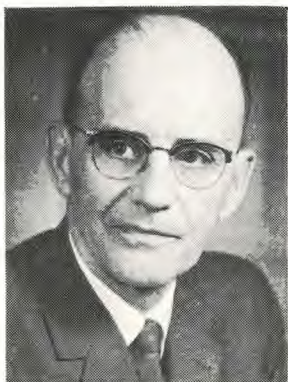

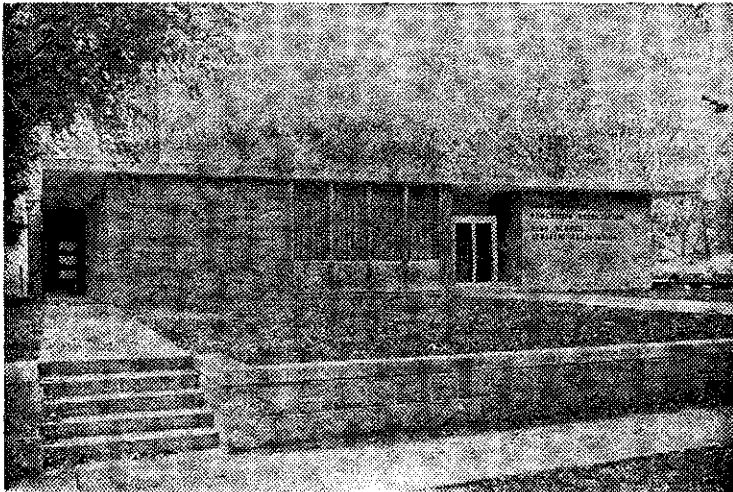

FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and does provide a complete review of events in the school year of 1967-1968. All statewide events in which championships are determined are summarized and listed in the order they occurred.

By saving year books, member schools could have a complete summary of the Association since it was formed in December 1905. This does not mean that a Year Book has been published each year since 1905. The first Year Book was published in 1927 and contained a summary of events from the beginning through the school year of 1926-27. The second such publication was in 1934, the third in 1940, again in 1942 and in 1946. Since 1946 the Year Book has been an annual publication.

Pictures of teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won state-wide events are shown. There have been a few missed, because of photographic failures, and this year is no exception, we have missed a few individuals. Their names, of course, will appear in the summaries.

We sincerely hope each school has been and will continue to file their copies of the Year Book as a rather complete history of the Association will be on file in each member school.

Starting July 1, 1937, R. M. Walseth was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association, with office space in the Department of Public Instruction in the Statehouse in Pierre. Because of expansion in the Department of Public Instruction, and a consequent lack of space, it was necessary to move the SDHSAA office. Space was rented in the St. Charles Hotel and the office was moved in January of 1946, where it remained until November 1957. Then it was moved to permanent quarters in the SDEA building at 411 E. Capital Avenue in Pierre.

With the Association changing from an "Athletic Association" to an "Activities Association," it was necessary to add additional help. Mr. D. W. Evans was named Assistant Executive Secretary July 1, 1962, and additional office space was secured in the SDEA building.

REVIEW OF SDHSAA EVENTS FOR 1967-1968

1967-1968 was the seventh year that the Association has been operated as an "Activities Association" and therefore the events mentioned and summarized are for all activities, not only athletics. Looking back over the year, we believe it was a good year, and we are quite proud of the progress shown in the many activities. There seems to be complete harmony existing, all conflicts cannot be entirely eliminated but we feel great progress has been made.

Even though all activities are directed from a central office, these activities could not be effectively administered without the use of committees made up of dedicated people who are interested in seeing that the particular activity does go well. Think of the many tournaments, meets and contests leading up to the state events. They could not be properly operated without your great help. The Board of Control, the Executive Secretary, and the Assistant Executive Secretary wish to thank the many people so efficiently serving on the numerous committees. You have done a great job and again, "Thank you!"

The interscholastic program seems to improve with age. There is evidence of greater participation by more students each year in all activities. We will not try to single out any activity, but all seem to grow and get better.

