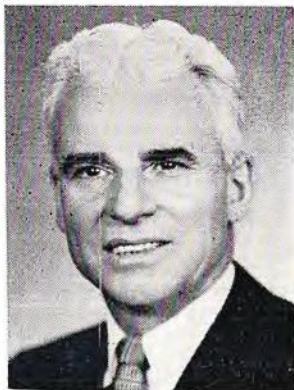

FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and does provide a complete review of events in the school year of 1959-1960. All statewide events in which championships are determined are summarized and listed in the order they occurred.

By saving year books, member schools could have a complete summary of the Association since it was formed in December 1905. This does not mean that a Year Book has been published each year since 1905. The first Year Book was published in 1927 and contained a summary of events from the beginning through the school year of 1926-27. The second such publication was in 1934, the third in 1940, again in 1942 and in 1946. Since 1946 the Year Book has been an annual publication.

Pictures of teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won statewide events are shown. There have been a few missed, because of photographic failures, and this year is no exception, we have missed a few individuals. Their names, of course, will appear in the summaries.

We sincerely hope each school has been and will continue to file their copies of the year Book as a rather complete history of the Association will be on file in each member school.

Starting July 1, 1937, R. M. Walseth was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association with office space in the Department of Public Instruction, in the Statehouse in Pierre. Because of expansion in the Department of Public Instruction and lack of space the office was moved to the St. Charles Hotel in January of 1946, where it remained until November 1, 1957, when it was moved to permanent quarters in the SDEA Building at 415 E. Capitol Avenue in Pierre. The new building is pictured on Page 3 of this Year Book.

REVIEW OF SDHSAA EVENTS 1959-1960

Following you will find a short review of the events and happenings of the SDHSAA for 1959-1960. All state wide events are briefly mentioned here, and complete summaries and stories with pictures will be found on the following pages, in the order in which the events took place.

1959-1960 was an outstanding year in high school athletics, our teams were better, the management of local programs improved, cooperation between the Board of Control and the individual schools was never better. A wonderful spirit has been in evidence for years, but during 1959-1960 it was at its highest level. Local management of athletic programs, as well as tournament and meet management improved. We believe that because of the cooperation of you school people we have one of the soundest, sanest interschool athletic programs in the nation.

The amount of and the quality of football for 1959 improved. There were a few more 11-man football teams. Six-man football has decreased, but 8-man football has grown immensely, much more than off-setting the loss in 6-man football. The number of boys participating in football has increased.

Cross-Country running has increased as a fall sport for those boys not participating in football. The largest entry list ever, competed in the 1959 Cross-Country Run. Several conference and invitational meets preceded the annual State Cross-Country Run.

Basketball continues to amaze the fans of the state, the quality of basketball seems to get better and better. The number of teams cannot increase, since all member schools play the game, but more and more boys are playing, with many schools increasing their intramural programs and having more teams of lower classification, such as Junior Varsity, "B" teams, etc. playing limited inter school schedules. We feel that schools are operating their basketball programs well.

While we do not have definite figures to back up this statement, we believe there is more inter school girls basketball being played. With better facilities becoming available, gradually, there certainly is a growth in intramural girls basketball.

Wrestling has made quite a gain, during the year. While, in the past, there have been two unofficial tournaments, 1960 saw the first official State Tournament with an official championship team crowned and twelve individual state weight champions.

Track continues to improve, while qualifying regulations keep the number of competitors in the State "A" and "B" Meets quite constant, the number of schools taking part in regions, in relay events, invitational affairs and conference meets, as well as dual competition continues to grow. Weather for track this spring was uniformly bad, but records continue to be broken.

Golf at the high school level has made great strides forward. Schools have been entering more boys in the State Tournament, but better than that there are an increasing number of conference and invitational tournaments, indicating increased interest and therefore increased participation.

Tennis is the one sport, in which the SDHSAA holds a State Tournament, that continues to slip. This is, no doubt, due to the fact that few schools have courts and except for the larger towns there are few courts available.

On August 17, 18, 19, 1959 the 14th Annual tuition free Coaching School was held in the "Arena" in Huron. Attendance again exceeded 200. While the number attending is very satisfactory, more should avail themselves of the opportunity of attending one of the fine schools in the nation.

In addition to the summer Coaching School, a one day Track Clinic was held in Mitchell on March 26th. 120 Coaches took advantage of this school. The event will be continued.

The annual Football Rules Meetings, sixteen in number, were held in various sections of the state, with excellent attendance at each meeting. So that the series of meetings could be completed before the first "big" football date of the year, Howard Connors of Vermillion assisted by taking six of the meetings. Mr. Connors will again assist with the 1960 Meetings.

Twenty Basketball Rule Meetings were conducted by your Executive Secretary in all sections of the state. About 1600, officials, coaches, players and fans attended the meetings and best of all, practically every basketball official working in the state attended one or more of these meetings.

A "Special Meeting" of the SDHSAA was held in Pierre on Saturday November 14, 1959. The Special Meeting was called so that amendments to the "Rules and Regulations" of the SDHSAA could be submitted. The amendments proposed will be discussed in other sections of this Year Book. Since Chairman Grunwald's term was to expire July 1, 1960 and since he was not eligible to reelection, Supt. M. E. Lindsey of Custer was nominated, there were no other nominations so Mr. Lindsey will become a member of the Board of Control July 1, 1960.

