FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and Girls and provides a complete record of events in the school year of 1957-58. All state-wide events, in which championships are determined, are summarized and listed in the order they occurred.

By using year books, member schools could have a complete summary of the Association's work. This was formed in December of 1905. This does not mean that a Year Book has been published each year since 1905. The first Year Book was published in 1907 and contained a summary of events from the beginning through the school year of 1906-07. The second such publication was in 1934, the third in 1960, again in 1912 and in 1916. Since 1960 the Year Book has been an Annual Publication.

Names of teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won state-wide events are shown. There have been a few omissions, because of photographic failures, and this year is no exception, we have missed a few individuals. Their names, of course, will appear in the summaries.

We sincerely hope each school has been and will continue to file their copies of the Year Book so a rather complete history of the Association will be on file in each member school.

Starting July 1, 1937, R. M. Walseth was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association with office space in the Department of Public Instruction, in the Statehouse in Pierre. Because of expansion in the Department of Public Instruction and lack of space the office was moved to the St. Charles Hotel in January of 1946, where it remained until November 1, 1957, when it was moved to permanent quarters in the SDEA Building at 415 E. Capitol Avenue in Pierre. The new building is pictured on Page 3 of this Year Book.

RESUME FOR 1957-58

Following you will find a brief review of the events and happenings of the SDHSAA for the school year of 1957-58. While state-wide events will be mentioned here, a complete summary of each of these events, in the order in which they occurred, will be given.

1957-58 was a pleasant year, thanks to the coaches, Superintendents, and Principals, who have charge of the athletic activities in SDHSAA Member Schools. There has been a wonderful spirit, fine cooperation and serious effort to better not only athletic teams and individuals, but to better local management of athletic programs. We feel that, because of the efforts of those in charge of athletics in our member schools, our athletic program is second to none in the nation.

More football was played in 1957-58 than ever before. There was a drop in the number of schools participating in 6-man football but this was more than offset by the number of teams playing 8-man football. The number of schools playing 11-man football remained quite constant.

Basketball enjoyed one of its best seasons. Because a few schools closed, the total number of varsity teams etc. decreased, but the numbers playing varsity basketball, "B" team, inter-mural, etc. greatly increased.

The Cross Country Run and the Tennis and Golf Tournaments, showed decided increases in number of participants in the last school year.

Track continued to gain, there were more track events than ever. More schools sent teams to the Region Meets and 152 schools sent contestants to the State Meets.

In August, the annual Coaching School was held in Rapid City, attendance was excellent, however, there should be more of our coaches in attendance.

A series of Football Rules Meetings was again held with approximately 1200 officials, coaches, players and fans attending. Howard Conroy of Vermillion, handled 2 of the 16 meetings, again, making it possible to get 12 of the meetings completed before the first football game. Mr. Conroy will again handle 6 of the 1958 meetings with your Executive Secretary taking 10 meetings.

Twenty Basketball Rules Meetings were conducted by your Executive Secretary in twenty different locations. These meetings started the 15th of October and ended on November 20th. The attendance at the meetings was very gratifying. Approximately 500 attended and most importantly, most non-officiating basketball in the state attended one or more of these meetings.

There was no meeting of the SDHSAA during 1957-58, since according to the Rules and Regulations of the SDHSAA, meetings are held in alternate years during the SDHA Convention. Because there was no meeting, no amendments were voted upon. In the alternate years, candidates for Board of Control positions are nominated by petition. The only nominating petition filed was for J. W. Evans of Kadoka, he secured himself as a member of the Board of Control. Since there was no opposition, Mr. Evans was declared elected to a regular five (5) year term starting July 1, 1958.

Basketball interest in the state remained very high, the 1958 "B" District tournaments drew more people than in 1957 even though, however, there was a decrease in the numbers attending "B" Region Tournaments and "A" Section Tournaments. Part of this decrease may be traced directly to bad weather and roads in some sections of the state.

Stock Tournament interest was good as shown by the crowds at the "A" and "B" Tournaments. For the "B" Tournament, money ticket was gone a month before the tournament opened and about \$4700.00 was re-

funded for "B" Tournament tickets. The "A" Tournament was also a sell-out, although there were tickets remaining at the start of the tournament.

