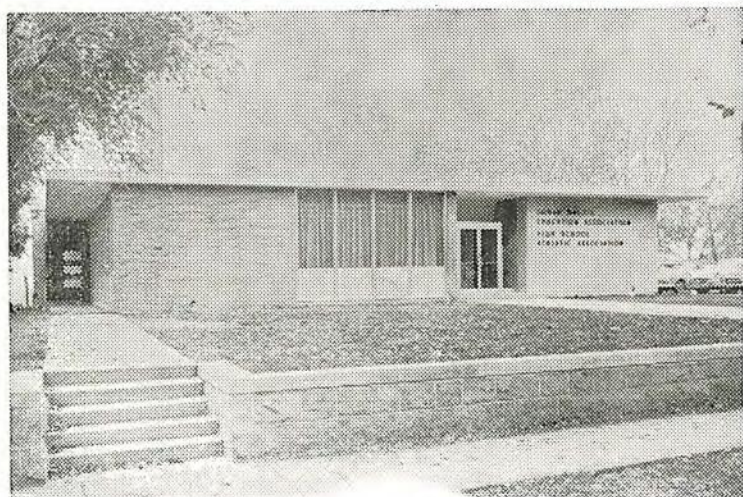

FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and does provide a complete review of events in the school year of 1958-1959. All state-wide events in which championships are determined are summarized and listed in the order they occurred.

By saving year books, member schools could have a complete summary of the Association since it was formed in December 1905. This does not mean that a Year Book has been published each year since 1905. The first Year Book was published in 1927 and contained a summary of events from the beginning through the school year of 1926-27. The second such publication was in 1934, the third in 1940, again in 1942 and in 1946. Since 1946 the Year Book has been an annual publication.

Pictures of teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won state-wide events are shown. There have been a few missed, because of photographic failures, and this year is no exception, we have missed a few individuals. Their names, of course, will appear in the summaries.

We sincerely hope each school has been and will continue to file their copies of the Year Book so a rather complete history of the Association will be on file in each member school.

Starting July 1, 1937, R M. Walseth was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association with office space in the Department of Public Instruction, in the Statehouse in Pierre. Because of expansion in the Department of Public Instruction and lack of space the office was moved to the St. Charles Hotel in January of 1946, where it remained until November 1, 1957, when it was moved to permanent quarters in the SDEA Building at 415 E. Capitol Avenue in Pierre. The new building is pictured on Page 3 of this Year Book.

REVIEW OF SDHSAA EVENTS—1958-59

Following you will find a short review of the events and happenings of the SDHSAA for the school year of 1958-1959. All state wide events are briefly mentioned here, and complete summaries may be found on the following pages, in the order in which they took place.

1958-1959 was a good year, events were outstanding, the cooperation received from coaches, principals, and superintendents was excellent. Rivalries have been intense, but feelings have been good. There has been a wonderful spirit exhibited, between athletic teams, the school administrators and all who have a part in our fine inter-school athletic programs. Local management of athletic programs, tournament and meet management has improved and we feel that our state-wide athletic program is second to none in the nation.

Football in 1958 increased. There was a slight gain in the number of eleven man football teams. The number of teams playing 6-man football decreased but a large gain was shown in 8-man football. Therefore the numbers participating in football has shown a sizeable gain.

More schools and more runners than ever before participated in Cross Country running, not only was this shown in State Cross Country Run, but several schools and conferences had meets of their own. This provides fine fall participation for boys who do not play football.

Basketball enjoyed one of its finest seasons. It is impossible to increase the number of schools participating in the varsity sport, because all schools had inter-school programs. However there were more, Junior Varsity, "B" teams, class teams playing than ever before, so it is apparent that more boys participated than ever before.

While we do not have complete figures to back this statement, there probably were more girl's teams playing inter-school schedules, than for some years.

Wrestling showed quite a gain during the year, more schools participated than ever before and an unofficial, although an approved State Wrestling Tournament was held in Rapid City.

Track continues its remarkable growth. While qualifying regulations, keep the number of participants in the State Meet about the same each year, the number of schools taking part in the relay events, invitational, conference and regional meets has jumped rapidly. The number of small meets, dual, triangular and quadrangular has grown by leaps and bounds.

Golf has shown a healthy growth, the number of golfers in the State Tournament was the largest ever. There was some inter-school competition also on conference and invitational tournament level. This sport, which has the greatest "carry over" value as far as future participation is concerned, should be encouraged.

