





FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and does provide a complete review of events in the school year of 1963-1964. All statewide events in which championships are determined are summarized and listed in the order they occurred.

By saving year books, member schools could have a complete summary of the Association since it was formed in December 1905. This does not mean that a Year Book has been published each year since 1905. The first Year Book was published in 1927 and contained a summary of events from the beginning through the school year of 1926-27. The second such publication was in 1934, the third in 1940, again in 1942 and in 1946. Since 1946 the Year Book has been an annual publication.

Pictures of teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won state-wide events are shown. There have been a few missed, because of photographic failures, and this year is no exception, we have missed a few individuals. Their names, of course, will appear in the summaries.

We sincerely hope each school has been and will continue to file their copies of the Year Book as a rather complete history of the Association will be on file in each member school.

Starting July 1, 1937, R. M. Walseth was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association, with office space in the Department of Public Instruction in the Statehouse in Pierre. Because of expansion in the Department of Public Instruction, and a consequent lack of space, it was necessary to move the SDHSAA office. Space was rented in the St. Charles Hotel and the office was moved in January of 1946, where it remained until November 1957. Then it was moved to permanent quarters in the SDEA building at 411 E. Capital Avenue in Pierre.

With the Association changing from an "Athletic Association" to an "Activities Association," it was necessary to add additional help. Mr. D. W. Evans was named Assistant Executive Secretary July 1, 1962, and additional office space was secured in the SDEA building.

REVIEW OF SDHSIAA EVENTS 1963-1964

Following, you will find a very brief mention of the events and affairs of the SDHSIAA for the year of 1963-1964. A complete summary of all state wide events, with pictures, will be found on other pages of this "Year Book".

1963-1964 is the third year the Association has been an "Activities Association" and therefore the events mentioned and summarized are for both athletic and non-athletic events. Separate sections in this book will be used.

1963-1964 has been a good year, it is apparent that the non-athletic activities programs have grown, more students participated and there seems to be complete harmony existing in the several activities. Athletics continue to be strong with a very noticable change for the better on the local management and conduct of local events. We feel that schools at the local level, committees operating district, region and sectional events are doing a terrific job. The management and handling of events, both in athletic and non-athletic activities at the state level is just plain outstanding. The Board of Control wishes to thank these numerous people serving on Committees for the wonderful work they have done.

Our interscholastic athletic program seems to continue to get better. Major sports continue strong. Cross-Country and Wrestling have exhibited growth. It has been necessary to divide Cross-Country into two classes and add region elimination series for Wrestling.

The Press Association Meeting in Brookings was very well attended, and students participating received valuable help in preparation for work on their school papers and Year Books.

The All-State Chorus and Orchestra, and the All-State Band, while not projects of the SDHSIAA, although closely related, were splendid events and the Music Educators and Band Masters are to be congratulated on these wonderful events.

Speech work has shown steady growth. The numbers participating was gratifying and more schools are participating than ever before.

Student Councils have made some progress during 1963-1964. There were two work-shops—one in the West River Area and one in the East River Area. In addition a State Convention was held in Pierre. A conflict in dates and bad weather cut the number attending the State Convention.

While there is no state-wide music contest, the region events continue to attract numerous schools to the solo and small ensemble events as well as those contests for band and vocal groups.

Wrestling has shown great growth, the number of schools participating forced region elimination tournaments to qualify for the State Tournament. Reports show these region tournaments to be very popular. The State Tournament had 16 in each weight class.

Basketball, as far as varsity competition is concerned, cannot grow since all member schools do participate. There is a noticeable gain in the number participating by the growth of more inter-school competition below the varsity level.

Track continues to blossom, while the number in the State Meet is quite constant, the quality seems to get better and more and more schools are participating in local meets and in the Region Meets.

The Annual Coaching School was outstanding and was well attended. The spring Track Clinic drew its largest crowd for the 1964 school.