As previously stated, Track really "boomed" this year! The large relay carnivals, had more entries than ever before and in addition there were far more smaller meets in the various sections of the state. The "A" and "B" Region Meets, probably had more entries than ever before.

The State Meet was held under ideal conditions and the contestants responded. While few records were set, all races were close and more boys than ever took part — 556 boys from 152 schools actually participated in the 1958 State Meet.

For the second year, the SDHSAA Tennis and Golf Tournaments were held at the same time as the State Track Meet, and while it may be argued that the spring is not the proper time for these tournaments, never the less there were more contestants than ever before, even exceeding the number to participate in 1957. There were 57 golfers from 22 different schools and 28 tennis players from 10 schools.

EVENTS OF 1957-58

1957 Coaching School

Aug. 19-20-21-22

The 1957 Coaching School, held on the Campus of S.D., Schools of Mines and Technology in Rapid City, again attracted over 200 coaches. These coaches were amply rewarded for their attendance because of the instruction they received from a fine staff of experts in their fields. Football, three varieties, baseball, track and training were offered at the school.

Dallas Ward, head Football Coach at the University of Colorado, whose team won the Jan. 1, 1957 Orange Bowl game in Miami, handled all sessions on 11-man football. Mr. Ward did an excellent job of teaching his style of football. His methods were sound, he emphasized defense and probably left as many sound football ideas with the coaches as any previous instructor had done. We were highly pleased with Mr. Ward's work.

Henry P. "Hank" Iba, a veteran basketball coach from Oklahoma Aggies (now Oklahoma State University) really stole the show. He was as enthusiastic as a youngster, a great believer in his style of play, a great fundamentalist and a master of defense and ball control. He gave basketball coaches sound advice and left nothing out.

No two coaches in our major sports contributed more to the school and to the coaches than did Mr. Iba and Mr. Ward. We were fortunate to secure these two fine men.

Jim Emmerich, of S. D. State College, was again the instructor in Track. Since Mr. Emmerich had been one of the trainers in the 1956 Olympics he was able to give first hand information on the Olympic Games, plus his usual fine instruction on how to coach track. Again, we were very happy to have Mr. Emmerich at the school.

Training, care of injuries and prevention of injuries was very capably handled by Lawrence "Porky" Morgan of Kansas State College of Manhattan, Kansas. Mr. Morgan is an able, experienced trainer and knew how to present his subject to the assembled coaches. We deeply appreciate Mr. Morgan's part in the school. He was always available, before and after his scheduled appearances, to give individual help.

Six and Eight Man Football always creates a problem, since there seems to be nothing done on the college level in these fine sports. It is

extremely difficult to find instructors for the school. However, a round table discussion period was set up by each of these sports with Giv Turner of New Underwood and Ken Hauge of Newell both coaches with outstanding records in Rugby football, to lead the discussion in that sport. Bruce Carlson of Vidor and George Harger of Menard both with outstanding records in Gman football handled the Six Man session.

These men were well prepared and did excellent work. Much favorable comment has since been received on these men and their way of handling the two sessions.

One of the honors or penalties for winning the "A" and "B" State Basketball Championships for a good many years has been that the winning coaches have had to appear on the Summer Coaching School Program. Lou Gracie of Bellvue, the coach of the "A" Champion and Frank Phillips of Uresburg, the coach of the "B" Champion both appeared and did excellent jobs in presenting their "secrets" to the coaches. We were happy to have Lou and Frank on the program!

As stated before, the school was held on the campus of the S. D. school of Mines and Technology and we are certainly indebted to Dr. Parlin, President, Trevor Thomas, Business Manager and to Dr. J. D. Gossett, Athletic Director and his staff for their efforts to make the School a success. In addition, W. N. Cobb, Athletic Director at the High School and his staff aided greatly in the successful management of the school and in entertaining the coaches attending.