Tennis is one sport in which the SDHSAA has a State Tournament, which does not seem to grow. This is probably because there are no longer many tennis courts in our smaller cities and towns and few schools have their own courts.

August 18, 19, 20, 1958 the annual tuition free Coaching School was held at Augustana College in Sioux Falls. Over 200 coaches attended. While the number is very good, all coaches should avail themselves of the opportunity to attend.

Again, on the last few days of August and into the early part of September, a series of football rules meetings were held. Howard Connors of the University of South Dakota handled six of the meetings and your Executive Secretary handled the other ten. About 1400 coaches, officials and fans attended the meetings. Mr. Connors will again assist with the meetings for 1959.

Twenty basketball rule meetings were conducted by your Executive Secretary in twenty different parts of the state. Approximately 1500 attended and best of all, practically every basketball official working in the state, attended one or more of these meetings.

The regular Biennial Meeting of SDHSAA was held in Huron on Nov. 6, 1958. Prior to the meeting several amendments to the "Rules and Regulations" of the SDHSAA had been properly proposed, these were discussed at the meeting and voted upon by mail after the meeting. Two amendments carried, the others failed.

Nominations for Board of Control members were made, from the floor, one for an unexpired term and the other for a regular term. R. W. Monfore of Tripp was elected to the unexpired term and Bert Dent of Mobridge was elected to the regular term.

More details will be given on other pages of this "Year Book."

Basketball again showed that it was the "bread and butter sport" of the South Dakota schools. Receipts from District, Region, Section and State Tournaments exceeded 1958.

State Tournaments were complete "sell outs", both the "B" and "A" tournament tickets were gone well ahead of tournament time and checks amounting to almost \$16,000.00 were returned to senders, since orders could not be filled.

As previously stated, Track really "boomed" this year. There was more participation than ever before. "A" and "B" region meets drew more entries than in 1958.

The State Meet, "A" and "B", was held under almost ideal weather conditions. Five state records were set, all races and events, including those in which records were broken, were very close, showing depth of real talent. A total of 548 boys from 157 schools actually participated in the 1959 State Meet.

For the third consecutive year, the SDHSAA Tennis and Golf Tournaments, were held in conjunction with the State Track Meet. This may not be the best time of the year, for quality of competition, but it shows great popularity, since the number of contestants in golf rose from 57 in 1958 to 75 in 1959. Tennis did not show this growth, but the number participating remained quite constant. There were 21 taking part.

EVENTS OF 1958-1959

1958 Coaching School

Aug. 18, 19, 20

The first event for 1958-59 of state wide interest was the annual Coaching School, this year held at Augustana College in Sioux Falls on Aug. 18, 19, 20. The school attracted over 200 coaches. We feel that coaches were well rewarded for their attendance, since the talent did excellent jobs in presenting their material. Football, three varieties, 11, 8 and 6-man football was quite thoroughly presented. Basketball and Wrestling were also very important phases of the school.

Frank Howard and his assistant, Charles Waller of Clemson College, handled all sessions on eleven man football. These men did wonderful work presenting their own program of offensive and defensive football. We were real happy with Mr. Howard and Mr. Waller.

Jerry Bush, Head Basketball Coach at Nebraska University was the featured instructor in Basketball. Mr. Bush, a veteran pro player and a good many years as a head coach was outstanding. He gave the assembled coaches a wealth of material they could use in their coaching and handling of boys.

While interschool wrestling is in its infancy in South Dakota, Coach Warren Williamson of S. D. State College, carefully instructed the wrestling coaches in the fundamentals of high school wrestling. He presented his material in such a way that even the most inexperienced coach was greatly helped.

Eight man football, was capably handled by two outstanding eight man football coaches, Bob Mead of Bonesteel and Joe Bride of Fairfax. Both men have had outstanding records coaching the comparatively new sport and they did outstanding work at the Coaching School.

Six man football, was also handled by our own high school coaches, Gordy Syverson of Alexandria and Jerry McElroy of Woonsocket. They did wonderful work in presenting this topic to the coaches. We greatly appreciate the difficult task they had and the way they handled it. Six man coaches had to benefit by their work.

One of the honors or penalties for winning the "A" and or "B" Basketball Championship has been that the coaches of the two teams appear on the summer Coaching School program. For the 1958 Coaching School the "victims" were Carol Heier of the "A" Championship team, Huron, and Doug Cowman whose Canistota team won "B" honors. These young coaches did beautiful jobs and were greatly appreciated. We certainly were happy to have had them.

