1934 Meet was held in Mitchell and for the first time the number of schools participating in the "A" Meet exceeded the number in the "B" Meet. 102 "B" schools with 243 boys actually took part in the "D" State Meet, while 111 "A" schools with 243 boys actually took part in the "A" Meet. New state records were made in the 220 yard dash, the high hurdles, the shot put, and the mile run.

The regular Biennial Meeting of the SDHSAA was held in Pierre, November 1, 1934. Several amendments were considered, two of which became effective July 1, 1935. Sup. E. E. Cronquist of Huron, was elected to the Board of Control succeeding Fred H. V. Junkins of Lead who did not return. A complete summary of the meeting will be found on the following pages of this Year Book.

TENNIS AND GOLF

August 3-4, 1934

The Twenty-Third Annual Golf and Tennis Tournaments were held in Brookings on August 2 and 3. L. A. Johnson and E. B. MacDonald of Brookings led off the Tennis Tournament played on the State College Tennis Courts, while L. B. Harrigan and N. A. Johnson handled the Golf Tournament played on the Brookings Country Club course.

Fourteen tennis players took part in the Singles Tournament, the same number as in 1933. John Steen of Washington High School, Brookings was the singles champion, defeating Harold MacDonald of Pierre in the final.

In the doubles tournament, Steen and his partner, Mike Ross, won, defeating the combination of Tony and Lou Jordan in the final.

This year high school golfers were on hand for the Twenty-Third Annual Golf Tournament. Eighteen holes were played on Tuesday, August 7 and courses holes on August 8. After counting up the scores, Dave Wolsey of Aberdeen was the individual winner with 130 points, while John Steen of Brookings trailing by two strokes with 131. The number playing was smaller than in 1933, but the quality was better. In 1934, eleven golfers were under 1.0, while in 1933, there were but four under 1.0.

In team competition, Aberdeen won; Wolsey shooting 116 and Olsen coming in with 173, making a total of 289. Brookings' total was but one stroke off the Aberdeen team; Steen putting in 124 and MacDonald coming in with 138, making a total of 262.

1954 COACHING SCHOOL

August 17, 18, 19, 20, 1954

Over 200 coaches attended the Annual Nutrition-Free Coaching School, and most of them declared the School a decided success. The attending coaches seemed very enthusiastic about the staff's handling the instruction on the various sports.

"Coach" Walter of Kansas University, and for help of Mission, Ohio (High School), talked a language our High school coaches understood, since Mr. Mather has at the time of the Coaching School, no college experience. He presented his material in a way that was easy to listen to and the coaches attending report very favorably on the instruction he presented.

Coach "Bud" Foster of the University of Wisconsin, a man who has been in some phase of basketball for a long time, called on his experience to present a series of highly informative and valuable sessions and observations on basketball. He presented much material for the visiting coaches to use and think about.

Jim Emmertich, Track Coach from South Dakota State College at Brookings handled three sessions on Track and Field events, and as usual, put out information which was very valuable to the track coaches. It is so simple and so scientific that his classes are always in demand and terribly complete.

Orb Papik of the Black Hills Training College handled two classes for the six-man coaches attending the school. Since Orb is one of the few college coaches in the State who has had experience coaching six-man football, his lectures were very well received.

Hugh Griggs of the Cramer Chemical Company of Garden, Kansas, did a beautiful job on his part of the School, the care of injuries. He knew his material and presented it in a way that was easily understood.

In addition to the above, a panel of sportswriters, Don Bente of Yankton, Craig Steiner of Sioux Falls, and Tom Marshall of Watertown discussed sports reporting and Public Relations.

Glenn Burgess, Deadwood, Coach of the 1951 "A" Championship Basketball Team, and Jim Marking of Rapid, Coach of the 1951 "B" Championship team revealed some of their secrets of success to the assembly group.

Our thanks to the Huron groups who made the school a success. They include Dr. J. F. Kerr, Dr. N. N. Spencer, W. W. Clouston, and Jay Long of Huron College; J. W. Alcorn, G. G. Bell, and Jack Marschak of Huron High School; and Ed Troutway and Bob Johnson who served as the Recreation Committee and represented the City of Huron.