1957 Football Rules Meetings

Since 1938 Football Rules Meetings have been held in from 12 to 20 locations in the state and the 1957 Meetings were the best attended, over 1300 attended the meetings and practically all officials who work football were at one or more of the meetings. Since the football season is so short, and since it is next to impossible to start the meetings earlier than the opening of football practice, one must complete all meetings and get through before the time of fourth game of the season, because of this for the past two years we have used two men and have completed most of the meetings before the 1st game of the season. Officials, especially have appreciated that we believe that the meetings have helped officials.

1957 Cross Country Run

Oct. 18, 1957

Under good weather conditions, 58 runners from 16 different High Schools participated in the 12th Annual Cross Country Run, held in Brookings on the State College Golf Course. The number of entries exceeded the number running in 1956 by 20 with four more schools sending runners.

Verdon Birdsall of the Flandreau Indian School won the race. He was followed by Wm. Lone Bear, a teammate, following Lone Bear was Verle Johnson of Summit. Birdsall's time over the two and one quarter mile course was a good time of 14:05.

The Flandreau Indian High School, with their first three runners finishing first, second and sixth, took team honors with 3 points. Wagon High School of Sioux Falls was second with 17 points in team totals with Summit finishing third with 32 points.

1957 Basketball Rules Meetings

Over 1600 officials, coaches, players and fans, attended the 20 Basketball Rules Meetings, held in 20 different locations. Meetings started October 14 with the final meeting on November 25, 1957.

Rule changes, a review of old rules and officiating procedures were discussed. We believe that the meetings have helped coaches and officials. While the conductor of the meetings, your Executive Secretary, may not know any more or as much about basketball rules than the coaches and officials, he does have access to information, not commonly available to the average coach and official.

National Alliance Football Rules Committee Meeting

Please note the change in the name of the Football Rules Committee. It was formerly the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations Football Rules Committee. A year ago the National Junior College Athletic Association officially adopted the High School Football Rules as their official Code and had representatives at the Rules Committee Meeting and participated in the discussion and actually voted on the various proposals.

At the 1958 Meeting of the Football Rules Committee in Lexington, Kentucky on January 6 and 7 the NAIA (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics) had representatives at the meeting, and since the Football Committee Meeting, they have officially adopted what was formerly the High School Football Code. The name of the National Federation Code has since been changed to the National Alliance Code. So starting with the 1958 season, practically all football will be played under the National Alliance Code.

We understand that in South Dakota only S. D. State, S. D. University and Augustana College will use the National Collegiate Code.

We in High Schools need not fear that the High Schools will lose control of the Rules making body, since forty two of the states, plus Hawaii and several High School Associations in Canada will continue to have a vote of at least 42 to a probable maximum of 6 (3 each NJCAA and NAIA).

Rule changes for 1958 will be thoroughly discussed at the 1958 Football Rules Meetings.

Basketball Tournaments

The 1958 State "A" and "B" Basketball Tournaments featured good basketball, two fine championship teams, Canistota and Huron, wonderful tournament management, capacity crowds, and excellent displays of sportsmanship. Really, each year, we think that the last tournament could not be excelled, but the 1958 affairs were even better. Our state should be proud of the way our teams and their coaches react under the tensions and strain and stress of State Tournament play. It is truly remarkable.

The Aberdeen and Huron managements are continually looking for ways to better entertain the tournaments and they always come up with innovations which add to spectator comfort and ease of handling the large crowds, better handling of teams.

As stated above, Canistota was the new "B" Champion and Huron the new "A" Champion. Canistota defeated a fine Corona team in the finals and Huron eliminated Watertown in the Championship game. Complete details on the State Tournaments will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

National Basketball Rules Committee

For the fourth year, your Executive Secretary, was appointed by the National Federation's Executive Committee as one of ten four representative from the High Schools on the National Basketball Committee of the United States and Canada. Because of this appointment he was able to attend the meeting of this group in Louisville, Kentucky, on March 23 and 24, 1958. It also offered an opportunity to see the NCAA Basketball Tournament Finals, which is quite an experience.

A few changes were made in the Basketball Rules for 1958-59, these changes were announced last spring and will be thoroughly discussed at all 1958 Basketball Rules Meetings.