As stated before, the school was on the campus of Augustana College in Sioux Falls and we are deeply indebted to the officials at Augustana for allowing the use of their facilities, including the meeting places and the dormitories and for seeing that all was in readiness. It is impossible to name all those who worked so hard to have everything right but our thanks must go to Dr. L. M. Stavig, President of Augustana, to Bob Burns, Athletic Director and his staff, and to Wally Diehl, Director of Athletics at Washington High School and to members of his staff.

1958 Football Rules Meetings

Since 1938, a series of Football Rules Meetings has been held, annually in various locations in the state. In 1958 meetings were held in Aberdeen, Brookings, Custer, Dupree, Huron, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Mitchell, Mobridge, Philip, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sturgis, Vermillion, Watertown and Winner. Around 1300 attended the meetings, this included, officials, coaches, players and fans.

The football season is short in South Dakota, therefore it is necessary to start meetings as early as possible so that most meetings are completed before the first big week of football. So that this can be done, Howard Connors of the University of South Dakota, has assisted with football meetings. By the use of two men, all meetings have been completed before the 2nd game of the season. Officials have appreciated this and we feel that the meetings have helped officials.

1958 Cross Country Run

Skies were clear, the wind was slight, the temperature was 71, when 119 runners from 26 schools started the 13th annual SDHSAA Cross Country Run. The event was run on the State College Golf Course. The number of runners was 20 greater than in 1957 and 7 more schools sent runners.

Duane Frame of Reliance won the event in the excellent time of 11:33.8 which is but .4 second off the record made by Bud Edelen of Sioux Falls in 1954. Jim Kampen of Corona finished a close second with Larry Stohr of Clear Lake a good third.

The Clear Lake team of Stohr, Richard Rust and Wayne Triebwasser won team honors with 11 points with Watertown second with 39 points, Washington High School of Sioux Falls followed with 44 points.

Jim Emmerich, Head Track Coach and Cross Country Coach at State College, again managed the event. He does a swell job. Thanks Jim'

1958 Basketball Rules Meetings

A total of about 1500, officials, coaches, players and fans attended the 20 basketball rules meetings conducted by the Executive Secretary of the SDHSAA. Meetings started October 20th and wound up on December 4th. Meetings were held in Aberdeen, Chamberlain, Dupree, Gettysburg, Hot Springs, Huron, Kadoka, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Madison, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sisseton, Sturgis, Watertown, White River, Winner and Yankton. The meeting scheduled at Lake Andes was not held, because of a blizzard. The conductor of the meeting was the only one there.

Rule changes, a review of the old rules and officiating procedures were discussed at all meetings. A new basketball film "Basketball for Millions" was also shown at each meeting. We feel the meetings are of value and that they have helped officials and coaches. Your Executive Secretary, the conductor of the meetings, and a member of the National Basketball Rules Committee of the United States and Canada, may not know more about the rules of basketball than anyone else, but he does have access to materials and information not commonly available to the average coach and official. Again we believe the Basketball Rules Meetings are valuable.

Board of Control Meeting—Nov. 4, 1958

On November 4th the Board of Control of the SDHSA held its first meeting of 1958-1959. Mr. E. E. Grunwald was selected Chairman, Mr. A. A. Quintal was renamed Vice Chairman and Mr. C. H. Holgate was again elected as the Treasurer. Routine business was taken care of. A summary of Board of Control actions will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

Biennial Meeting SDHSAA

Nov. 6, 1958

The regular Biennial Meeting of the SDHSAA was held in Huron on November 6, 1959. Prior to the meeting five (5) amendments had been presented. They are as follows:

#1. Article III Section 1—Amend to read

"Membership in this Association shall be limited to public schools of the state and to the General Beadle Campus School at Madison, the Flandreau Indian High School, the Oglala Indian School, the Rosebud Community High School, the Pierre Indian School, the Cheyenne Indian School, the Ft. Thompson Indian School, the South Dakota School for the Deaf and the SOUTH DAKOTA TRAINING SCHOOL."

This amendment failed in the subsequent mail balloting. Yes 119, No 113. Need $\frac{2}{3}$ majority.