Football and Basketball Rules Meetings for coaches and officials were well attended and in addition two Wrestling Rules Meetings were held, with an increase in this number planned for 1964-1965.

Following the regular Annual Meeting of the SDHSIAA, several amendments were passed which will be explained later in this Year Book and Mr. A. H. Mortenson, Superintendent of Schools at Belle Fourche was elected to the Board to succeed Mr. Crosswait of Hot Springs, who left the state; and Amos Tschetter, Superintendent of Schools at Arlington was re-elected to succeed himself on the Board.

The "B" State Tournament was played in the new Sioux Falls Arena and was again a very popular event. Since the Tournament was "sold out" in advance, all championship round games were televised.

The "A" State Tournament was played in Huron again and was, perhaps, the finest "A" Tournament ever played.

The State "A" & "B" Track Meets, held in Huron, were wonderful. Weather was excellent, the management near perfect and the competitors responded with many outstanding records and close competition.

The Golf & Tennis Tournaments for 1964 were outstanding. For the first year the number of golfers was cut to 32, since elimination tournaments were held in each of the eight track regions, with four from each region qualifying for the event.

About the same number of tennis players participated in 1964 as in 1963. The quality of play was good.

Board of Control Meeting

Huron — Aug. 13, 1963

The meeting was the first of the new year and Mr. R. W. Monfore was renamed Chairman. Mr. H. B. Ashbaugh was again elected as Vice-Chairman. The meeting was to preview the approaching New Year, to discuss amendments to be proposed and to review finances.

1963 Coaching School

Huron—Aug. 14, 15, 16, 1963

The 1963 Clinic featured Football Coach Bob Devaney of Nebraska; Bill Rohr, Basketball Coach at Northwestern; Bob Mancuso of Nebraska on Wrestling; John "Rusty" Payne, Trainer from Kentucky; and the coaches of the 1963 Class "A" and "B" basketball championship teams, Jack Theeler of Sisseton and Marv Rasmussen of Alexandria.

Over two hundred coaches took advantage of the school and were treated to some of the finest instruction on the several sports that anyone could hear. We feel that the staff was outstanding.

Another feature was a talk on coaches' responsibility to his boys by Doctor Ted Hohm of Huron. Dr. Hohm, a former athlete, gave those in attendance much to think about. He was terrific.

All sessions of the 1963 school were held in air-conditioned comfort in the "Inn". We deeply appreciate the hospitality and the friendly spirit extended to the coaches by the management of this hotel.

1963 Football Rules Meetings

Each year since 1938, excepting three World War II years, the Association has sponsored a series of football meetings for coaches and officials. No doubt similar meetings will be held annually from now on. In 1963 meetings were held at Aberdeen, Brookings, Custer, Dupree, Huron, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Mitchell, Mobridge, Philip, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sturgis, Vermillion, Watertown and Winner.

Attendance cards counted after the meetings indicate 1012 did attend the meetings.

1963 Cross Country Run

Since cross country running has increased in popularity it became necessary to cut the number participating, or to divide the event into classes. The latter was done and the result proved good for the event. It was possible to have two (2) fine events instead of one real crowded event. With ideal weather there were 67 runners from 21 "B" schools and 91 runners from 24 "A" schools.

Philip Bearface of Wakpala won the "B" division and Paul Moss of the Flandreau Indian High School was the individual winner in the "A" Class. Moss established a new record of 10:52.8 on the alternate course used this year because of water. Moss now holds the record for the old course of 11:25.5 as well as for the alternate course.

The Flandreau Indian runners also won the team competition with a remarkable record of 6 points, 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Erwin High School won team honors for the "B" event with 19 points.

Cross Country Coach, Tom Woodall of S. D. State College organized and managed the eighteenth running of the SDHSIAA Cross Country Run.