1954 FOOTBALL RULES MEETING

225 people attended the 1954 Football Rules Meetings. This was a large increase over the number attending in 1953. Fifteen meetings were held in Huron during a series of five days. A larger number of football officials than ever before attended and the number of football officials applying for the "trial" was greater than ever before.

1954 CROSS COUNTRY RUN

October 23, 1954

Sixty-four runners from eighteen high schools took off in the Annual Cross Country Run at Deadwood on Hoko Day 1954. Weather conditions were good, the course was in excellent condition, and the course record

was really a tie, when "Doc" Ebbelen of Westing High School ran the race in 11.434, breaking about 27 records of the old record, of 1296.6. Donald Foss of Yardsen (Central) was second, followed in by Bill Paulin of Parson and Terry Leech of Hissell.

The event was managed by track coach Jim Krummholz of 3 Co College who has done this each year since the event was started.

An 800m competition Sioux Falls was first, followed by Platteau Junior School, Stanton, and Watertown.

BASKETBALL RULES MEETINGS

Starting on October 19, 1964, your Executive Secretary conducted a series of twenty Basketball Rules Meetings. Changes in rules were discussed, officiating procedures were studied and the new revised SDHSAA Form "Basketball Rule Interpretations" was shown.

Over 1300 attended the meetings. The number of officials attending exceeded all previous series of meetings.

BIENNIAL MEETING OF THE SDHSAA

The regular Biennial Meeting of the SDHSAA was held in Pierre on Thursday, November 5. A large group of delegates was present at which time several amendments were discussed. Amendments proposed included: The addition of two varietal schools; a possible change in basketball classification from two to three classes; and amendment to limit a school to three "bye" games in a two week period; to limit the number of tournaments a school could participate in to two (2) after December 1; an amendment to make a transfer student ineligible for one full semester; and to prohibit any type of Sunday contests.

Of the amendments proposed, but not adopted, the necessary two-thirds majority. The two are as follows: (1) Article VIII, Section 2 (a) of the Rules and Regulations of the SDHSAA "After December 1, member schools shall be limited to two (2) tournaments excluding the eighteen (18) games and the District, Regional, Sectional and State Tournaments." (2) Add Section 10 to Article IX to read as follows: "There shall be no interschool athletic contests of any and every kind sponsored by or participated in by member schools held on Sundays." The two amendments became effective July 1, 1967 and therefore will be in effect when school opens this fall.

Ernest E. Grimsfeld of Sturgis was elected to the Board of Control, replacing Supr. R. V. Henkins of Lead, who was not a candidate for re-election.

ACTIVITIES ASSOCIATION

After a few years of study a group of educators presented a proposed constitution which was designed to place all "High School" activities under one Association. This matter was quite thoroughly discussed prior to and during the SDHSAA Convention. The proposed constitution was voted upon by mail but was defeated. Those favoring the union of all associations cast a majority vote, but a two-thirds majority of schools voting was necessary, so the proposal failed.

BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The two SIDA Tournaments of 1955 were two of the finest ever held. Attendance was as great as it could be, both tournaments were complete "sell outs". No general admission tickets were sold in the "C" or in the "B" Tournaments in Aberdeen, and few were sold in Huron for the "B" Tournament.

Walla Walla High School won the "A" Tournament in Huron, defeating defending champion Hayden in an overtime game in the finals.

Washington High School of Sioux Falls was the winner in the "A" Tournament in Aberdeen, defeating Aberdeen in the finals.

More complete details on the Tournaments will be found on other pages in this Year Book.

Moving pictures of all held games and the championship games in each tournament were taken. These films are on file in the "Film Library," South Dakota State College, College Station, South Dakota and are available to all member schools. Please make your request to the Film Library and not to the SIDA SAA.

TRACK

May 20-21 1955

When the 49th Annual Track and Field Meet was over four new all time records were established. Records broken were the 200 yard dash, 110 yard high hurdles, the mile run, and the shot put. Athletic Director Lee Quinlan and his staff did a beautiful job of handling the meet, everything went like clockwork. The weather man cooperated beautifully.

Washington High School of Sioux Falls won the "A" Meet and Tyndall High School won the "B" Meet.

Complete summaries of the two meets will be found elsewhere in this year book, as well as pictures of all winners in both classes. In addition to the still pictures, complete colored movies were also taken. This film will also be available through the Film Library at State College. This film includes sound film.