#2. Article III Section 1—Amend to read

"Membership in this Association shall be limited to public schools, of the state and to the General Beadle Campus School at Madison, the Flandreau Indian High School, the Oglala Indian Boarding School, the Rosebud Community High School, the Pierre Indian School, the Cheyenne Indian School, the Ft.

Thompson Indian School, the South Dakota School for the Deaf and the SOUTH DAKOTA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND."

This amendment carried in the subsequent mail balloting. Yes 208, No 26. Received more than % majority.

#3. Article V Section 2—Amend to read by adding the paragraph in capitals.

"One member of the Board of Control shall be an active athletic coach or active bona fide director of athletics with previous coaching experience. One member shall be a high school principal or a superintendent of schools employed by the public schools in a town of one thousand population or less according to the last federal or state census. The other three members shall all be either high school principals or school superintendents.

NO BOARD OF CONTROL MEMBER MAY BE ELIGIBLE TO BE ELECTED TO MORE THAN ONE FIVE-YEAR TERM. HE MAY BE ELECTED OR APPOINTED TO FILL AN UNEXPIRED TERM AND IS ELIGIBLE TO RUN FOR ONE FULL FIVE-YEAR TERM. HE MAY NOT BE APPOINTED TO FILL AN UNEXPIRED TERM IF HE HAS ONCE SERVED ON THE BOARD OF CONTROL."

This amendment carried in the subsequent mail balloting. Yes 158, No 76. Received % majority vote.

#4. Article VIII Section 5—Amend to read as follows:

"Pre-Season training in football, under the direction of a coach who is qualified under Section 3 of this Article and who is in immediate charge of such training, MAY BEGIN APPROXIMATELY THREE WEEKS PRIOR TO THE PARTICULAR SCHOOL'S FIRST SCHEDULED FOOTBALL GAME. THE BOARD OF CONTROL SHALL SET THE DATES LIMITING THE TIME BEFORE WHICH A FOOTBALL GAME MAY BE SCHEDULED AND BEFORE WHICH FOOTBALL PRACTICE MAY BEGIN. THESE DATES WILL BE SET UP SEVERAL YEARS IN ADVANCE. Other training of teams or future team members for inter-school athletic competition is prohibited during summer months."

This amendment failed in the subsequent mail balloting. Yes 154, No 80. Needed % majority vote.

#5. Article X, Section 4—Amend to read as follows:

"The "A" schools for basketball shall be the 31 LARGEST MEMBER HIGH SCHOOLS IN ENROLLMENT IN THE STATE OF SOUTH DAKOTA, AND DEADWOOD HIGH SCHOOL, and shall constitute the "A" schools for two years. Each two years the LARGEST 31 SCHOOLS, AND DEADWOOD HIGH SCHOOL, shall be determined and designated "A" schools for two years. How the "A" regions are arranged and how the tournaments are set up shall be left to the 32 "A" schools and the Board of Control."

This amendment failed in the subsequent mail balloting. Yes 128, No 107. Needed % majority vote.

Nominations for the unexpired term ending July 1, 1961 were made from the floor. The following were nominated: Supt. E. L. Douglas, Lennox; Supt. R. W. Monfore, Tripp; Supt. G. W. Wright, Selby and Supt. Leonard Herbst of Kimball. In subsequent mail balloting, Mr. Douglas received 65 votes, Mr. Monfore 77, Mr. Wright 51, and Mr. Herbst 39. Since no candidate received a majority of the votes cast, a run-off election, between Mr. Douglas and Mr. Monfore was held. Mr. Monfore was elected

148 to 84 and therefore became a member of the Board of Control at once since the term was an unexpired term, vacated by Mr. E. B. Coacher, formerly of Chamberlain.

For a regular five (5) year term, starting July 1, 1959 and ending July 1, 1964, the "Coach" member of the Board of Control, Article V, Section 2 of the Rules and Regulations, nominations were made for the incumbent A. A. "Joe" Quintal of Mitchell and for Bert Dent of Mobridge. In subsequent mail balloting Mr. Dent was elected 119 to 113. He will thus become a member of the Board of Control on July 1, 1959.

National Alliance Football Rules Committee Meeting

For the second year, please note that the Football Rules have changed their name from The National Federation to National Alliance, which means that the code of football rules is used by high schools, junior colleges and most schools belonging to the N.A.I.A. (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics). Each organization has representatives on the Committee. There is no danger of the high schools losing control on the committee, since 42 of the states, plus Hawaii, Alaska and some of the Canadian Provinces have a strong majority vote, about 45 to 6.