Basketball, our "bread and butter sport", continued to attract people. District, Region, Section and State Tournaments exceeded the 1959 tournaments financially by a large margin. For the State "B" Tournament, demand for tickets was at an all time high with thousands of dollars refunded to disappointed prospective customers.

For 1961 there will be a new method of selecting the eight teams for the State "A" tournament. The method will be discussed on other pages of this bulletin.

The State Track Meet "A" and "B" was run under very trying conditions, because of weather. All events scheduled for Fri., May 20 were cancelled and the meet was run as a one day meet, with preliminaries in the 100, 220, high hurdles, and low hurdles held on Saturday morning. Other events in which preliminaries had been scheduled were run off in two sections and run against time. These events were the 440 yard dash, the 880, medley and mile relays. On Saturday May 21 the weather was excellent and the track was fast. State Meet records in three events were broken, with several "B" records also cracked.

For the fourth year, the SDHSAA Tennis and Golf tournaments, were held at the time and place of the State Track Meet, namely Sioux Falls. The number participating in tennis was small, while the number in golf increased. The Golf Tournament was also a part casualty of the weather. All contestants did finish the first 18 holes on Friday, but only 23 were allowed to finish the last 18 holes on Saturday, because of the soft condition of the green following the heavy rains.

EVENTS OF 1959-1960

1959 Coaching School

Huron—Aug. 17, 18, 19, 1959

The annual Coaching School in Huron was the first SDHSAA event of the new year. It was in Huron on August 17, 18, 19 with all sessions held in the Huron Arena. The school, tuition free, attracted over 200 coaches most of whom were from South Dakota, but there were also several from other states. We feel the school was a good one and surely coaches benefited by their attendance. Football, basketball and wrestling were ably presented by the 1959 staff.

Phil Dickens of Indiana University did a fine job of telling the coaches how he operated his football system, both offensively and defensively. He was sound, talked freely and had much to tell the coaches. We were happy to have had Mr. Dickens.

R. M. "Sox" Walseth, head basketball coach at the University of Colorado was the featured basketball instructor and we believe he also did a good job. He stressed defensive basketball play and showed how his teams played. Certainly the coaches were benefited by his appearance at the school.

Warren Williamson of S. D. State College conducted two sessions on wrestling and lectured and demonstrated very well on this comparatively new sport in South Dakota. Mr. Williamson did an outstanding job.

Six-man football was ably handled by Coach Jack Cranston of Selby. Jack has been an outstanding six-man coach and since he was leaving the six-man field he had nothing to hold back so the coaches attending his meeting got an ear full.

There were no sessions on eight-man football, since the eight-man game is so similar to regular football, we felt the coaches would get more from the regular football instructor than some one working on the 8-man game.

The coaches of the championship basketball teams have annually, been honored or penalized for their successes by being on the staff at the Coaching School. 1959 was no different. Jim Marking of Watertown and Gus Kolb of Cheyenne, thus were on the program. Each told of the individuals on their teams and how they handled them, and how they were fitted to their style of play or that their style was made to fit the personnel. Both of these excellent coaches did real well and their efforts were greatly appreciated.

As mentioned before the school was in Huron and we deeply appreciate the effort made by the High School and College officials and the use of the facilities at both places. We are deeply indebted to them. Especially to Mr. E. C. Mikkelson, Superintendent of Schools in Huron; President Kerr of the College; Charles Fisher, Arena Manager; and to Athletic Director Clyde Cotton of the High School and his staff; and to the athletic staff at Huron College; Jim Long, Gil Peterson and Don Bartlett.

1959 Football Rules Meetings

Annually since 1938, with the exception of three years during World War II, football rules meetings have been held in various sections of the state. In 1959, meetings were held in Aberdeen, Brookings, Custer, Dupree, Huron, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Mitchell, Mobridge, Philip, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sturgis, Vermillion, Watertown and Winner. The meetings are primarily for coaches and officials, however players and fans are invited and are very welcome. Around 1200 attended the 1959 meetings.

Since the football season, because of uncertain weather, starts rather early and ends early, we have attempted to have the meetings completed before the first big football date, generally the second Friday in September. To accomplish this it has been necessary to use two interpreters, your Executive Secretary and Howard Connors of Vermillion. We are fortunate to have a man like Mr. Connors, an active official who formerly taught courses in Rules and Officiating at the University. We feel that it is important and a great aid to officials to have the meetings before their first game. Mr. Connors, will again assist in 1960.

1959 Cross-County Run

Under clear skies, but slightly cool temperatures and with a brisk breeze blowing, 148 runners from 33 schools competed in the 14th annual SDHSAA Cross-Country Run. The event was run off on the State College Golf Course in Brookings. The number of competitors was 29 greater than in 1958 with seven more schools entering runners.

John Kleinjan of Volga was the winner in the good time of 11:42, he was pushed most of the way by the 1958 Champion Duane Frame of Reliance who finished a close second, Norman Splittstoesser of Rapid City was a good third.