BOARD OF CONTROL ACTIONS

1954-1955

1) Tennis and Golf Regulations were changed so that only graduates in the field of their own games could participate in the Tennis and Golf Tournaments.

2) Allowance for pairings in the Tennis Tournament were changed so that control took from the home school would be in opposite service.

3) Authorized the purchase of larger track starting with the 1956 Regional and State Track Meets.

4) Discussed the availability of meeting space in the new SIDA building if need should arise.

5) Approved the 1956 "A" Tournament to Aberdeen and the "B" Tournament to Huron.

6) Approved the American Casualty Company's plan for Athletic Insurance.

7) Retained the five percent assessment on 10's and 20's Tournaments and the ten percent assessment on Region and Section Tournaments for the Plus Tournaments.

8) Made necessary changes for 1956-57 and for 1956-57 in District and Section because of changes in conditions which changed a few schools from "D" to "A" and from "A" to "B".

(9) Refused the coaches' request for an additional relay in the Region and State Meets because of the small number of track coaches voting and because of their divided opinion on which relay should be added.

(10) Assigned the 1955 Penns and Golf Tournaments to Brookings.

(11) Assigned the 1955 State Track and Field Meet to Huron.

(12) Increased the price of a Reserial Seat Season Ticket to either the "A" or "B" State Basketball Tournaments from \$5.00 to \$6.00 and authorized all season tickets for the "C" Tournament on the Reserials only, for five dollars (\$5.00).

(13) Authorized a general sale of tickets to all the tournament only by mail.

(14) Approved expense claims for expenditures of the Cross Country Run as it was for the State Track Meet and for the Golf and Penns Tournaments.

FILMS: STATE "A" AND "B" TOURNAMENT GAMES

As in the past two years, moving pictures of all first round games and the championship game in the two tournaments were taken. These films will now, if they can, be available to our member schools through the Film Library at South Dakota State College at Brookings, South Dakota.

In the "B" Tournament, pictures of the White-Tear and White-Huron, Hayti-Sully, Gunn Valley-Waubay, and the championship game between White River and Huron are available. (Note: The White River-Hayti game is in sound.)

In the "A" Tournament, complete game pictures of the Sioux Falls-Brookings, Lead-Huron, Aberdeen-Brookings, Rapid City-Brookings, and the championship game between Sioux Falls and Aberdeen are available.

On an experimental basis, the final game between White-Tear and Huron in the "B" Tournament was taken in sound, and while the result is far from perfect, it does show that it can be done, and our plans for future tournaments to have sound films for all games are clear.

TOURNAMENT RESULTS, 1955

With the basketball season over, it is interesting to look back and review the past season and the more recent tournaments. New champions in both the "A" and "B" State Tournaments were crowned. In the "A" the title went to White River, a brand new champion in fact, a school which has been in our own previous State Tournament, and that year 1949. In the "B" Tournament, Washington High School, of Sixes Falls was the winner. While frequently in the "A" class, they have been unable to "go all the way" since 1911.

As tournaments go by, it seems that each year they are better, the more enjoyable, the spirit and attitude of the coaches and the players seems to improve. The conduct of the fans also seems better. Certainly, each Coach, Principal, and Superintendent can be proud of the conduct of their teams in the 1955 tournaments. There were no sour incidents or incidents. All of which states emphatically that our school administrators, supervisors, athletic directors, and coaches are actually doing a better job. Congratulations to all of you.

Now to get back to the matter primarily at hand, our two new champions.

White River, the new "A" Champion, had to be a good team. They came up to the elimination tournaments with a two season's record. They went through the District and Region tournaments in a convincing manner and in the State Tournament they played sound basketball. They were well-coached and retained their poise like veterans. To win the final game they had to be a good team, since they were playing the 1954 Champions and a team two of a repeat. They did not also go to Haystack, the runner-up. They were beaten by one point, in a one game game by the new Champions. Our sincere congratulations to Coach Fred Moran and his fine team.

Real good defensive play, speed, outside shooting and good rebounding strength, all entered into this fine team's victory.

In the "B" Tournament, Washington High School was the champion and, if ever he needed for strength paid off, it did so for Washington

High School. To Coach Wally Diehl and his go-getters credit. His team, a young team in experience, started very slowly this season but gathered strength as the season progressed. They were "ready" for Tournament time. They were decisively present in the Sectional Tournament but came through at the end.