At the 1959 meeting of the Football Rules Committee, held in New Orleans, Louisiana, few, if any important changes were made. All these changes will be discussed at the 1959 Rules Meetings.

Board of Control Meetings, March 14 & 16, 1959

Two meetings of the Board of Control were held prior to and during the "A" Basketball tournament. Routine work was taken care of, a decision to delay action on locating the 1960 tournaments was made and Deadwood High School was placed on probation. More details will be given on other pages of this Year Book.

Basketball Tournaments

The 1959 State "A" and "B" Basketball Tournaments are now history, and again two completely new champions were crowned. For the first time in history Watertown won the "A" Championship and Cheyenne was the "B" Champion.

Popularity of basketball rose to new heights in both tournaments, capacity crowds were the rule, tickets for both tournaments were gone long before the teams had even qualified for the two tournaments. Sportsmanship, fine management, wonderful individual play and team play featured both State Tournaments.

Complete details of both tournaments will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

National Basketball Rules Committee

For the fifth year, your Executive Secretary was appointed, by the National Federation's Executive Committee, as one of four high school members on the National Basketball Rules Committee. This year, however, he was not able to attend because of a conflict with the State "A" Tournament.

From minutes of the meeting of the National Basketball Committee of the United States and Canada, it is apparent that there is an attempt being made to standardize rules and few changes were made. Again these changes will be fully discussed at the 1959 Basketball Rules Meetings.

1959 Track Clinic

The first annual Track and Field Clinic was held in Pierre on Saturday, April 4, 1959. It was a decided success and we hope that it can be continued.

Local talent, that is state talent, was used and each of the men responded in a professional way. It is doubtful if any nationally known track coach could have done better. The worst feature of the Clinic was the lack of time for the instructors, since most phases of track were covered in one days time.

The talent included, in the order in which they appeared, Wally Diehl, Director of Athletics at Washington High School in Sioux Falls and Director of the Howard Wood Relays, and the N.A.I.A. National Track Meet, discussed "Meet Management"; Ken Greeno, Director of Athletics and Track Coach at Redfield handled High and Low Hurdling; Jim Flevaris, substituting for Howard Taplett, Track Coach at Tyndall, handled sprints and the short relays; Don Williams, Pole Vault Coach at Huron High School, discussed Pole Vaulting.

After lunch, E. T. Hansen, Track Coach at Washington High School, Sioux Falls told how he prepared his middle distance runners and discussed the longer relays.

Dr. H. B. Goodell, Athletic Director, Track Coach and Trainer at South Dakota School of Mines and Technology discussed common track injuries; Emmett Lenihan, Track Coach at Aberdeen handled the High Jump and Dan Lennon, Track Coach at State University of South Dakota, handled the weight events. He also had his fine shot putter and discus thrower, Kermit Born, with him to demonstrate.

79 coaches signed attendance cards and there were probably a half dozen attending who did not sign cards. We feel the event was a decided success and should be continued.

The 1959 State Track Meet

The fifty second annual Track and Field Meet is now history, and, without doubt, was one of the finest meets ever. The weather was almost ideal, the management of the Meet, under the direction of Clar Lilevjen, Athletic Director of the Watertown High School, was well near perfect. The athletes, despite a miserable spring as far as track weather was concerned, responded and succeeded in setting five new all time records. In all events, even those in which records were set, the competition was keen, and without doubt, other individuals or relay teams running second or third also exceeded old records.

Washington High School of Sioux Falls was again the "A" Champion, but was challenged all the way by Watertown. In the "B" meet we had a surprise winner with Marion edging Edgemont the 1958 "B" Champion.

Too much credit cannot be given Mr. Lilevjen of Watertown High School. He had the Meet well organized and the two day event ran off with precision, thanks to Mr. Lilevjen and his staff.

Complete summaries of the "A" and "B" Meets, with pictures of the winners in all events, except the "B" High Jump, will be found on other pages of this volume. The reason there is no picture of the "B" High Jump winner is that seven tied for 1st.

1959 Golf & Tennis Tournaments

The greatest number of golfers in the history of the SDHSAA Golf Tournament, took after "par" on the Watertown Country Club Course May 15, 16, 1959. 75 golfers teed off with 73 finishing the 36 hole event.