1958 State Track Meet

The fifty-first Annual Track and Field Meet is now history, weather was almost dead and the meet was one of the best in a long line of fine Track Meets. Records were broken in field events, and the meet was close all the way. Each single event was a contest, the quality of the contestants was excellent.

Washington High School of Sioux Falls was the winner of the "A" event, edging out Watertown. Watertown was a rather surprise winner of the "B" event, edging Burke by 1/8 of a point.

Athletic Director, Clyde Cohen, of the Huron High School had the Meet well organized. The two day affair ran off with a minimum thanks to Mr. Cohen and his staff.

1958 Golf and Tennis Tournaments

If the number of contests can be used as a basis for determining when the SDHSAA Golf and Tennis Tournaments should be held, then our experience shows that the time of the State Track Meet is the proper time. For the second year the tournaments were held in conjunction with the State Track Meet, and as previously stated 57 golfers from 22 schools took part in the Golf Tournament and 28 boys from 10 schools participated in Tennis.

Mike Cutler of Watertown with 111 was the individual Champion in Golf and he was followed by Pete Gribbin, also of Watertown. John Van DeWalle of Sioux Falls and Charles Wolsey of Aberdeen, each shooting a 148 and being the runner-up to one.

Mike Purier and Pete Gribbin of Watertown made up the winning team with 264 and in this runner-up spot was the Aberdeen team of Charles Wolsey and John Sampson.

In the singles Tennis Tournament, Dave Weber of Sioux Falls was the Champion, defeating Jerry Jaak of Mitchell in the final. In the Doubles Tournament, the Washington High School team of Dave Weber and Jerry Linn, defeated the runner-up team of Tom Parvater and Tom Martin.

The Tennis Tournament was played on the Winner Park Course in Huron and the Golf Tournament at the Huron Country Club and on the Meadow Brook Course. Bob Saffin, city recreation director in Huron, ably assisted the Tennis Tournaments and "Hobe" Richards, Golf Pro at the Country Club ran off the Golf Tournaments. Both did outstanding jobs and we are deeply appreciative of their efforts.

**National Federation of State High School Athletic
Associations, Annual Meeting, Santa Barbara, Cal.
June 22-26, 1958**

Board of Control Member, D. W. Evans of Kadoka, and Executive Secretary, R. M. Walseth were official delegates to the National Federation's Annual Meeting. The meeting was well attended and many common problems were discussed. Exerpts from the Minutes of this Meeting will be furnished member schools from time to time during the year. Your Executive Secretary made a report at the Convention on "The New Basketball Rule Changes for 1958-59."

Mr. Evans was called home on the last day of the meeting by the death of his father.

Board of Control Actions

The Board of Control had three regular meeting during 1957-1958. The first meeting was at Pierre at the SDHSAA Headquarters in the SDEA Building on December 4, 1957. The second meeting was in Aberdeen at C. H. Holgate's residence during the "B" State Tournament on March 5, 1958 and the third meeting was again held in Pierre on June 5, 1958 in the SDHSAA Headquarters.

Officers of the Board were elected — Mr. Grunwald of Sturgis was named Chairman, Mr. Quintal of Mitchell, Vice-Chairman, and Mr. Holgate of Aberdeen, Treasurer.

Ruled on several eligibility cases.

Studied better methods for distributing tournament tickets especially student tickets.

Decided to eliminate track from the summer coaching school program and hold a spring Track Clinic.

For 1958 Meets used Michigan Plan to try to speed up the pole vault event and for 1959 will continue the use of the Michigan Plan plus higher starting heights in the 1959 State Meet.

Decided to run first runners in the mile and medley relay their entire distance in lanes with proper staggered starts in the State Meet.

Reviewed athletic insurance plans from American Casualty Company and from Mutual of Omaha and approved these plans for use in SDHSAA member schools.

Discussed the growth of wrestling as an interscholastic sport.

Adopted a budget for 1958-59.