The Rapid City team of Splittstoesser, Wallace Ward and Robert Diriekson won team honors with 22 points, Milbank was second with 31 points, followed closely by Clear Lake with 33 points.

Jim Emmerick, Head Track and Cross-Country Coach at State College, again ably handled the meet.

A complete summary of the Cross-Country Run, along with pictures will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

1959 Basketball Rules Meetings

A few more than 1600 officials, coaches, players and fans attended the 20 basketball rules meetings conducted by the Executive Secretary. Meetings started on October 14 and ended on Nov. 30. Meetings were held in Aberdeen, Chamberlain, Dupree, Gettysburg, Hot Springs, Huron, Kadoka, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Madison, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sisseton, Sturgis, Watertown, White River, Winner and Yankton.

Rules changes, a review of old rules and a discussion on officiating and the mechanics of officiating were discussed at all meetings. We believe that, because of the meetings, basketball rules are better understood and we are gradually getting a little more uniformity in our officiating.

Board of Control Meeting—Nov. 13, 1959

As per the Rules and Regulations of the SDHSAA, officers of the Board are elected at the first Board Meeting after July 1st. Mr. E. E. Grunwald was reelected Chairman, Mr. D. W. Evans was elected Vice-Chairman and Mr. C. H. Holgate was reelected Treasurer. Routine business was taken care of at the meeting. A summary of actions of the Board at all meetings during the year will be found on other pages of this Year Book. We suggest that these actions be reviewed, while looking over this book.

Special Meeting SDHSAA

Nov. 14, 1959

A Special Meeting of the Association was called by the Board of Control so that Amendments to the "Rules and Regulations" could be submitted and discussed. Since the SDEA had decided to change their state wide meeting to a Triennial Meeting instead of a Biennial Meeting, it was necessary to change the Rules and Regulations of the SDHSAA, since that section in these Rules and Regulations called for a Biennial Meeting of the SDHSAA at the time and place of the Biennial Meeting of the SDEA. The Board of Control proposed an Amendment to change the regular Biennial Meeting of the SDHSAA to an Annual Meeting. They (the Board of Control) also proposed an amendment for changing the transfer rule and to make the Rules and Regulations on basketball schedules conform with the ruling of the State Board of Education. Following are the Amendments as submitted and the result of the referendum balloting which followed the Special Meeting. The three Amendments all received the necessary $\frac{2}{3}$ majority and will become effective July 1, 1960.

Amendment No. 1—Amend Article IV, Section 1 to read as follows:

Section 1. Place of Meetings. The time and place of the regular Annual Meeting shall be on the Saturday of each year following Vet-

erans Day (Nov. 11) at Pierre except that on years when the South Dakota Education Association holds its regular statewide meeting the regular Annual Meeting of the SDHSAA shall be at that time and place, with the exact time and place to be determined and properly announced by the Board of Control. Special meetings may be held at times and places that may be determined by the Board of Control.

This amendment received the necessary $\frac{2}{3}$ majority vote and therefore becomes effective July 1, 1960. The vote was Yes—223 No—17

Amendment No. 2—Amend Article VII, Section 9 (f) to read as follows:

Section 9. Change of Schools. In case a student transfers from one high school to another his eligibility for athletic competition is affected, or not affected, according to the following regulations: (f) A student who changes high schools without a corresponding change in residence of the parents shall not be eligible for athletic competition in the high school to which he has transferred, for a period of one year.

This Amendment received the necessary $\frac{2}{3}$ majority vote and therefore becomes effective July 1, 1960. The vote was Yes—169 No—73

Amendment No. 3—Amend Article VIII, Section 2 by deleting Section 2 (a) and making Section 2 read as follows:

Section 2. Contest approved by Principal. No contest shall be arranged with a team from another school without the sanction of the high school principal or the superintendent and in addition to the SDHSAA sponsored Basketball Tournaments, no more than 18 basketball games and no more than 1 basketball tournament shall be scheduled and played, during any school year. Even when the power to arrange for contests is delegated to another faculty member the contracts, payment of checks, and other papers pertaining to the matter shall be signed or countersigned by the principal or the superintendent.

This Amendment received the necessary $\frac{2}{3}$ majority vote and therefore becomes effective July 1, 1960. Th vote was Yes—221 No—20

Mr. M. E. Lindsey, Superintendent of Schools at Custer was nominated to a regular 5 year term on the Board of Control, the term to start July 1, 1960.

There were no other nominations and therefore Mr. Lindsey was declared elected.

National Alliance Football Rules Committee Meeting

For the third year, please note that the Football Rules have changed their name from the National Federation Code to the National Alliance Code. This means that the rules will be used by High Schools, Junior Colleges, and by most schools belonging to the N.A.I.A. (National Association of Inter-Collegiate Athletics). Each group has representatives on the football committee. There is no danger of the high schools losing control of the Committee, since 42 states plus Hawaii and Alaska and some of the Canadian Provinces have a very strong majority vote.