At the end of of the 36 holes, Dave Matz of Watertown, Keel Codington of Sioux Falls and John Van De Walle of Sioux Falls came in even, all shooting good 150's.

The Sioux Falls team of Keel Coddington and John Van De Walle with a total of 300 was the winner with Watertown's Dave Matz with 150 and Mike Cutler with 156 gave Watertown's team second with 306.

Mr. Loren Krugel, Pro at the Country Club ably managed the golf tournament assisted by Jim Marking of Watertown High School.

1959 Tennis Tournament

Tom Line of Sioux Falls won the singles championship in the SDHSAA annual Tennis Tournament in Watertown May 15, 16, 1959, defeating Gilbert Haldeman of Aberdeen in the finals 6-1 and 6-1. In doubles competition Line along with teammate Fred Fischer defeated an Aberdeen team of Bill Bunce and Carl Kline in the finals 6-0 and 6-1 to sweep the tennis competition.

Fifteen singles tennis players took part while there were 7 doubles teams in the tournament. Eugene Kriens of Watertown ably handled the Tennis Tournament.

A summary of both the tennis and golf tournaments may be found elsewhere in this "Year Book."

Board of Control Meeting June 8, 1959

The final Board of Control meeting of 1958-1959 was held in Pierre on Monday June 8th at SDHSAA Headquarters in the SDEA Building. The Board located both 1960 Basketball Tournaments in Huron and approved a budget for 1959-1960.

Since this meeting was the last for A. A. Quintal, the Board elected D. W. Evans as Vice Chairman starting July 1, 1959.

National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations, Annual Meeting—Lookout Mountain, Tennessee, June 28 to July 2, 1959

R. W. Monfore, member of the SDHSAA Board of Control and R. M. Walseth, Executive Secretary were official delegates to the National Federation's Annual Convention. The meeting was attended by Board of Control members and Executive Secretaries from forty some states, including Hawaii and Alaska. Excerpts from the minutes of this convention will be furnished member schools from time to time during the coming school year, via the "Newsletter".

Your Executive Secretary was on a panel on "Training Officials" and also discussed part of the new "Basketball Rule changes".

BOARD OF CONTROL ACTIONS 1958-1959

During the year the Board of Control had three regular meetings and two short meetings, not previously called, rather meetings of necessity. The first meeting was in Huron on Nov. 4, 1958 with a special meeting also in Huron on Nov. 6, 1958. The second meeting was in Aberdeen at the residence of C. H. Holgate on March 18, 1959. Again a special meeting was held in Aberdeen in Mr. Holgate's Office on March 20th. The third meeting was in Pierre on June 8th in the SDHSAA headquarters in the SDEA Building.

Officers for the year were elected as follows: Supt. E. E. Grunwald, Sturgis was elected Chairman; Coach A. A. Quintal, Mitchell, Vice Chairman; and Supt. C. H. Holgate, Aberdeen, was elected Treasurer.

Authorized securing Howard Connors to conduct six football Rules Meetings in August and September 1959.

Discussed and ruled on several eligibility cases and transfer students.

Decided to eliminate the dinner after the final games of the "A" and "B" State Basketball Tournaments and instead award the trophies and medals at the Tournaments, so that the public could see the presentation of the awards.

Since the 1959 State Track Meet was to be run on an eight lane track, it was decided to run all preliminary events in which 16 qualify in two heats with four to qualify for the finals. In the 100 yard dash, in which 24 qualify, run the preliminaries in 4 heats of six with two from each heat qualifying for the finals.

Also in track, it was decided to run the first runners in lanes the entire quarter mile in the Medley and Mile Relays. Starting heights in the High Jump and Pole Vault were set.

Since there was a regrettable incident in the District #32 basketball tournament, involving one of the Deadwood players, who assaulted one of the officials after the final game of the tournament, Supt. Berger of Deadwood was asked to meet with the Board and after much investigation, study and discussion, Marlin Janas, was declared ineligible for any further inter-school athletic competition and the Deadwood school was placed on probation.

Reviewed athletic insurance plans as presented by Zurek and Mutual of Omaha and approved these plans for use in SDHSAA member schools.

Discussed ticket abuses and distribution of tickets for the State Basketball Tournaments and some changes will be made.

Defined the Relay teams. Since teams qualify for the State Track Meet by winning in the regions substitutions are allowable in the preliminaries, however personnel of the team that qualified for the finals must be the same as that in the preliminaries and further, runners in Relays in the finals must run the same distance as in the preliminaries.