1963 Basketball Rules Meetings

Starting Oct. 22 and ending Nov. 7, your Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary conducted twenty Basketball Rules Meetings for coaches and officials. Meetings were held in Aberdeen, Chamberlain, Dupree, Gettysburg, Hot Springs, Huron, Kadoka, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Madison, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sisseton, Sturgis, Watertown, White River, Winner and Yankton.

At each meeting rule changes were discussed and explained. Old rules were reviewed, methods and mechanics of officiating were discussed. We believe coaches and officials have a better understanding of the rules and that officiating is more uniform. 1149 attendance cards were turned in. This number is under the attendance for 1962 but still is quite gratifying.

Board of Control Meeting

Pierre, Nov. 15, 1963

The Board of Control has a regularly scheduled meeting the day prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association. At this meeting plans for the conduct of the Annual Meeting the following day are reviewed and other routine business taken care of. There will be a complete section on Board of Control Actions in another section of this Year Book.

Regular Annual SDHSIAA Meeting

Pierre, Saturday, Nov. 16, 1963

Thirty-nine (39) member schools of the SDHSIAA sent delegates to the Annual Meeting in Pierre, Saturday, Nov. 16, 1964. The meeting was held in the auditorium of the SDEA Building. These representatives heard reports and discussed the amendments which had been previously presented and made nominations for two positions on the Board of Control.

Six amendments had been properly presented and after the mail ballot, following the annual meeting, five of the amendments received the necessary 2/3 majority to carry. Briefly the amendments passing are as follows: (1) Transfer of funds from all associations to SDHSIAA treasury; (2) adding an Associated School Board Member to the Board of Control of the SDHSIAA; (3) change in the start of pre-season football practice; (4) schools shall not play their first football game until after two weeks of practice and (5) change the "A" classification for track from 150 and over to 200 and over.

Nominations for Board Members: For a regular five year term, Supt. Amos Tschetter of Arlington and Principal Donald Varcoe were nominated. Principal Varcoe withdrew later and Supt. Tschetter was the winner without opposition.

For an unexpired term starting after election and running to July 1, 1965: Principal Ben Rossow of Sioux Falls, Supt. L. F. Thomas of Lake Andes and Supt. A. H. Mortenson of Belle Fourche were nominated. In the balloting, Mr. Thomas and Mr. Mortenson were forced into a run-off election, which Mr. Mortenson won.

Board of Control Meeting

Pierre, Jan. 15, 1964

A special meeting of the Board of Control was called in Pierre on Jan. 15, 1964. The main reason for the meeting was because of the

introduction of House Bill #513. Ways and means of combating the bill were discussed. Other routine business was transacted. Again a complete list of Board Actions will be found in another section of this "Year Book".

Board of Control Meeting

Pierre, Jan. 16, 1964

A threatened law suit because of the ineligibility ruling of the Board on Dwight Hofer of Freeman, was the reason for the Jan. 16 meeting of the Board. Attorney Lloyd Mahan of Parkston discussed the eligibility case with the Board. Mr. Mahan was informed by the Board that the decision could not be changed.

State Wrestling Tournament

Watertown, Feb. 28 and 29, 1964

With the rapid growth of wrestling it had become necessary to divide the state into four regions and the first four in each weight class in each of the regions did qualify for the State Tournament, thus making 16 contestants in each of the twelve weight classes. Apparently the region method was quite satisfactory and all but three of the qualifiers did take part in the fifth annual State High School Wrestling Tournament.

The State Wrestling Tournament was an outstanding event. Director Clar Lilevjen and his staff ran the event with clock-like precision. Rapid City was the team winner with Spearfish second, Redfield third and Sioux Falls fourth.

A complete summary with pictures will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

1964 State Legislature

The SDHSIAA was first in the State Legislature in 1961, at which time a bill was introduced which would change the Association in several ways. This bill did get to the House Floor where it was defeated by a goodly margin. Again in the 1963 State Legislature, the bill introduced in 1961 was again up, as well as several other bills all of which were defeated, but one getting to the House floor.