In the State "A" class, they undoubtedly spent about their work. They never let up and they emerged the Champion. A sound defense, terrific drive back and scoring and fine individual play, especially rebounding, paid dividends. It is doubtful if there has been a champion in recent years more deserving. In the games they played, there was little doubt about the results, even if, of course, the games were closely contested.

Our congratulations again to Coach Wally Diehl and his fine team.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1905 and from that time until 1915, competition was purely on a district or a sectional basis, to track and debate. In 1915, with permission of the SDHSAA, Furber College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament open to all high schools in the state. This tournament was continued annually to 1917 when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has ever since the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1929, 1930 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, one "A" and "B" and a plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 12 districts and the 12 winners, winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 12 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for four years, and in the fall of 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan, High Schools with an enrollment of 100 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Higher enrollment the top schools in the R.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers for the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1931.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" setup including taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the R.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1931 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1950 the present plan was started whereby the 50 largest high schools by enrollment were made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" setup is that while commitments by challenge the teams were entering on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

Since the start in 1930, there has been a change in the "B" set-up, this class continuing with 12 districts and eight regions with the district region champions qualifying for the State "B" Tournament.

"A" and "B" Tournaments in 1953, 1959, 1965 and in 1977 have proven very successful and will be continued.

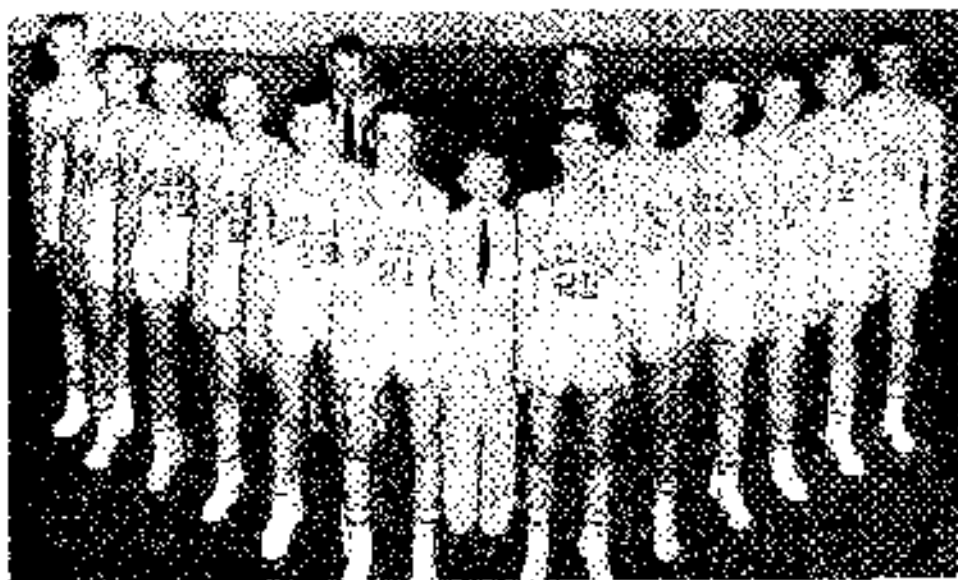

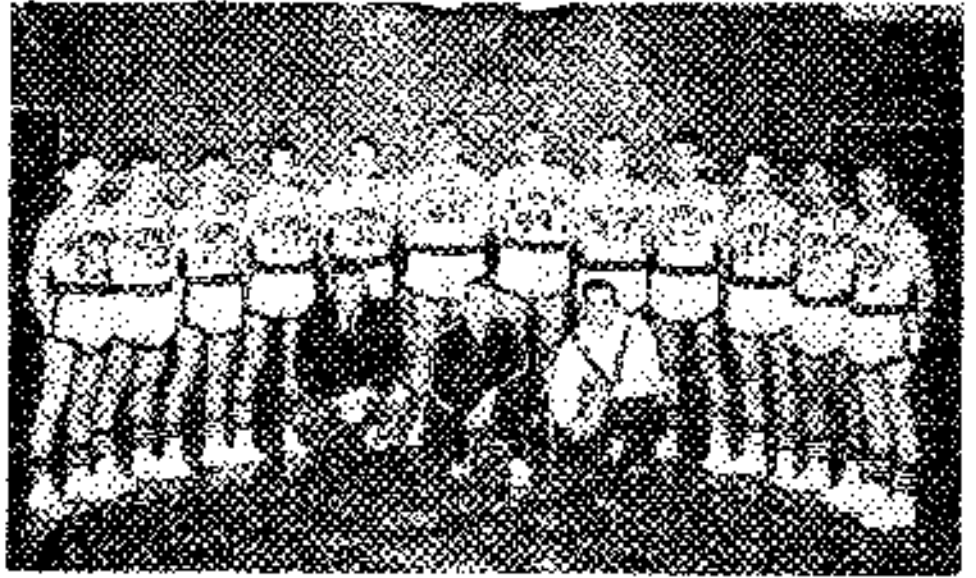

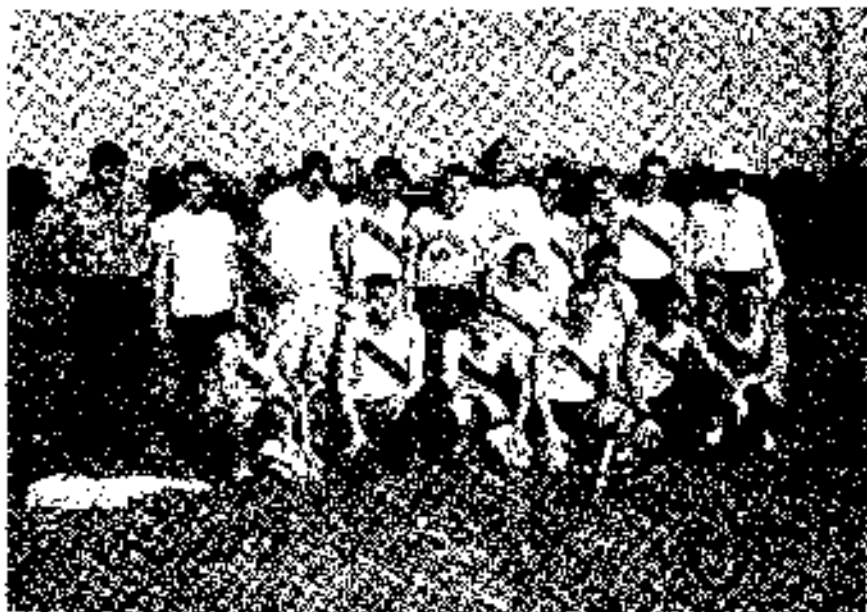

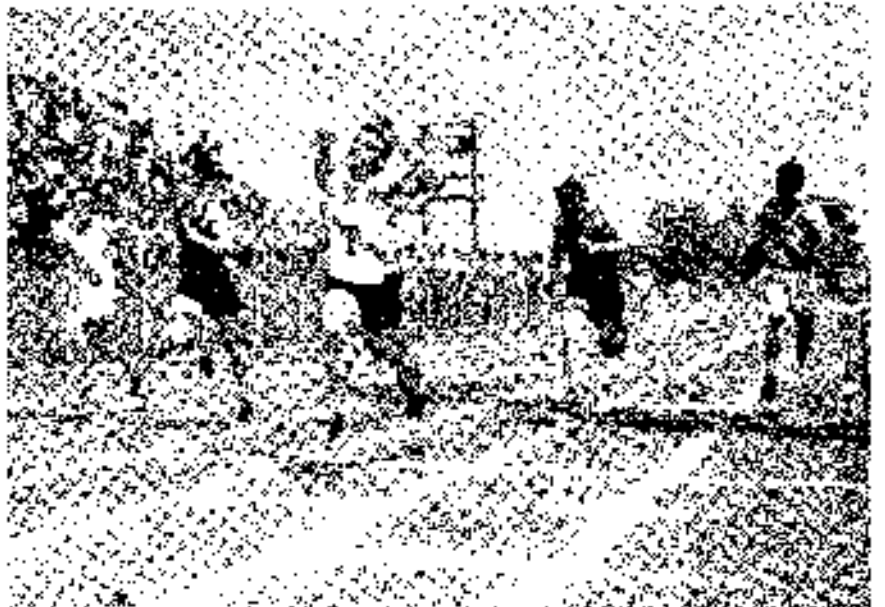