We believe the transition from an Athletic Association to the Activities Association was good, and with your continued cooperation there is no reason why the entire program should not get better.

1967-1968 SDHSAA EVENTS

ATHLETIC

1967 COACHING SCHOOL

Huron, August 14, 15, 16, 1967

The Annual Coaching School continued to be one of the outstanding schools of its kind in the nation. Over 250 attended all or part of the School. The talent was great. Eddie Crowder, Athletic Director and Football Coach at the University of Colorado, handled all football sessions, with Teddy Owens of Kansas taking care of the basketball, along with our own championship coaches Dave Wolsky of Milbank and Jim Flevares of Tripp. Ray McGuire of Aurora, Colorado handled all sessions on wrestling.

For the third year the South Dakota Medical Association provided the coaches with a remarkable session on "Medical Aspects in Sports." Dr. Saylor of Huron, Dr. Lewis of Mitchell and Dr. Henderson of the Mayo Clinic of Rochester headed up this part of the program. The entire School was an outstanding success.

All sessions were held in the air-conditioned "Elks Ballroom" in the Marvin Hughitt Hotel.

1967 FOOTBALL RULES MEETINGS

With the exception of the World War II years, Football Rules Meetings for officials and coaches have been held continuously since 1938. The 1967 Meetings were held in Aberdeen, Brookings, Custer, Faith, Huron, Mitchell, Mobridge, Philip, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sturgis, Vermillion, Wagner, Watertown, and Winner.

247 officials, 352 coaches, and 248 others interested in football attended the meetings which were conducted by Mr. Walseth and Mr. Evans. These meetings will be continued in 1968 at the same sites.

1967 CROSS COUNTRY RUN

Because of the number of contestants in the Annual Cross Country Run, it has become necessary to have elimination meets or increase the number of classes in Cross Country. The 1967 Meet was run in three classes for the first time and worked out very well, except for rather cool and windy weather.

149 runners from forty schools competed in the "B" Class, with 104 runners from twenty-two schools taking part in the "A" Class, and 96 runners from sixteen schools ran in the "AA" event; thus making a total of 349 runners from 78 schools involved in the Meet.

Loren Kambestad of Bristol won the "B" individual honors with Timber Lake edging the School for the Deaf for the team championship in the "B" Class. In the "A" Class, Myron Young Dog of Pine Ridge was the individual champion with Clear Lake a rather easy team champion. In the "AA" Class, Rick Birdin Ground of the Flandreau Indian School out-distanced the field for individual honors, and the Flandreau Indian School also won the team honors for the "AA" Class.

The Meet was ably handled by Track and Cross Country Coach Aubrey Dooley of South Dakota State University. A complete summary with pictures of winners will be found on other pages of this YEAR BOOK.

1967 BASKETBALL RULES MEETINGS

Basketball Rules Meetings for officials, coaches, and other interested people were conducted by your Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary in eighteen different cities. Meetings were held in Aberdeen, Chamberlain, Dupree, Hot Springs, Huron, Kadoka, Lake Andes, Lemmon, Madison, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sisseton, Sturgis, Watertown, Winner, and Yankton.

At each of these meetings rule changes were discussed and explained, and the mechanics of officiating stressed. 455 officials, 375 coaches and 283 others attended the meetings.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Pierre—November 17 and 18, 1967

The first regular meeting of the Board of Control for the 1967-1968 school year was held in Pierre on the day before the Annual Meeting of the Association. Reports were made by Mr. Walseth and Mr. Evans and routine matters were handled. A complete summary of Board of Control actions will be found on other pages of this YEAR BOOK.

THE ANNUAL SDHSAA MEETING

Pierre—Buchanan School

Saturday, November 18, 1967

Twenty-nine (29) member schools of the SDHSAA were officially represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association. Reports on the previous year and an explanation of the audit were made by Executive Secretary R. M. Walseth.