A joint resolution was passed at this session, asking that the SDHSIAA again present an amendment to the member schools of the Association, which would make all accredited high schools eligible to membership in the SDHSIAA. This was done and the membership again rejected the amendment by a vote of 133 to 102.

One of the first bills thrown into the House hopper in the 1964 annual session was House Bill #513, which would make all accredited high schools eligible to membership in the SDHSIAA. Tremendous pressure was put on the legislators and as a result the bill did pass both houses and was signed by the Governor and therefore will become effective July 1, 1964.

Board of Control Meeting
Sioux Falls, March 14, 1964

The purpose of this meeting was to meet with Attorney Sam Masten of Canton who had been employed by the Association to meet with Governor Gubbrud before the Governor had signed House Bill #513. Mr. Masten reported on his meeting with the Governor and advised the Board on action they could take should they wish to contest the Bill in the courts.

State "B" Basketball Tournament
Sioux Falls, March 12, 13, 14, 1964

On other pages of this Year Book you will find a complete report of the "B" State Basketball Tournament which was won by the great Howard team. Scotland was the runner-up.

The tournament was an outstanding success in all ways. The tournament was televised by both Sioux Falls Television Stations.

We must make mention of the efficient manner in which Director of Athletics, Wallace M. Diehl of Washington High School and his staff handled this tournament.

Board of Control Meeting
Huron, March 18, 1964

The meeting was a regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Control. House Bill #513 was further discussed and much routine business was transacted. A complete summary of Board of Control Actions will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

State "A" Basketball Tournament
Huron, March 19, 20, 21, 1964

The 1964 State "A" Basketball Tournament was, without doubt, one of the most closely contested tournaments ever held, with Mitchell coming out the Champion.

We are deeply indebted to Clyde Cotton and his staff for the efficient way the tournament was managed. A complete report, on both tournaments, will be found on other pages of this Year Book.

1964 Track Clinic
Mitchell, March 28, 1964

The sixth annual Track and Field Clinic was held in Mitchell on March 28, 1964. Attendance was excellent with 121 coaches registered for the Clinic.

Coach Dick Young of Grinnell College handled the Clinic and did an outstanding job. Coaches were enthusiastic about the way Mr. Young instructed on track.

The site for the 1965 Clinic has not been determined but the date will probably be March 27, 1965.

1964 State Track Meet

Huron, May 22, 23, 1964

Weather was ideal, the track was fast and one of the greatest groups of competitors ever, made the 1964 event one of the finest. Several all-time records were set. Clyde Cotton, Athletic Director at the Huron High School did a beautiful job of managing the meet.

Rapid City High School won the "A" meet with Canton second. In the "B" event, Irene High School was the winner, closely followed by Hoven.

1964 State Golf Tournament

Huron, May 22, 23, 1964

Thirty-two golfers, qualifiers from the eight region tournaments, participated in the annual SDHSIAA State Golf Tournament. Ted Milford of Huron was the winner with a score of 143 for the 36 holes of play. Dale Scott of Watertown and Roger Southmayd of Madison were tied for second with 155.

The golf tournament was played at the Huron Country Club with Pro Hobe Richards handling the tournament.

1964 State Tennis Tournament

Huron, May 22, 23, 1964

Twenty singles players and 10 doubles teams participated in the 1964 SDHSIAA State Tennis Tournament. Skip Spensley of Washington High School of Sioux Falls defeated Van Fishback of Brookings in the finals to become the singles champion. Spensley, with teammate Rich Stevenson, won the doubles championship for Washington High School, defeating a team from Rapid City composed of Jim Van Gerpen and John Waltman, in the finals of the doubles tournament.

Henry Hulst of the Huron High School ably managed and conducted the tournament. A summary will be found elsewhere in this Year Book.