The 1960 Meeting of the Football Committee was in Indianapolis, Indiana and for the first time since 1937, South Dakota was not represented at the Meeting. The reason: Snow stopped planes and trains in and out of Pierre at the time the Executive Secretary was scheduled to go to this meeting. Few rule changes were made and these will all be discussed at the 1960 Football Rules Meetings.

Board of Control Meeting—Jan. 15, 1960

Possible eligibility violations at the Oglala Community High School was the reason for this special meeting of the Board of Control. The Oglala Community High School was suspended from the SDHSAA from January 16 for the balance of the 1959-1960 school year.

1960 State Wrestling Tournament

The first official SDHSAA Wrestling Tournament was held in Spearfish on March 4 and 5, 1960. Two other unofficial tournaments have been held, both had been approved for SDHSAA member schools. For this first official meet, the SDHSAA assumed no financial responsibility other than to furnish a Championship Trophy and individual medals for first and second in each of the twelve weight classes. For the tournament, the cost of officials, rental on the Black Hills Teachers College Gym, were deducted from the gate receipts, plus some local expense and the balance divided among the teams attending, based on distance traveled. The first tournament was considered a success.

A complete summary, will be found on other pages of this Year Book. We are terribly sorry that we do not have pictures of the winners. Spearfish High School was the team winner with 112 points, followed by Rapid City with 97 and Redfield with 90 points.

Board of Control Meeting March 16, 1960

A regular meeting of the Board of Control was held in Huron on March 16, 1960 just prior to the State "A" Basketball Tournament.

Routine matters were taken up and in addition the probationary period for the Deadwood High School was ended, reports, written, oral and from some personal observation, showed that the school officials in Deadwood had done an outstanding job in correcting a rather bad situation. Deadwood was congratulated on their efforts. The selection of the sites for the 2 state basketball tournaments for 1961 was delayed until the June meeting of the Board. More details will be found under Board of Control actions on other pages of this Year Book.

Basketball Tournaments

The 1960 State "A" and "B" tournaments are now history and again new champions were crowned. Rapid City High School was the new "A" Champion and Harrisburg High School won the "B" Championship.

The attendance at the two state tournaments exceeded any tournaments ever before held. With both tournaments in Huron this was possible.

Complete details on both tournaments will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

New "A" Basketball Plan

A majority of the 32 "A" schools, by mail ballot, approved the following elimination tournament plan for 1961. It should be remembered that this plan is for 1961 only and does not carry over into following years.

The present eight (8) "A" Sections will not be changed, that is the four schools in each of the "A" sections for 1960 will be the same for 1961. However the method of qualifying for the State "A" tournament has been drastically changed. In each of the present "A" sections a double elimination tournament will be held, with two (2) teams from each section qualifying for the four new "A Sub-state" Tournaments. The two qualifying teams from each of Section 1 and 2 will meet in No. 1 Sub-State tournament. The two qualifying teams from each of sections 3 and 4 will meet in No. 2 Sub-State tournament. The two teams from each of sections 5 and 6 will meet in No. 3 Sub-State tournament and the two teams from each of sections 7 and 8 will meet in the No. 4 Sub-State tournament.

In each of the four "A" Sub-State Tournaments, double eliminations will be held with two (2) teams from each of the Sub-State tournaments to qualify for the "A" State Tournament.

Details on these tournaments have been partially worked out and will be completed and will be sent to the "A" schools early in the 1960-1961 school year.

1960 Track Clinic

The second annual Track and Field Clinic was held in Mitchell on Saturday, March 26, 1960 and over 120 coaches attended the clinic.

Since the date, March 26, between the end of the college indoor and the opening of the outdoor track seasons, it was possible to secure an outstanding track coach. We were able to secure the "Track Coach of 1959", Mr. M. E. "Bill" Easton of the University of Kansas. Mr. Easton was "terrific". He started in the morning and continued until 4:00 in the afternoon, with no time out except for lunch and a couple of ten minute coffee breaks. He covered briefly all events used in our high school program. The event will be held again in 1961.

1960 State Track Meet

The fifty-third annual State Track and Field Meet is now history and despite very adverse conditions it was an excellent meet. Three new state records were set as well as several new "B" records.

For the first time in the history of the event, Friday's preliminaries and five final field events were scheduled to be run-off in the evening instead of in the afternoon. Torrential rains fell during the afternoon and continued at night. The "A" discus was run down to the six qualifiers for the finals and the "B" shot put was held under the stands and was completed. Every other event was postponed until Saturday, with preliminaries in the 100, 220, 120 high hurdles and the 180 yard low hurdles run off on Saturday morning, as well as the field events incomplete or not started on Friday night.

On Saturday afternoon the event, as scheduled for Saturday was completed. There were some changes, however. In the 440 yard run and the three relays, preliminaries are generally run off on Friday, instead, these events were divided into two sections and were run against time.

Weather on Saturday was good and the track was fast, and the meet was a decided success. Too much credit cannot be given Wally M. Diehl, Director of Athletics at Washington High School and his staff. The meet operated like clock work, thanks to his efforts and planning.

Washington High School again won the "A" Championship with Central High School of Aberdeen a good second. The "B" Meet found two tied for the Championship. Volga High School and Tyndall High School each came up with 19 points.