Two amendments were discussed at the meeting, and nomination for a regular five (5) year term on the Board of Control to succeed Chairman H. B. Ashbaugh, who was ineligible for reelection were made. Those nominated for the term were Principal Bruce Crockett of Mitchell, Supt. Leo J. Uken of Willow Lake, and Supt. Virgil Brugger of Centerville. For a four (4) year, unexpired term to which Supt. A. A. Thompson of Pierre had been appointed, nominations were made for Supt. Thompson and Supt. Donald Flakus of Menno.

Supt. Maurice Haugland of Murdo was then nominated for an unexpired three (3) year term to which he had been appointed. His was the only nomination.

Supt. Deane M. Antoine was then nominated for an unexpired term of one year, to which he had been previously appointed. There were no other nominations.

FOOTBALL SPECIAL COMMITTEE MEETING

Atlanta, Georgia

December 4 and 5, 1967

Your Executive Secretary was appointed to a Special Football Committee representing the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations which met with a similar committee from the NCAA Football Rules group at Atlanta, Georgia on December 4 and 5, 1967. The purpose of the meeting was to study differences in the two football codes to see if differences between the codes could be brought closer together. Progress was made as shown by changes in both codes.

Representing the High School Football Committee were Mr. Sam Burke of Georgia, Chairman of the National Alliance Football Committee, Mr. Clifford Fagan of Chicago, Secretary of the National Alliance Football Committee, and Mr. Walseth of South Dakota. The NCAA committee was made up of Mr. Ivy Williamson of Wisconsin, Chairman of the NCAA Football Committee, Mr. Dave Nelson of Delaware, Secre-

tary of the NCAA Football Committee, and Mr. John Waldorf of Kansas City, Supervisor of Officials for the Big Eight Conference and Chairman-Elect of the NCAA Football Rules Committee.

RESULT OF REFERENDUM VOTE ON AMENDMENTS AND ELECTION OF BOARD OF CONTROL MEMBERS

As stated previously in the notes on the Annual Meeting of the Association, two amendments were discussed. According to the Constitution and By-Laws of the SDHSAA, voting on amendments and the election of Board Members is by mail ballot. When ballots were counted on January 2, 1968, both amendments received a favorable vote and will become effective July 1, 1968. The amendments briefly, are: First; the size of the Board of Control will be increased by one member and certain size schools will be represented on the Board in the future. The complete new amendment will be a part of the Constitution and By-Laws and will be printed in the new edition of the book, and therefore will not be explained here. The second amendment provides that there shall be three classes in Track. This also will be published in the new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws.

Board of Control members elected after the mail ballot are as follows: For the five year term: Supt. Uken of Willow Lake. For the four year unexpired term: Supt. Flakus of Menno. Supt. Haugland of Murdo was the only nominee for the unexpired three year term, and Supt. Antoine of Baltic was the only nominee for the unexpired one year term. They were automatically elected and their names were not on the ballots.

1968 NATIONAL ALLIANCE FOOTBALL RULES MEETING AND EXECUTIVE OFFICERS' MEETING

Las Vegas, Nevada, January 4, 5, and 6

Your Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary were official delegates to these meetings. Mr. Walseth is the official representative on the Football Committee and Chairman of the Equipment Sub-Committee of this Football Committee. 1968 STATE WRESTLING TOURNAMENT Watertown—February 23 and 24

The State Wrestling Tournament has developed into quite an event, and the 1968 tournament was no exception. It was a great event. The contestants seem to get better and crowd interest is higher than ever before. The receipts for the 1968 Tournament exceeded the receipts of any previous wrestling tournament.

The 1968 Tournament was won by Watertown with 76 points. Rapid City was second with 67 points. Third and fourth places were shared by Yankton and Gregory each with 38 points. Thirty-three schools scored one or more points in the Tournament, while 13 schools did not score.

1968 STATE GOLF TOURNAMENT

Fifty-two golfers from the eight regions qualified for the State High School Golf Tournament and all competed in the State Tournament. H. L. Saylor, Jr. of Huron was the medalist with Eric Reimers of Brookings the runner-up.

Team competition for golf was changed before the 1968 Tournament. A four-man team qualified from each region, with Rapid City winning this first team championship. Brookings was the runner-up team.