Since Mr. E. B. Coacher, formerly Superintendent of Schools at Chamberlain and a member of the Board of Control, left public school work and therefore was no longer eligible for membership, a vacancy on the Board has been created. However, since the next election will be in early November, decided not to appoint anyone to the vacancy but to leave filling the vacancy with the member schools.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1909 and from that time until 1912, competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the SDHSAA, Huron College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament open to all high schools

in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1939, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1935 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this set-up the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1936.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" set-up, including, taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1936 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1951 the present plan was started whereby the 32 largest high schools, by enrollments, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" set-up is that, while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

Since the start in 1936, there has been little change in the "B" set-up, this class continuing with 32 districts and eight regions with the eight region champions qualifying for the State "B" Tournament.

"A" and "B" Tournaments in 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1957, and in 1958 have proven very satisfactory and will continue.

THE TOURNAMENTS OF 1958

History was again made, in the 1958 State "A" and "B" Basketball Tournaments, and two new champions were crowned at the conclusion of the events. Canistota is the new Class "B" Champion and Huron is the Class "A" Champion. For Canistota the championship is their first and for Huron, it is the first win since 1945. Huron has won the championship before, in 1917, 1927 and 1930, before the "A" and "B" division was made and as an "A" school they won State Championships in 1936, 1937, 1945 and now in 1958. Therefore the Huron High School is not without previous championships, but each time the thrill seems even greater.

Canistota, while not the favored team in the "B" State Tournament by the pre-tournament "experts," was conceded a chance, because of the strong schedule they had played, because of last years tournament experience and because of the number of veterans from the 1957 tourna-

most team. Attention on Canisota became more apparent after their comparatively easy conquest of Deadwood, one of the pre-tournament favorites, in the first round. In the quarter-finals they were forced right down to the final gun by a fine Fairfax team and in the final they were forced to go to overtime critical to the end of regular playing time with a very good Corona team. In fact, with 2 minutes and 1 second remaining in regular playing time Canisota trailed by 2 points during the remaining time Corona scored seven points, but six Canisota, by retaining their poise, scored enough points to tie the game with 2 seconds to go, a truly sensational performance. With the excitement built up in the last two minutes, Canisota was able to continue on and win in the overtime period.

Huron, our new "A" Champion, defied tradition and the favored runner's role and went on to win in tournament fashion. In 1958 "A" Crown. The Huron "Tigers" entered the tournament untested during the week. However, history shows that Huron, the previous Conference Champion, and an undefeated team, survive the rugged competition in the "A" Tournament. Huron was more than equal to it.

The Huron team was a very fine team. They were not big as present day basketball teams go, but they had good size, had excellent balance, with outstanding boys in each position. While their individual personnel on this team was exceptional, their success must be attributed to their team play. When the team is described as a fine team, the description fits perfectly.

Too much credit cannot be given to the two coaches of our new Champions, Doug Cowman of Canisota and Carol Hoyer of Huron. Both of these young men have taught their teams well. They were sound both offensively and defensively, they were well trained in fundamentals, the players showed absolute confidence in the way they were instructed to play and best of all these two young men are a decided credit to their profession and both should go far with future teams. It is a pleasure and a privilege to know these coaches.

Congratulations to Canisota and Huron for the championship. Both teams are truly "Champions."

On other pages of this "Tournament Bulletin" you will find results of District, Region, Section and State Tournaments as well as including financial reports. These reports show strong and healthy interest in basketball and we believe the interest will continue and it will remain the national and regional sport if we, the school men in charge of High School Athletics, fight to keep the game on the high plane of sportsmanship of now times.

There must be constant pressure on our teams, our coaches, our student bodies and upon our adult fans, so that they are constantly kept aware of the fact that inter-school basketball, including tournaments, is but a part of our secondary school program and that it must be conducted that way, with dignity and honor. There is much evidence to show that some of our college basketball is not that way and our high schools should set the example and not be led by those groups apparently more advanced than we are.

From reports on other District, Region and Section Tournaments, these events must have been pleasant affairs. We know the State Tournament a very fine event, and we all know that every game does produce a winner and a loser, along with the disappointments and heartaches. It is still true that these problems are constantly being faced in real life and only game value is a result of these "setbacks". The players surely learn to "take it" and most of our spectators must also learn.

Tournament management in all levels of tournaments has greatly improved, which naturally makes for better tournaments. Management of the State Tournaments in Huron and Aberdeen is better each year, new ideas are used and these are passed on to the other tournaments.