Complete summaries of the "A" and "B" meets with pictures of all winners will be found on other pages of the Year Book.

1960 Golf Tournament

As in the Track Meet, weather played havoc with the 1960 Golf Tournament. The largest number of entries ever to take part played eighteen holes on the Minnehaha Country Club Course in Sioux Falls on Friday, May 20th. Before completion of the eighteen holes most of the golfers received a good wetting. Rains continued well into Friday night and because of excessive rains prior to the tournament, the greens became very soft. Rather than call off the tournament on Saturday, Mr. Livingston, Pro at the Club, generously allowed all boys and any school with a chance to place in the upper ten to complete their 18 holes of golf scheduled for Saturday. Twenty-three of the contestants did complete the 36 holes of golf.

Alan Cooke of Sioux Falls was medalist with a good 145. Byron Comstock also of Sioux Falls was second with 149 with Keil Coddington, of Sioux Falls with 153 followed by Bernal Kiser of Huron and James Cihak of Yankton with 154.

The Washington High School team of Sioux Falls, Cook and Comstock, were the team winners with 294 followed by Huron in second place, Kiser and Dave Hanten with 318. A complete summary will be found on other pages of this year Book.

Seventy-eight golfers from 25 schools took part in the tournament. Ed Livingston, Golf Pro at the Country Club, handled the tournament under very trying conditions, in his usual excellent manner.

1960 Tennis Tournament

Since the number of tennis players was small, weather did not hamper this event as it did the track meet and the golf tournament. There were but eight singles teams and four doubles teams so the event was run off quite handily before and after showers.

Fred Fischer of Washington High School was the Singles Champion and the Washington High School team of Fischer and Tom Weber took the doubles Championship. Don Grebin of Washington High School ably handled the tournament.

A summary showing pairings and scoring will be found elsewhere in this Year Book.

National Federation Convention

National Federation of State High School Athletic Association Annual Convention, East Glacier Park, Montana, July 3 to 6, 1960.

Board of Control Members D. W. Evans, R. W. Monfore, Bert Dent and Executive Secretary R. M. Walseth attended the 1960 Annual Convention. The meeting was attended by Board of Control Members and Executive Secretaries from over 40 of the states. Excerpts from the minutes of this convention will be furnished member schools from time to time during the coming school year, via the "Newsletter".

Board of Control Actions

1959-1960

During the school year of 1959-1960, the Board of Control had three regular meetings and one special meeting. The first meeting was in Pierre at SDHSAA headquarters in the SDEA Building on Friday, November 13, 1959. The second meeting, a special meeting, was also in Pierre on Friday, January 15, 1960. The third meeting, the second regular meeting, was in Huron on Wednesday, March 16, 1960 and the fourth meeting was on Saturday, June 4, 1960 at Sioux Falls.

Officers of the Board of Control for 1959-1960 were elected by the Board, as follows: Supt. E. E. Grunwald, Sturgis, Chairman; Supt. D. W. Evans, Kadoka, Vice Chairman; and Supt. C. H. Holgate, Aberdeen, Treasurer.

Dates and sites for events for 1960-1961 were set as follows:

Authorized, hiring Howard Connors of Vermillion to conduct six or seven football rules meetings in late August and early September.

Discussed and ruled on several eligibility cases.

Suspended the Oglala Community High School from the SDHSAA for a period from Jan. 16, 1960 to the end of the school year.

Reinstated the Oglala Community High School, after receiving the Annual Report and a statement from the school authorities. The reinstatement to become effective with the opening of school in the fall of 1960.

Lifted the indefinite period of probation for the Deadwood High School on March 16, 1960. The Deadwood High School had been placed on probation on March 20, 1959.

Authorized making the State Wrestling Tournament a SDHSAA Official event. Subsidized the event to the extent of furnishing a trophy for the Championship team and individual awards for first and second place winners in each weight class. Decided to continue the event under the same conditions in 1961. Date and location to be set later.

Authorized Board of Control members and the executive Secretary to attend the National Federation's Annual Convention at East Glacier Park, Montana July 3-6, 1960.

Authorized travel for the Executive Secretary to attend a Basketball Interpreters Meeting in Chicago on October 10, 1960 and to attend the National Alliance Football Rules Committee Meeting in Chicago January 3, 4, 1961.

Again ordered the 1960-1961 trophies and medals from the S. D. Sporting Goods Dealers Association.

Basketball: Set up regulations for the new 1961 "A" basketball plan, which provides for two, instead of one tournament, to qualify for the State "A" Tournament. Named the first tournament the "A" Section Tournament and the second tournament the "A" Sub-State Tournament.

Decided that for the 1961 "B" State Tournament that only "B" schools could order student tickets and that school orders could not exceed 10 student tickets.

Decided that for the 1961 "B" State Tournament, schools would be limited to 6 Adult tickets.

For the "A" State Tournament, "A" schools only could purchase "A" student tickets and no limit was set on the number a school could order. It was also decided that schools could order as many adult tickets for the "A" tournament as they wished.

Expenses to teams qualifying for the "A" or "B" State Basketball Tournaments would be raised slightly. Travel allowance will be 25 cents per mile instead of 21 cents per mile which was previously allowed.

