

FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and gives you a complete review of events in the school year of 1937-1938. All statistical events in which championships are determined are summarized and listed in the order they occurred.

By having year books, member schools could have a complete summary of the Association since it was formed in December 1902. This does not mean that a Year Book has been published each year since 1900. The first Year Book was published in 1917 and contained a summary of events from the beginning through the school year of 1925-26. The second such publication was in 1934, the third in 1937, again in 1942 and in 1946. Since 1946 the Year Book has been an annual publication.

Pictures of teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won statewide events are shown. There have been a few missed because of photographic failures, and this year is no exception. We do not know in how many instances their names, of course, will appear in the summaries.

We sincerely hope each school has been and will continue to file their copies of the Year Book as a matter of public record. A copy of the Association will be on file in each member school.

Starting July 1, 1962, L. M. Walker was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association, with offices space in the Department of Music Instruction in the School of the Sioux. Because of expansion in the Department of Music Instruction, and a consequent lack of space, it was necessary to move the S.D.M.A. Office Space was added to the S. Charles Hall, and the Office was moved to Room 10 of Hall where it remained until November 1970, when it was moved to permanent quarters in the South building at 411 N. Capital Avenue in Pierre.

With the Association changing from an "Athletic Association" to an "Athletic Association," it was necessary to change the name. L. M. Walker was named Executive Secretary July 1, 1962, and additional office space was secured in the S. Charles Hall.

REVIEW OF SDHSAA EVENTS FOR 1967-1968

1967 COACHING SCHOOL

Navarre, August 14, 15, 16, 1967

The Annual Coaching School continued to be one of the outstanding schools of its kind in the nation. Over 200 attended all or part of the School. The local was great. Eddie Crowder, athletic Director and Football Coach at the University of Navarre, handled all Football sessions, with Eddie Brown of Kansas taking care of the basketball along with his own characterized teacher. Don Whaley of Whalen and Jim Kowalski of Tulpe Ray MCGauley of Arizona handled all sessions on wrestling.

For the third year the South Dakota Medical Association provided the coaches with a removable section of "Medical Aspects in Sports" Dr. Saurin of Huron, Dr. James A. Mitchell and Dr. Henderson of the Mayo Clinic of Rochester headed up this part of the program. The entire school who attended 200998.

All sessions were held in the well-attended "Miss Pathway" in the Harvey High School Hotel.

1967 FOOTBALL RULES MEETINGS

With the exception of the World War II years Football Rules Meetings for officials and coaches have been held annually since 1938. The 1967 meetings were held in Aberdeen, Dickinson, Great Bend, Huron, Mitchell, Madison, Pierre, Sioux City, Rapid City, Watertown, Webster, and Yankton.

35 officials, 852 coaches, and 943 others interested in football attended 6 meetings which were conducted by Mr. Wilseth and Mr. Koenig. Other meeting will be continued in 1968 at the same sites.

1967 CROSS COUNTRY RUN

Because of the number of participants in the Annual Cross Country Run, it has become necessary to have elimination meets or increase the number of classes in Cross Country. The 1967 meet was run in three classes for the first time and worked out very well except for rather cool and windy weather.

47 entries from forty schools participated in the "B" Class, with 114 entries from twenty-two schools taking part in the "A" Class, and 96 entries from sixteen schools ran in the "AA" event thus making a total of 138 entries from 78 schools involved in the meet.

Loren Knudsen of Bristol won the "B" individual honors with Timber Lake ending the season for the Bear for the team championship in the "B" class. In the "A" Class, Myron Young of Pine Ridge was the individual champion with Clear Lake a rather easy team champion. In the "AA" Class, Rick Winkler of the Aberdeen Indian School dominated the field for individual honors and the Flandreau Indian School also won the team honors for the "AA" Class.

The Meet was ably handled by Coach and Cross Country Coach Andrew Dickey of South Dakota State University. A complete summary with pictures of winners will be found on other pages of this yearbook.

1967 BASKETBALL RULES MEETINGS

Basketball Rules Meetings for officials, coaches, and other interested people were conducted by your Executive Secretary and Assistant Executive Secretary in eighteen different cities. Meetings were held in Aberdeen, Chamberlain, DeSmet, Hot Springs, Huron, Madison, Lake Andes, Vermillion, Madison, Mitchell, Monroe, Pierre, Sioux City, Rapid City, Sturgis, Watertown, Yankton, and Yorkton.

At each of these meetings rule changes were discussed and explained, and the mechanics of officiating discussed. In all, 160 officials, 275 coaches, and 200 others attended the meetings.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Pierre—November 17 and 18, 1967

The first regular meeting of the Board of Control for the 1967-1968 school year was held in Pierre on the day before the Annual Meeting of the Association. THE ANNUAL SDHSAA MEETING

Pierre—Buchanan School

Saturday, November 18, 1967

Twenty-nine (29) member schools of the SDHSAA were officially represented at the Annual Meeting of the Association. Reports on the previous year and an explanation of the audit were made by Executive Secretary H. M. Walworth.