Board of Control Meetings

June 5 and 6, 1964—Sioux Falls

The final meetings of the Board of Control for 1963-1964 were held in Sioux Falls on June 5 and 6. These meetings were perhaps the most important of the year. The year's activities were reviewed and plans for the next year were formulated.

National Federation Annual Convention

Since the 1964 Annual Convention of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations was held in neighboring Wyoming, South Dakota was represented by its largest delegation. Chairman Monfore, Vice Chairman Ashbaugh, Members Mortenson and Tschetter, as well as Executive Secretary Walseth and Assistant Secretary Evans attended the meeting.

Chairman R. W. Monfore is a member of the Executive Committee of the National Federation and therefore represented the states in our area as well as South Dakota.

Forty-eight states and three Canadian Provinces had delegates to the Convention.

Board of Control Actions

1963-1964

There were seven meetings of the Board of Control during the school year. This number is greater than normal. However, it was necessary to have several meetings because of the legislature and a possible law suit.

Board of Control officers for 1964-65 elected were Supt. R. W. Monfore of Springfield Chairman, Supt. H. B. Ashbaugh, Vermillion, Vice Chairman. R. M. Walseth, by the By-Laws of the SDHSIAA, is Secretary-Treasurer of the Board and Association.





THE 1964 TOURNAMENTS

Two new champions were crowned in the 1964 "B and "A" Tournaments. Howard was the "B" winner and Mitchell secured the "A" title. Both of these schools had previously won state championships, but for each it was some time ago. Howard was the "B" champion in 1956, and since the "A" and "B" classifications, Mitchell has won the "A" title three previous times—in 1940, and in 1948, the last time was in 1950.

Our congratulations to Howard and to Mitchell. Both schools certainly deserved to win, and there is little doubt in anyone's mind that these teams deserved to be champions. They came to play and that is exactly what they did.

Howard was a very good team, which, we believe, compares very favorably with any of the previous great "B" teams. The team was sound, it had size and good all-around balanced power. Coach Jim Cordts did a wonderful job with this team. They knew what to do, both offensively and defensively, and they certainly got the job done. Again we say that this Howard team is a fine addition to the fine "B" champions of the past.

Mitchell was a fine team. They also possessed good size. They also had speed, poise and "know how", and never did lose their poise, even though were tense times for them during the tournament. Coach Bob Brooks had his team ready. He did a beautiful job during the season and getting ready for the tournament.

While each game has its winner and each tournament has its champion, we cannot pass up the tournaments without mention of the calibre of play in these tournaments by the other teams. Both tournaments were exciting and close, the "A" Tournament especially. It was so close that any one of the eight teams could have been the champion.

On other pages of this bulletin you will find the results of District, Region, Section and State Tournaments, including financial reports and pictures of the sixteen teams in the two state tournaments. It was a great basketball season.

In 1964 the "B" Tournament was played in the new Sioux Falls Arena and the "A" Tournament returned to the fine Huron Arena. The "B" Tournament was sold out several weeks ahead of the event, and all championship round games were televised. The "A" Tournament was not sold out except for the final night, but after this tournament of 1964, look out in 1965!

The management of the tournaments in Sioux Falls and in Huron was wonderful. Managers of the tournaments in both cities did everything possible to handle the crowds and to see that everything ran well, and we must say that both jobs were well done.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1905 and from that time until 1912, competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the SDHSAA, Huron College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament, open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1939, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1935 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this set-up the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1936.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" set-up, including, taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1936 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1951 the present plan was started whereby the 32 largest high schools, by enrollments, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" set-up is that, while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

For the 1961 "A" Tournaments a change was made in the method of qualifying teams to the State "A" Tournament. This change, briefly was as follows: The make up of schools in the "A" Sections was left as it had been in recent years, however a double elimination Section Tournament was played with two teams from each section qualifying for the new "Sub-State" tournaments. Sections 1 and 2 formed Sub-State #1; Sections 3 and 4 formed Sub-State #2; Sections 5 and 6 formed Sub-State #3; and Sections 7 and 8 formed Sub-State #4. This placed four teams in each of the four Sub-State Tournaments and again double elimination tournaments were played with two teams from each Sub-State tournament qualifying for the State "A" Tournament.

