



REVIEW OF SHIPSTRA EVENTS FOR 1964-1965

The Shipler year will run from the end of the 1964 fiscal year to the end of the established 1965 fiscal year of October 31, 1965. The fiscal year will be divided into four quarters, each quarter consisting of three months and ending October 31, December 31, March 31, and June 30.

The year of 1964-1965 included the fourth year of the International Law program, the first year of the International Law program, the second year of the International Law program, and the third year of the International Law program.

Students in the fall semester will explore their legal studies either with individual study or through the number of optional international symposiums being given by the number of bars in the country which are in close proximity.





THE 1945 TOURNAMENTS

Two of the Inter-state basketball tournaments were held in 1945 and two of the tournaments were canceled. Alexandria High School was the 2nd place winner in the 1942 Washington State High School tournament.

A second time the state won the 1945 state basketball tournament high school class, this time with a score of 47 to 46 over the 12th Grade school team. This year the 12th grade school basketball team had won the WA state tournament in 1943 (65 to 60).

Our congratulations to Elementary and Senior High School basketball teams from Seattle, Auburn, Kent, Lakewood, Des Moines, Kent, Des Moines Valley, and Bothell. They won their respective state tournaments. We would like to add that with the large number of schools that have been eliminated through the champion.

Washington had a very good record in basketball this year. In fact, we are pleased with the record of our 12th grade high school basketball teams. Our thanks to the men who did the work at the state tournaments. Again we say, well done! And, let's hope for another year.

Washington High Schools' basketball record for the year 1945, in my mind was not the best. I believe that Coach DeGraff could still be coach by himself. HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS









New State of Vermont, Chapter 10, Section 108, 2000, will not be able to meet the "minimum standards" set by the state legislature. The minimum standards are intended to ensure children in the Free Association can be educated.

Opposition to the new state law has been strong. The House defeated the bill on September 19, 2000, 104-96. Last week, supporters of the law, including Senator Leahy, held a rally against the bill at the Statehouse in Montpelier.

Declarative Contexts