Weather conditions were terrible for the two-day tournament, but remarkably good scores were posted. Jim Luce of Washington High School and Doug Flynn of Lincoln High School managed the Golf Tournament which was played at Elmwood. A summary with pictures will be found on other pages of this book.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Pierre—June 7 and 8, 1968

The last of three regularly scheduled meetings of the Board of Control for the school year of 1967-1968 was held in Pierre on June 7 and 8. The events of the year were reviewed and plans were made for 1968-1969. Much business was transacted and a rather complete summary of actions taken at all meetings follows:

The three regular meetings of the Board were in Pierre, November 17 and 18, 1967; in Sioux Falls March 13, 15 and 16, 1968 and in Pierre on June 7 and 8, 1968.

Officers of the Board for 1967-1968 were Supt. H. B. Ashbaugh, Vermillion, Chairman; Supt. A. H. Mortenson, Belle Fourche, Vice Chairman; and R. M. Walseth, Treasurer, as provided for in the Constitution of the SDHSAA. Since Mr. Ashbaugh's term on the Board of Control ends July 1, 1968, Dr. M.A. Auld of Yankton was elected Chairman for the year of 1968-1969. No Vice Chairman was elected at the June meeting and R. M. Walseth will continue as treasurer.

Following are actions taken by the Board at the meetings during the year. These actions are listed as they were made and not in the order of their importance.

- (1) Set dates for Coaching School in Huron—August 12, 13, 14, 1968.
- (2) Set date for 1968 Cross Country Run at Brookings—October 1.
- (3) Appointed members on Advisory Committee for Journalism and Speech.
- (4) Made a ruling on newly reorganized districts and possibly reorganized school districts as far as student eligibility is concerned.
- (5) Ruled Galen Bullshoe of Flandreau Indian School as a transfer student and therefore ineligible for one year.
- (6) Made minor changes in 1968-1969 "B" districts.
- (7) Because of earlier dates for the State Wrestling Tournament, allowed wrestling schools to have first dual meets the last week of November.
- (8) Authorized R. M. Walseth travel to Atlanta, Georgia, at National Federation expense.
- (9) Approved for consideration by member schools athletic insurance.
- (10) Accepted Huron invitation to host the 1969 State Wrestling Tournament.
- (11) Made slight changes in "B" districts for 1968-1969.
- (12) Appointed two new members to the Advisory Committee for Girls' Athletics.
- (13) Authorized a second meeting for this committee.
- (14) Accepted the Sioux Falls invitation to host the 1969 "B" and "A" State Basketball Tournament.
- (15) Made several changes in the State Track Meet. They are as follows: (a) 440 in lanes; (b) Allow two milers to compete in field event; (c) Adopted standards for the "A" and "B" two mile run; (d) Adopted standards for low hurdles if run around a curve; (e) Will run preliminary