The 1961 plan for "A" tournaments was discarded in 1962 and qualification for places in the State "A" Tournament was done by single elimination tournaments in each of eight (8) "A" Sections. The winner of each "A" Section qualified for the State "A" Tournament. This method was continued for the 1963 and 1964 tournaments.

Since the start of the "A" and "B" classification in 1936 there has been little change in the "B" set-up. We have continued to have 32 "B" Districts and 8 "B" Regions with the eight "B" Region winners qualifying for the State "B" Tournament. Of course there has had to be changes in districts and regions but the basic plan has been kept over the years.



1963-64 SDHSIAA EVENTS

Music Council Meeting

All eight music regions were represented at the annual meeting of the Music Council in Huron on September 14 with a total of 17 delegates and visitors in attendance.

Dave Evans, secretary-treasurer of the Music Association, reported that funds amounting to \$2,647.41 had been turned over to him and had been deposited in a savings account and a checking account, both in the Pierre National Bank.

E. C. Coddington of Spearfish, chairman of the Region VIII committee, reported the organization of an active program in Region VIII and outlined the committee's plans for a solo and ensemble contest in February.

No changes were made by the Council in contest regulations for 1963-64, although considerable discussion was centered on proposed changes.

Representatives from Region II reported the splitting of their solo and small ensemble contest into instrumental and vocal sections to be conducted on separate dates. Region V schedules its contests on a similar basis.

The Council went on record as recommending to the South Dakota Music Educators Association and to the Board of Control of the South Dakota High School Interscholastic Activities Association that students not be eligible to participate in the All-State Orchestra when they are not members of a related group in their own school, provided such a group is available in the school.

The officers of the Association were re-elected and include S. K. Lotspeich of Madison, president; E. O. Evenson of Aberdeen, vice president; and D. W. Evans of Pierre, secretary-treasurer.

1963 Press Convention

Young journalists from all over South Dakota gathered on the South Dakota State College campus at Brookings on Saturday, October 5, for the thirty-ninth annual convention of the South Dakota High School Press Association. Highlights of the convention program were an address by Fred C. Christopherson of Sioux Falls, presentation of the annual Founder's Award to Mrs. Dorothy Fosness of Watertown, and the announcement of winners in the annual publications contest.

As keynote speaker at the general assembly of the convention, Mr. Christopherson stated that he was impressed by the "tremendous potential" among the young journalists at the convention. He also stressed the responsibility of the press to ferret out the real facts of the news. He warned that news reporters must not manage news. The press should be a "mirror of the world, describing both that which is corrupt and that which is good." Mr. Christopherson now serves as a contributing editor for the Argus-Leader in Sioux Falls after having served for many years as its editor-in-chief.

The third annual Founder's award of the Supervisors of School Publications was presented to Mrs. Fosness who has served as a journalism adviser at Watertown High School for 16 years.

For the second year in a row, Sioux Falls Washington High School won top honors in the SDHSPA publications contest. The

sweepstakes award, announced at the close of the general session October 5, was presented to the Sioux Falls school by George Phillips, acting executive secretary of the SDHSPA.

Five schools were runners-up in the sweepstakes competition. Sioux Falls compiled a total of 996 points, while Freeman scored 959. Weston Consolidated at Amherst earned 951 points, followed by Huron with 948, Yankton with 943, and Mitchell Notre Dame with 941.

A total of 201 publications were entered, including 34 All-State winners. By category, there were 98 newspapers entered, with 15 All-State ratings; 101 yearbooks, with 18 All-State ratings; and two miscellaneous publications, with one All-State rating. A complete list of award winners in the contest will be found elsewhere in THE YEARBOOK.