Track: Decided that the members of a relay team which qualified for either the "A" or "B" State Track Meet would be the same team in the State Meet. Injury or illness being the only reason for substitutions.

Decided to have the Friday preliminaries and some field event finals for the "A" and "B" State Track Meet in the evening instead of in the afternoon, with the finals on Saturday afternoon. The Meet to be in Aberdeen on May 19, 20, 1961.

Authorized a study of "A" and "B" Regions in track, with an attempt to be made to more properly assign some schools.

Set starting heights and subsequent raises for the high jump and pole vault in the "A" and "B" State Track Meet for 1961.

Golf and Tennis: Despite the few contestants in the 1960 Tennis Tournament, it was decided to continue the event in 1961.

Since the quality of contestants in the SDHSAA Golf Tournament is so different, plans will be studied to try to determine a better method of entering golfers in the 1961 tournament.

Because of increased cost of postage and books, it was decided to increase the registration fee for basketball officials from \$1.50 to \$2.00.

Authorized the purchase of some needed new office equipment for the SDHSAA Office and with these items in the budget the budget for 1960-1961 was approved and adopted.

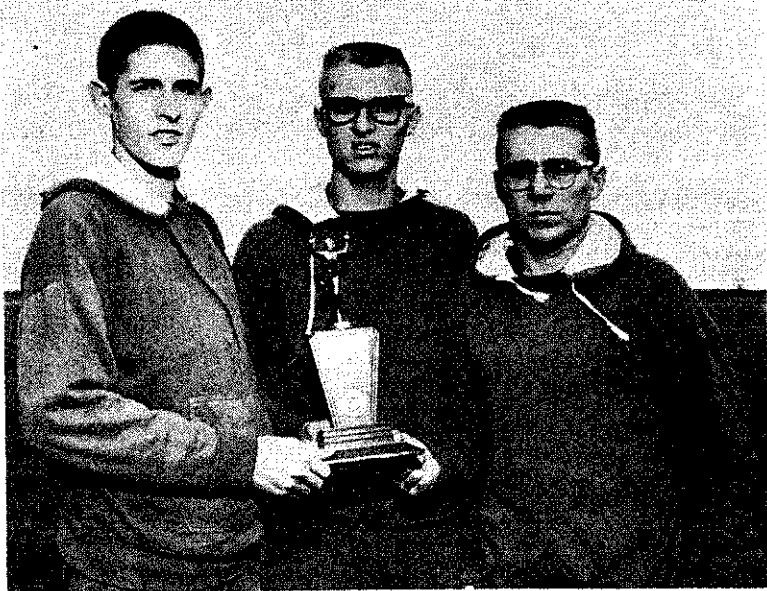

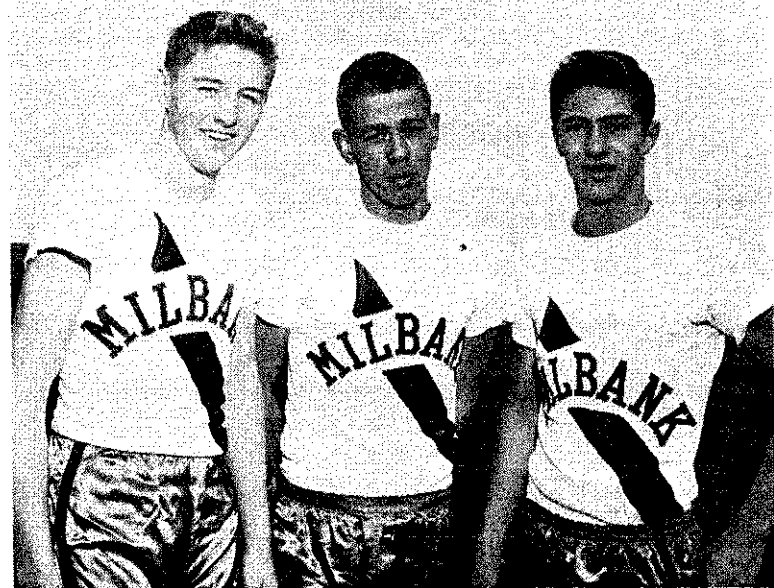


End of first half mile—1959 Cross Country Run

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1905 and from that time until 1912, competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the SDHSAA, Huron College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament, open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1939, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1935 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this set-up the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1936.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" set-up, including, taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1936 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1951 the present plan was started whereby the 32 largest high schools, by enrollments, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" set-up is that, while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

Since the start in 1936, there has been little change in the "B" set-up, this class continuing with 32 districts and eight regions with the eight region champions qualifying for the State "B" Tournament.

"A" and "B" Tournaments in 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956, 1957, 1958, 1959, and in 1960 have proven very satisfactory and will continue.

THE 1960 TOURNAMENTS

When the shouting was all over, following the two 1960 State Basketball Tournaments, two new champions were crowned. Harrisburg won the "B" title and Rapid City the "A" crown. The championship for Harrisburg was their first, in fact they had not been participants in the "B" tournament since the first "B" tournament in 1936. The Championship for Rapid City was their second, having won the "A" title in 1942. The two new champions are worthy successors to the fine championship teams of the past.