Decided to hold the Friday preliminaries in the 1960 State Meet in the evening, with finals in the afternoon on Saturday.

Authorized changes in arrangement of some "B" schools in track regions.

Decided to purchase medals for the first five places in individual competition in the golf tournaments.

Called a special meeting of the SDHSAA to be in Pierre, Saturday, November 14, 1959. The reason, since the SDEA has changed their state-wide meeting from a biennial to a triennial meeting and since the SDHSAA Rules and Regulations state that the Biennial Meeting of the SDHSAA shall be at the time and place of the SDEA Meeting, a change is necessary. This meeting will thus, provide a chance for schools to submit amendments.

Purchased the year's supply of trophies and medals from the S. D. Sporting Goods Dealers Association.

Adopted a budget for 1959-1960.

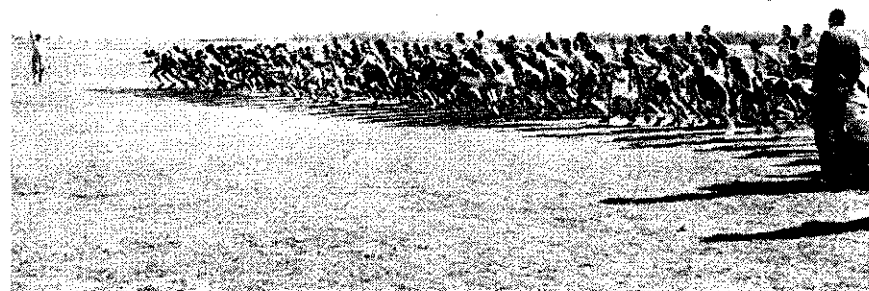

Finish of 1958 Cross Country Run



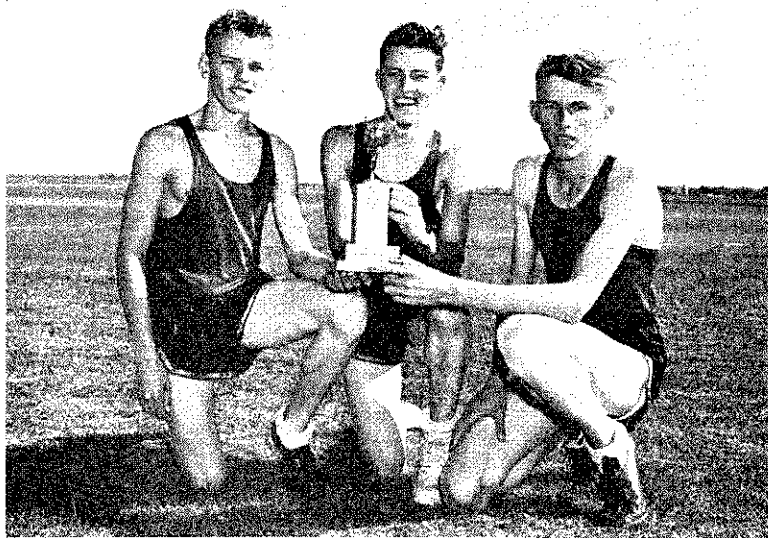
Start of 1958 Cross Country Run

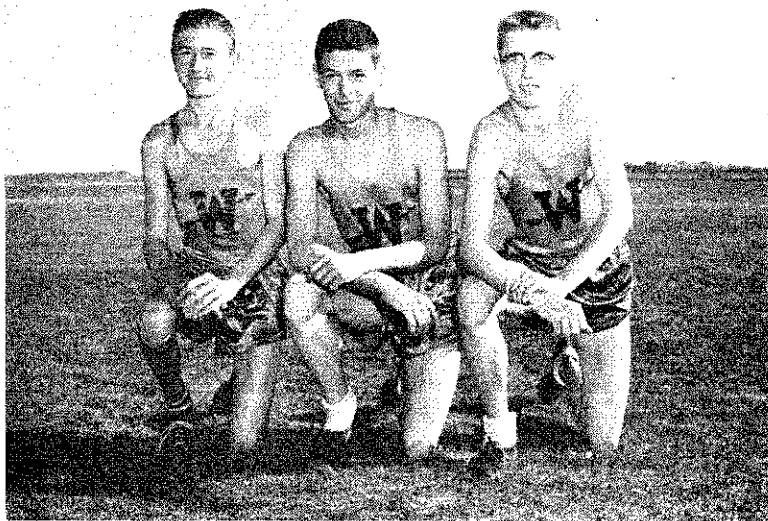

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1905 and from that time until 1912, competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the SDHSAA, Huron College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament, open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1939, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1935 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this set-up the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1936.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" set-up, including, taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1936 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1951 the present plan was started whereby the 32 largest high schools, by enrollments, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" set-up is that, while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

Since the start in 1936, there has been little change in the "B" set-up, this class continuing with 32 districts and eight regions with the eight region champions qualifying for the State "B" Tournament.