Officers elected at the supervisors' luncheon meeting were Mrs. Elsie Haddock, Midland, president; Mrs. Amos Tschetter, Arlington first vice-president; and Larry Tennyson, Mission, second vice president.

A total of 591 students, representing 73 schools, registered for the convention. The high school journalists were accompanied by 66 advisers.

Declamation Contests

The declamation program continued to be the most popular high school speech program in South Dakota in 1963-64, although there were fewer schools participating than a year ago. One hundred ninety-six schools entered speakers in district and division contests as compared with 203 last year.

Of the students competing, 49 from 39 schools reached the state contest at Pierre on November 22 and 23. Superior ratings were earned by five contestants in the oratory section, five in the poetry section, four in the dramatic section, and five in the humorous section.

Bill Wilen, Sioux Falls Washington, was first in oratory; Nancy Lampert, Hecla, was first in poetry reading; Linda Walliser Burke, was first in dramatic reading; and Jean Duffy, Yankton, was first in humorous reading. A summary of the other superior ratings awarded are to be found elsewhere in THE YEAR BOOK.

Only three schools earned plaques at the state contest for having more than one speaker rated superior. They were Spearfish, Sioux Falls Washington, and Yankton. A year ago nine schools achieved this honor.

All-State Chorus and Orchestra

Vocalists from 158 of the Association's 246 member schools gathered in Aberdeen November 8 and 9 for the All-State Chorus. Twelve of these schools also provided the membership for the 114 piece All-State Orchestra which performed in conjunction with the chorus in the public concert presented Saturday evening in the Civic Arena. This autumn musical event is a project of the South Dakota Music Educators Association.

Membership in this year's chorus was cut to 882 from the record total of more than 1,200 a year ago.

Weston H. Noble, Chairman of the Department of Music at Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, directed the chorus through the

two days of practice and the concert. Howard Leyton-Brown, Director of the Regina Conservatory of Music in Canada, directed the work of the orchestra.

Responsibility for the success of the project rested upon the shoulders of Dr. Victor Weidensee, Chairman of the Fine Arts Division at Black Hills State College, Spearfish. Dr. Weidensee was ably assisted by Hosie Main, Rapid City, chairman of the orchestra committee, and Merlyn Aman, Aberdeen, chairman of the chorus committee.

Student Council Workshops and Convention

Two one-day workshops in the latter part of September and a state-wide convention in December were the major part of the state student council program for 1963-64. Rapid City and Huron High Schools served as hosts for the workshops. The convention was held in Pierre.

Eighty-two students and advisers from 15 schools participated in the West River meeting and 200 students and advisers from 31 schools attended the East River conference. Approximately 130 advisers and delegates from 22 schools braved cold blustery weather to attend the December state convention.

Gerald M. Van Pool, Director of Student Activities for the National Association of Student Councils provided the "meat" for both workshops. Dr. George E. Mathes, Educational Consultant and Principal of Morey Junior High School in Denver was principal speaker and consultant at the Pierre meeting.

State student council officers elected for 1964-65 include Lois Schnell, Lemmon, president; Martha Yunker, Sioux Falls Washington, vice president; Nancy Krutsch, Hot Springs, secretary; and Judy Hoffman, Pierre Riggs, treasurer.

Credit for the success of all three conferences must go to the student council leaders and advisers from the participating schools, particularly Rapid City, Huron, and Pierre Riggs, the host schools. Special mention must be made of Rapid City adviser Earl Prunty, Huron adviser D. C. Reutter, and Pierre adviser Sam Ruzick; and state officers David Greschke of Huron, Ralph Farrar of Rapid City, Roberta Clay of Hot Springs, and Martha Lothrop of Huron.

Plans for 1964-65 include three one-day workshops to be held at Rapid City, Watertown, and Parkston. All will be held on Saturday, September 26. A specialist in student council work will be a consultant at each conference.