inaries in 880 yard run; (f) Divide mile run into slow and fast sections; (g) If three preliminary heats are necessary qualify two from each heat plus two fastest times; (h) Made slight changes and clarified substitution rule in relays. (16) Adopted Minnesota's rule on protests. (17) Reviewed Forestburg protest on District Tournament game. (18) Authorized Mr. Haugland, Mr. Evans, and Mr. Walseth to attend National Federation Convention. (19) Made slight changes in methods of certifying officials. (20) Set salaries for Executive Secretary, Assistant Executive Secretary, and office help. (21) Ruled that in girls' track meets, no girl shall run any event longer than 220 yards, and competition be limited to three events. (22) Decided that for 1969 track, each of the three classes be divided into eight regions. (23) Decided to hold the "AA", "A", and "B" State Track Meets together. (24) Accepted Rapid City's invitation to host the 1969 State Track Meet, the Golf Tournament and the Tennis Tournament. (25) Added an extra member to Advisory Committee on track. (26) Will provide medals for Region Golf Tournaments. (27) Will provide additional trophies for State Golf and Tennis. (28) Accepted several recommendations for girls' athletics, including Region and State Track Meets, and State Golf and Tennis. (29) Appointed Donus Roberts of Watertown as South Dakota's representative to NAEA Meeting in Chicago. (30) Appointed new members on Advisory Committees for Student Council, Speech, Press and Music. (31) Appointed a new member to Wrestling Committee. (32) Changed some wrestling regulations. (33) Increased expense allowances for Board of Control, Executive Secretary, Assistant Executive Secretary, and Advisory Committees. (34) Increased expense allowances of contestants and coaches to State Wrestling Tournament. (35) Made changes in distribution of students tickets to State "B" Basketball Tournament. (36) Set up a rotation for tickets to competing teams in the "B" Basketball Tournament. (37) Discussed the new amendments. (38) Appointed Supt. Kenneth Hauge as a member of the Board of Control to replace Mr. Mortenson who is retiring on July 1. (39) Approved the financial reports of the Treasurer for 1967-68 and adopted a proposed budget for 1968-1969. (40) Studied membership in the Association of schools which might lose their accreditation. (41) Expressed thanks and appreciation to retiring Board Members Mr. Ashbaugh, Mr. Mortenson, and Mr. Thompson. (42) Set the date for the Annual Meeting of the Association as October 9, 1968 in Sioux Falls.

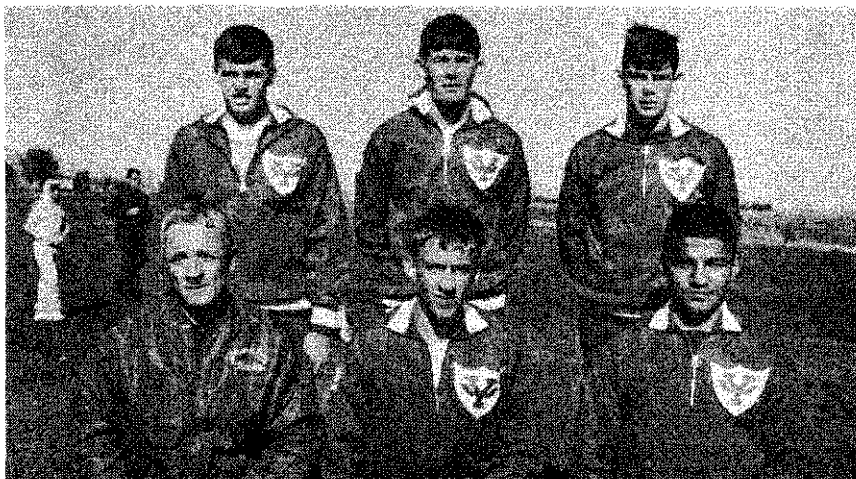

1968 TOURNAMENTS

The 1968 Basketball Tournaments are now history and while it may seem impossible, each tournament seems to get better. Games played are interesting and close, and the tournament management also improves with age. New innovations keep cropping up to make each tournament better than preceding tournaments.

The 1968 tournaments produced two fine championship teams—Arlington in the "B" and Brookings in the "A". Arlington defeated Clark in the first round of the "B" Tournament in a fine game, and then beat Onida in the semi-finals in another real good contest, and then took the great Parker team in the finals.

Brookings, the "A" Champion, just squeaked by Lead in the first round, and then eliminated Watertown in the semi-finals in a game that was close up to the middle of the third quarter. In the finals they defeated Sioux Falls Lincoln, a great team, in the closing parts of the game.

Our congratulations to the schools and their coaches—Bill Herich of Arlington and Ken Thury of Brookings. They had their teams ready to play.