"A" and "B" Tournaments in 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1957, 1958, and in 1959 have proven very satisfactory and will continue.

THE 1959 TOURNAMENTS

The completion of the 1959 tournaments, found two teams, winning State Championships for the first time. The Cheyenne River High School is the new "B" Champion and the Watertown High School is the new "A" Champion. Both of these teams are fine, deserving champions, both had outstanding seasonal records and while they might not have been outstanding favorites in the pre-tournament dope, they were both considered as having good chances in the tournament.

The Cheyenne Indian High School, has been a power in the "B" Class for several years but has been unable to win the championship before. In fact they have been playing in, what is recognized by most experts as the strongest "B" region in the state, and have had their difficulty getting to the "B" Classic. They made it in 1958, with an excellent team in 1959 they proved their strength and became the 1959 "B" Champions.

The team showed excellent coaching, had good height, not big however by present day basketball standards, had good balance, fine ball handling ability, in fact did everything both offensively and defensively, very well. The "Braves" are truly a fine team and an excellent addition to our long line of "B" Champions!

Watertown, the new "A" Champion, is a fine addition to the long list of outstanding "A" teams that have won past championships. It seems almost unbelievable that the 1959 championship is their first. They have been represented in the "A" Tournament many times, with good teams, but have never succeeded in making it all the way.

The "Arrows" are a very good team, they are a smartly coached team, they have the necessary big man, backed up with outstanding regulars and a good bench. They were a determined team, a team that decided that they were going to win the Championship and went about their work that way and were rewarded with the big trophy.

Too much credit cannot be given the two coaches of the Championship teams, Coach Gus Kolb of Cheyenne and Coach Jim Marking of Watertown. Both these young men have coached well and handled their boys in an outstanding manner. The teams were very sound both offensively and defensively, with good determined rebounders at both boards. Players on both teams were unselfish, they had confidence in their ability to play and complete confidence in their coaches. Both coaches are a decided credit to their profession and will be heard from in future years! It is a real privilege and pleasure to know these young men!

Again congratulations to both Cheyenne and Watertown. They deserved their championships and the honors that go with the Championship. Congratulations again Gus and Jim!

On other pages of this "Tournament Bulletin" you will find results of District, Region, Section and State Tournaments, including financial reports. These reports show that basketball is a popular sport and we believe this interest will continue and the game will remain the nations most popular sport if we, the school men, in charge of high school athletics, fight to keep the game on the high plane of sportsmanship it now enjoys.

There must be constant pressure on our teams, our coaches, our student bodies, and upon our adult fans, so that they are constantly kept aware of the fact that inter-school basketball, including tournaments, is but a part of our secondary school program and that it must be conducted that way, with dignity and honor. There is much evidence to show that some of our college basketball is not that way and we as high schools should set the example and not be led by those groups supposedly more advanced than we are.

From our reports on our 32 District, 8 Region and 8 Section Tournaments, these events must have been pleasant affairs. We know the State Tournaments were fine events, and we also know that every game does produce a winner and a loser, along with the disappointments and heartaches. It is still true that these problems are constantly being faced in real life and surely some value is a result of these "setbacks". The players surely learn to "Take It," and most of our spectators must also learn.

Tournament management in all levels of tournaments has greatly improved, which naturally makes for better tournaments. Management of the State Tournaments, in Huron and Aberdeen is better each year, new ideas are used and these are passed on to the other tournaments. we feel, each year, the tournaments just concluded are the best ever, but

knowingly the ingenuity and creativeness of those in charge, we know future tournaments will be even better.

Again our congratulations to Watertown and Cheyenne and to their fine teams and coaches, however we cannot close without paying homage to those fine teams defeated along the way. We had many fine teams, teams which in other years, might have been the champions but there can be but one winner in each class and the two are for 1959, Cheyenne and Watertown.