Drama Program Continues Growth

Participation in the one-act play program continues to grow, although not at a fantastic rate. Twenty-eight schools entered the festivals in 1963-64 as compared with 24 the previous year. Again there was competition in each division and all four of the "big school" spots were filled in the state festival, which was held at Mitchell on January 24 and 25.

At the state festival three schools earned superior ratings with their presentations. They were Arlington, Sioux Falls Washington, and Lead. Other schools competing at Mitchell were Doland, Hudson, Aberdeen Central, Miller, Pierre Riggs, Spearfish, and Bonesteel.

Arlington presented "Still Stands the House" under the direction of Kenneth Hansen; Sioux Falls Washington staged "Impromptu" under the direction of L. R. Kremer; and Lead did "The Lottery" directed by Mrs. Janet McNall. Actors and actresses receiving superior ratings are listed elsewhere in THE YEARBOOK.

The State festival for 1965 has been set for January 29 and 30 and again will be held on the Dakota Wesleyan University campus in Mitchell.

Regional Music Contests

For the first time contests were scheduled in all eight music regions in the state but "Old Man Weather" knocked the newcomer to the group right off the calendar. In newly organized Region VIII, where only a solo and ensemble contest was planned, bad weather caused cancellation. However, the committee is proceeding with plans for the initial regional contest in the Black Hills area next February. Again it will include only solo and ensemble competition.

Contests in the other seven regions were held in February and April as scheduled. Perhaps a trend is developing in holding vocal and instrumental sections of the solo and ensemble contests at different times. Region II became the second region to adopt the practice when it scheduled the vocal section for February 1 and the instrumental section for February 5. Region V has done this for two years. On the other hand, Region IV held all of its contests, including large groups as well as solos and ensembles on successive days in April at Aberdeen. Region VII held its entire schedule of contests in one day at Kadoka.

Next year's contests have also been scheduled for February and April, most of them on corresponding dates. The weekend of April 9-10 has been reserved for the large group contests, although there is no regulation against their being scheduled at a different time.

Yankton and Avon Debaters Win Titles

Debaters from Yankton and Avon took top honors in the state high school forensics tournament which closed the speech season at Huron Wednesday afternoon, April 1. Yankton won the championship in Class "A" and Avon in Class "B". Sturgis was runner-up in Class "A" and Doland in Class "B".

Avon won the Class "B" crown without losing a debate in the double elimination system used. Doland, the runner-up, lost only to Avon. Doland has reigned as Class "B" champ the past three years. Virgil Petrik coached the Avon debaters and Don Mendel directed the Doland speakers.

Yankton and Sturgis showed their mastery over the rest of the field by losing only to each other. Yankton was the winner on a split decision in the show-down meeting for the title. A.P. Schenk coached the winning Yankton debaters and Paul Hall, the runner-up Sturgis team.

The question for debate throughout the season and for the tournament was Resolved: That social security benefits should be extended to include complete medical care.

Results of the original oratory and extempore speaking contests will be found elsewhere in THE YEARBOOK.

All-State Band

Each year as the All-State Band, under the baton of its guest conductor, plays the final notes of its annual concert, the average music lover in the audience marvels that in two short days any conductor can produce the results with a group of young musicians that the All-State's guest conductor invariably does. This year at Watertown was no exception. The 169 instrumentalists from 57 South Dakota Schools performed in outstanding fashion under the direction of Clarence E. Sawhill, Director of Bands at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Of course, it is no accident that such results are attained since the members of the band are carefully screened through a series of auditions held over the state. As was the case last year, Vermillion High School qualified the most performers for the band with 17. Flandreau qualified 13, Sioux Falls 12, Rapid City 8, Huron 7, Aberdeen 6 and Webster 5.

Responsibility for organizing the project rested upon the shoulders of Douglas Carpenter, Watertown band director. More than 2,000 people attended the concert Saturday evening in the Watertown school arena.

The All-State Band is scheduled for Sioux Falls next year on March 26 and 27.