The Harrisburg team was a splendid team built around a good big center and two small, fast guards who were ably supported by the other two starters and a couple of good reserves. The "Tigers" were a well coached team, they knew what they were trying to do and they did it well. They were a determined group, never giving up, in fact came from behind to win the championship. Our congratulations. The Harrisburg "Tigers" are a very worthy addition to a long line of fine "B" Champions.

The Rapid City "Cobblers" were also worthy champions in the "A" class and certainly have added to good teams in the past, which have won the "A" championships. The "Cobblers" are a good team, have the necessary big man, along with rangy forwards and fast good ball handling guards. The team was well coached, had fine poise and truly earned the title. We welcome the "Cobblers" again into that select group of champions.

Too much credit cannot be given the coaches of the championship teams, Coach Arlo Mogck of Harrisburg and Coach Bill Mitchell of Rapid City. Both of these men had their teams "ready" for the tournaments. Their teams were soundly coached both offensively and defensively, both teams were alert and frequently capitalized on their opponents errors. Each team had the good big man, who controlled the boards well. Never have we seen more unselfish individuals, when a team mate was in position, he got the ball. Both coaches are a credit to the profession, they are fine men, had control of their players and their handling of their teams was remarkable.

We feel highly honored to know Bill Mitchell and Arlo Mogck.

Again our congratulations to Harrisburg and Rapid City. They deserved the championships and all the honors that go with championships and we know that their coaches will keep their feet on the ground and the entire game of basketball will be benefited by these two fine coaches.

Before leaving the State Basketball Tournaments, we must comment on the other teams in the tournaments. Never in the history of the "B" tournaments have the teams been more evenly matched. At the start of the "B" tournament, there was probably no favorite and the playing of the tournament showed the reason why. Anyone of the eight could have been the champion and a worthy one at that!

While the teams in the "A" tournament were, probably not as evenly matched as in the "B" the strength was good throughout and after analyzing the scores and teams, at least five of the eight could easily have been the champion.

There were a total of five overtime games in the two tournaments with one game in each tournament being decided by sudden death in the 2nd overtime period. The opening game in each tournament was an overtime game. What more could one ask? Truly they were great tournaments

On other pages of this "Tournament Bulletin" you will find results of District, Region, Section and the State Tournaments, including financial reports. These reports show that basketball is our most popular sport and we believe this interest will continue if we, the school men, in charge of high school athletics continue our fight to keep the game on the high plane of sportsmanship it now enjoys

If this great game is to retain its high spot in popularity, we must keep constant pressure on our fans, students, teams and coaches so that they do not lose sight of the fact that basketball is but a part of our entire secondary school program and that it must be kept that way. There is some evidence apparent, showing that some college basketball is not as it should be. There is a constant "booing", unwillingness to accept the officials' decisions, and conduct not worthy of thinking men and women. We, the high school people, must set the pattern and not be led by those who are "supposedly" more advanced.

From observation and reports from our 32 "B" Districts, our 8 "B" Regions, our 8 "A" Sections and from our 2 state tournaments we know

each was a fine event. We also know that when ever a game is played there is a winner and a loser in each contest. Our teams, with their heartbreaks and disappointments, accept these wins and losses in an excellent manner and the lessons learned are all a part of that learning process, so vital in secondary education. We must learn to "take it" as well as accept the laurels which come to the winner. Our players and coaches are wonderful and most fans respond in the same way but the noisy minority must be taught. It can be done so don't ever let up.

Tournament management at all levels of tournaments has greatly improved, which naturally means better tournaments. The management at our two state tournaments, both in Huron this year, has been wonderful. This is not meant as a "bouquet" to the SDHSAA, since the local management at the state tournaments is handled entirely by the host school. They are to be congratulated.

Again our congratulations to Rapid City and Harrisburg and to their fine teams and coaches, however we cannot end this without paying our respects to those fine teams defeated along the way. We had many fine teams, which in other years, might have been the champions but there can be but one winner in each class and those for 1960 are Harrisburg and Rapid City.