We feel, each year, the tournaments just concluded are the best ever, but knowing the ingenuity and creativeness of those in charge, we know future tournaments will be even better.

Again our congratulations to Huron and Canistota and to their fine teams and coaches, however we cannot close with out paying homage to those fine teams defeated along the way. We had many fine teams, teams which in other years, might have been the champions but there can be but one winner in each class and the two are for 1958 Canistota and Huron'

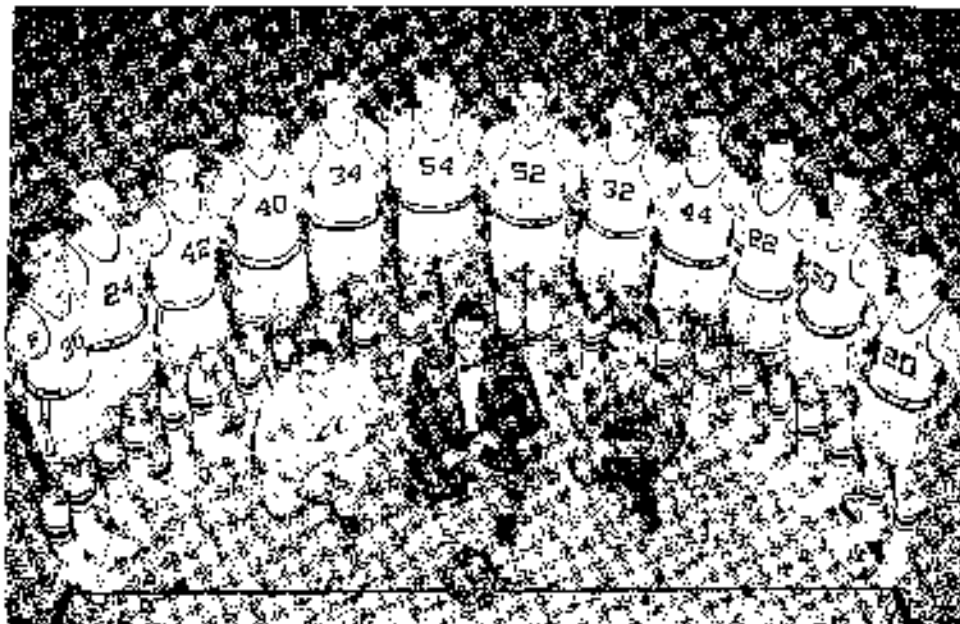

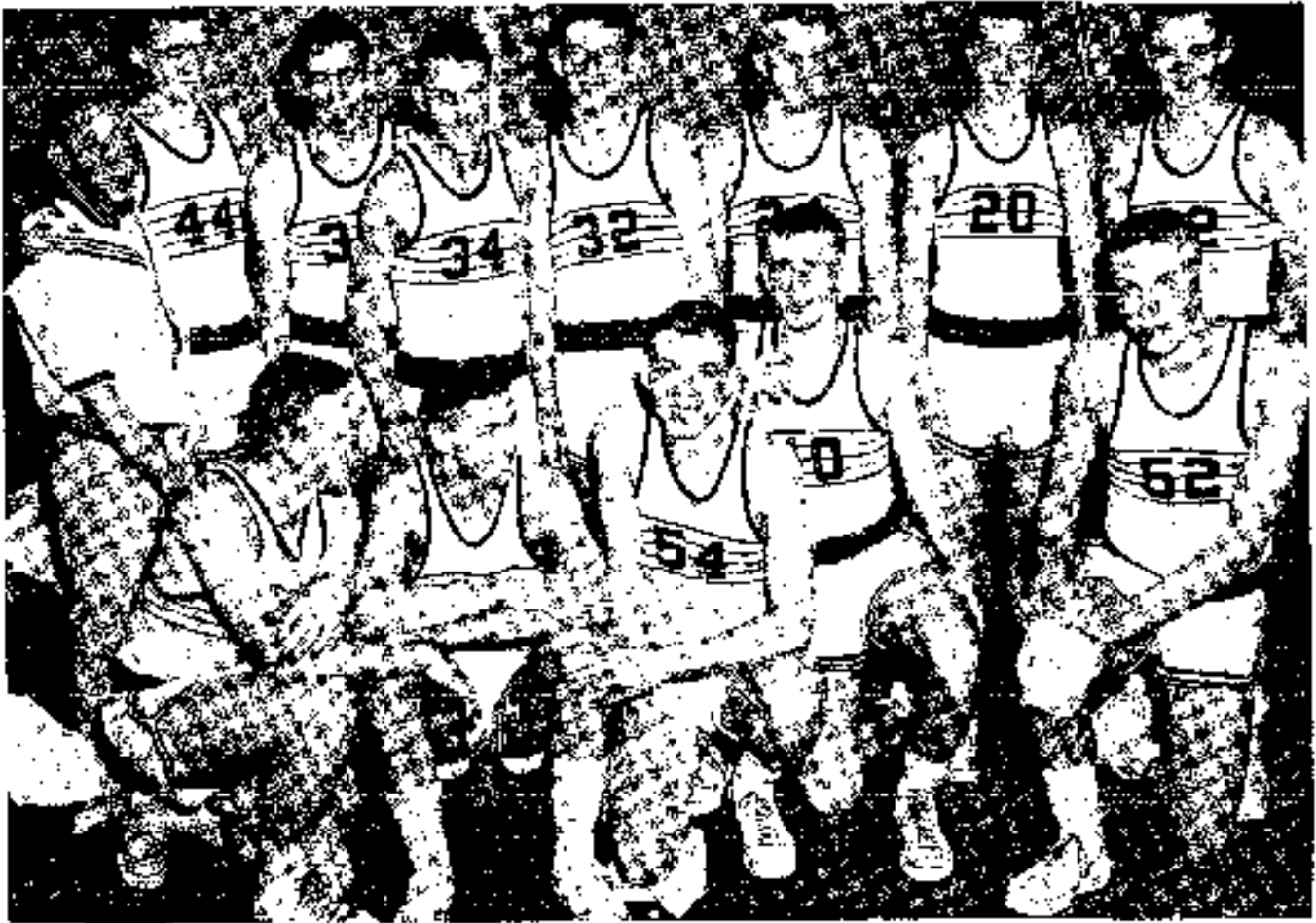

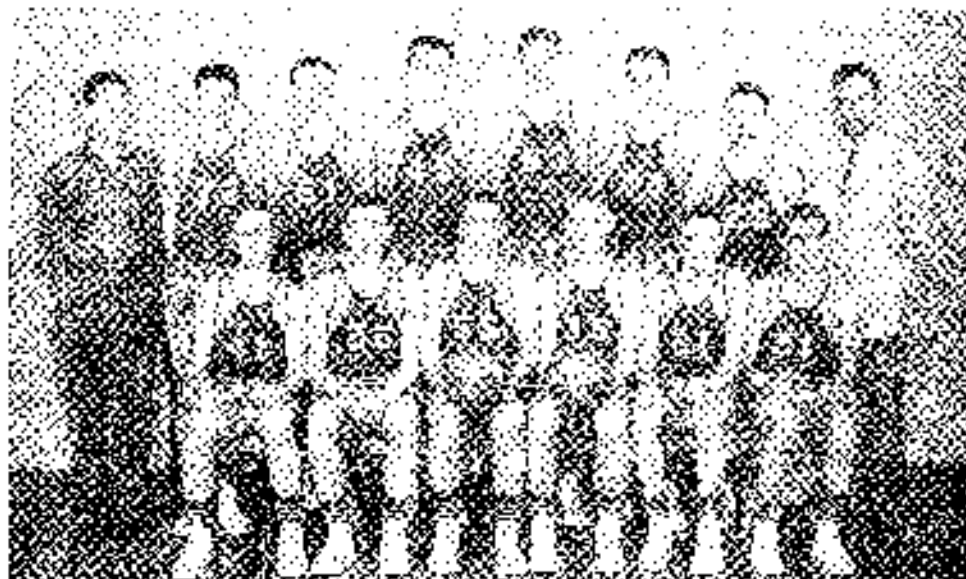