On other pages of this YEAR BOOK you will find scores of games in the two tournaments and pictures of all teams with their season's records.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1905 and from that time until 1912, competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the SDHSAA, Huron College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament, open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1924 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1939, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1935 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this set-up the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1936.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" set-up, including, taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1951-1952 season. During the transition from 1936 to 1951, the four largest schools in four geographical areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1951 the present plan was started whereby the 32 largest high schools, by enrollments, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" set-up is that, while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

For the 1961 "A" Tournaments a change was made in the method of qualifying teams to the State "A" Tournament. This change, briefly was as follows: The make up of schools in the "A" Sections was left as it had been in recent years, however a double elimination Section Tournament was played with two teams from each section qualifying for the new "Sub-State" tournaments. Sections 1 and 2 formed Sub-State #1; Sections 3 and 4 formed Sub-State #2; Sections 5 and 6 formed Sub-State #3; and Sections 7 and 8 formed Sub-State #4. This placed four teams in each of the four Sub-State Tournaments and again double elimination tournaments were played with two teams from each Sub-State tournament qualifying for the State "A" Tournament.

The 1961 plan for "A" tournaments was discarded in 1962 and qualification for places in the State "A" Tournament was done by single elimination tournaments in each of eight (8) "A" Sections. The winners of each "A" Section qualified for the State "A" Tournament. This method was continued for the 1968 and 1969 Tournaments.

Since the start of the "A" and "B" classification in 1936 there has been little change in the "B" set-up. We have continued to have 32 Districts and 8 "B" Regions with the eight "B" Region winners qualifying for the State "B" Tournament. Of course there has had to be changes in districts and regions but the basic plan has been kept over the years.

Region Music Contests

High school music contests in South Dakota are held only on a regional level with no advancement to a state contest. Contests were held in all eight regions again in 1967-68. In six of the regions solo and ensemble contests were completed in February and were followed by large group contests either the last week end in March or early in April. Region IV held all its contests during a two-day event in April. Region VIII held its solo and ensemble contests in early April and its large group contest in May. Regions I, II, and V have separate vocal and instrumental contests in February.

Doland and Sioux Falls Washington Debaters Win State Titles

Debaters from Doland and Sioux Falls Washington took top honors in the state high school debate tournament which wound up the Association's speech program on the campus of Dakota Wesleyan University in Mitchell the latter part of March.

Doland won its fourth consecutive Class "B" debate title and eighth in 10 years by defeating Sioux Valley High School of Volga in the finals. Both schools went into the final round undefeated in state tournament competition. Don Mendel coached the Doland speakers and Mrs. Judith Ohlsen, the runner-up Sioux Valley debaters.

Sioux Falls Washington won the Class "A" championship by defeating Brookings in the final round. Both schools went into the championship debate with one loss during state tournament competition. This was the second state title for Washington in three years. Robert Parlet coached the winning Washington debaters and James Klassen, the runner-up Brookings squad.

Fifty schools competed in the Association's division forensics contests. This included 26 in Class "A" and 24 in Class "B." Class "A" schools qualifying for the state debate tournament were Brookings, Sioux Falls Washington, Mitchell Public, Rapid City Public, Watertown, Sturgis, Aberdeen Central, and Sioux Falls Lincoln. Qualifiers from Class "B" divisions included Salem, Tripp, Avon, Doland, Highmore, Volga, Sioux Valley, Newell, and Garretson.

The question for debate throughout the season and for the tournaments was Resolved: That Congress should establish uniform regulations to control criminal investigation procedures.

Results of the original oratory and extemporaneous speaking contests will be found elsewhere in THE YEARBOOK.

All-State Band

Dr. Leonard B. Smith, nationally known musician, conductor, and lecturer from Detroit, Michigan, was guest conductor of the 1968 All-State Band. Central High School in Aberdeen was host for the 1968 event, and E. Orville Evenson, Central's director of instrumental music, was general chairman.

One hundred and sixty-seven musicians from 74 high schools earned membership in the band through auditions conducted at eleven centers in the state. Auditions and the All-State event itself were planned and operated through the cooperative efforts of the South Dakota Bandmasters' Association and the SDHSAA.

Huron High School qualified the most performers for the band, nine. Aberdeen Central and Rapid City Public each qualified 8; Winner and Sioux Falls Lincoln 7 each; Clark, Flandreau, and Madison Central 6 each; Beresford and Hayti 5 each; and Canton and Vermillion 4 each. Thirteen more schools qualified members for the band than in 1967.