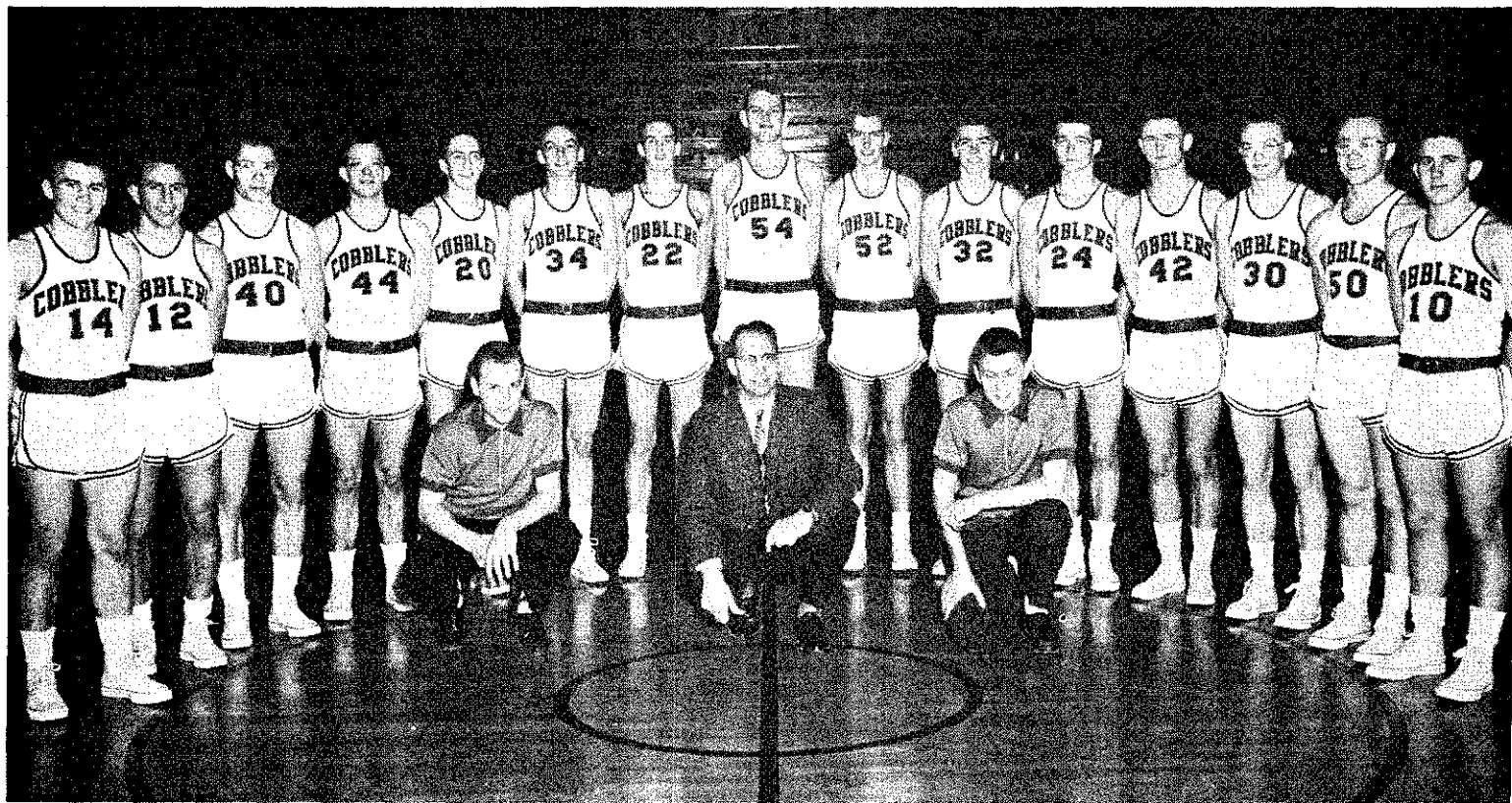

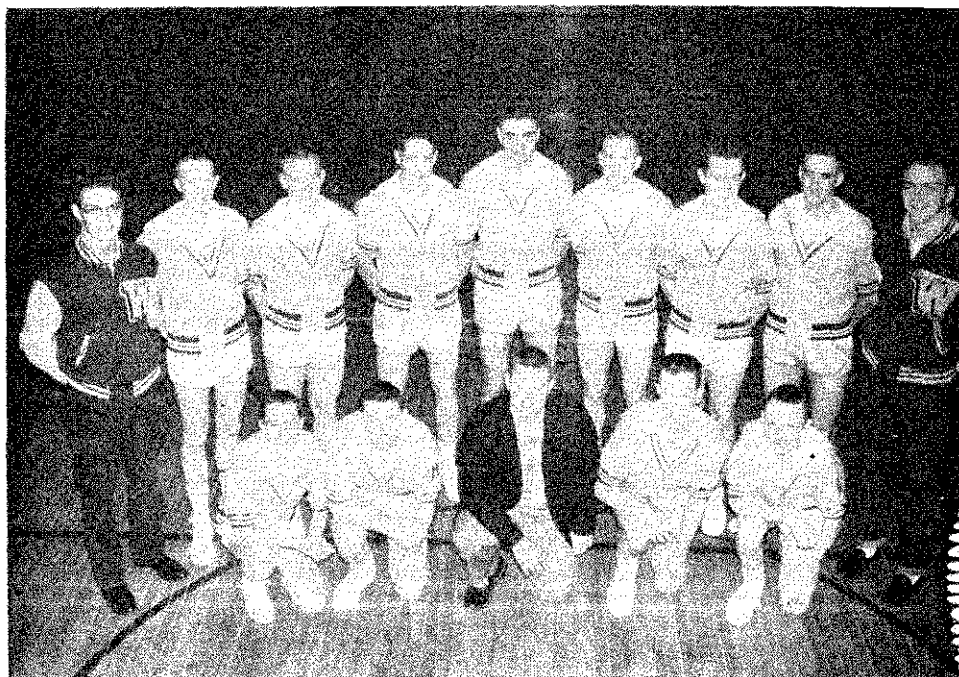