Two candidates were discussed at the meeting, and nomination for a regular five (5) year term on the Board of Control to succeed Chairman H. R. Ashbaugh, who was ineligible for reelection were made. Those nominated for the Board were Principal Bruce Crickett of Mitchell, Supt. Leo J. Olsen of Willow Lake, and Supt. Virgil Brugger of Centerville. For a four (4) year, unexpired term in which Supt. A. A. Thompson of Pierre had been appointed, nominations were made for Supt. Thueszen and Supt. Donald Melby of Meeteetse.

Supt. Maurice Blauprand of Madison was then nominated for an unexpired three (3) year term to which he had been appointed. He was the only nomination.

Asst. Supt. M. M. Antoline was then nominated for an unexpired term of one year, to which he had been previously appointed. There were no other nominations.

FOOTBALL SPECIAL COMMITTEE MEETING

Atlanta, Georgia

December 4 and 5, 1967

Your Executive Secretary was appointed on a Special Football Committee representing the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations which met with a similar committee from the NCAA Football Rules group at Atlanta, Georgia on December 4 and 5, 1967. The purpose of the meeting was to study differences in the two football codes to see if differences between the codes could be brought closer together. Progress was made as shown; by changes in both codes.

**RESULT OF REFERENDUM VOTE ON AMENDMENTS
AND
ELECTION OF BOARD OF CONTROL MEMBERS**

As stated previously in the notes on the Annual Meeting of the Association, two amendments were discussed. According to the Constitution and By-Laws of the SDNISAA, voting on Amendments and the election of Board Members is by mail ballot. When returns were counted on January 2, 1968 both amendments received a favorable outcome and will become effective July 1, 1968. The amendment briefly are: First, the size of the Board of Control will be increased to six members and certain size schools will be represented on the Board in the future. The complete new amendment will be a part of the Constitution and By-Laws and will be printed in the new edition of the rules, and therefore will not be repeated here. The second amendment provides that there shall be three classes in Track. This also will be published in the new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws.

Board of Control members elected after the mail ballot for six terms, for the three year term, were: Mr. John J. Willey, Lake City, for the four year unexpired term; Mrs. M. L. Wilkins of Monroe, Mr. G. Haugland of Marshall was the only nominee for the unexpired three year term, and Mr. Antoine of Baltic was the only nominee for the unexpired one year term. They were automatically elected and their names were not on the ballot.

The events of the year were reviewed and plans were made for 1968-1969. New business was transacted and a "very complete and copy of actions taken at all meetings by laws;

The three regular meetings of the Board were in Pierre, November 17 and 18, 1967, in Sioux City March 13, 14 and 15, 1968 and in Pierre on June 7 and 8, 1968.

Officers of the Board for 1968-69 were Capt. H. D. Aschbaugh, President; Capt. A. L. M. Mortenson, Belle Fourche, Vice Chairman and R. M. Walseth, Treasurer as provided for in the Constitution of the SDIUSA. Since Mr. Aschbaugh's term on the Board of Control ends July 1, 1968, J. W. A. Reid of Yankton was elected Chairman for the year of 1968-1969. No Vice Chairman was elected at the June meeting and R. M. Walseth will continue as treasurer.

Following are actions taken by the Board at the meetings during the year. These actions are listed as they were made and not in the order of their importance.

- (1) Set dates for Crossing School in Huron—August 12, 13, 14, 1968.
- (2) Set date for 1968 Cross Country Run at Brookings October 13.
- (3) Appointed members of Ad "A" & "B" Committee for journalism and speech. (4) Made a poll on newly reorganized districts and possible reorganization which districts as far as student eligibility is concerned. (5) Reuled on the dissolution of Mandan Indian School as a taxable corporation and therefore ineligible for one year. (6) Made minor changes in 1968-1969 "B" districts. (7) Resigned earlier dates for the State Wrestling Tournament, allowing traveling schools to have first and second in the last week of September. (8) Authorized R. M. Walseth travel to Atlanta Georgia, at National Federation expense. (9) Appointed for state delegation by member schools athletic insurance. (10) Accepted Huron's invitation to host the "B" State swimming tournament. (11) Made slight changes in "B" districts for 1969-1970. (12) Appointed two new members to the Advisory Committee for Girls' Activities. (13) Authorized a second meeting for the committee. (14) Accepted the Sioux Falls invitation to host the 1969 "A" and "B" State wrestling tournaments. (15) Made several changes in the State Track Meet. They are as follows: (a) cut in lanes. (b) Allow two dollars to compete in field events. (c) Adopted standards for the "A" and "B" two mile run. (d) Adopted standards for low hurdles if run around a curve. (e) Will run prelimi-

inches in 800 yard run; (1) Review rule 200 into slow and fast sections; (2) If three preliminary heats per category qualify to go final which first plus two fastest times; (3) Make slight changes in the named competition with no changes; (4) Adopted Minnesota rule on projects; (5) Reviewed Worrellburg meeting on revised "D" component issue; (6) Authorized Mr. Haugland, Mr. Rouse, and Mr. Wessell to attend National Convention in Denver; (7) Made slight changes in methods of certifying officials; (8) Set officers for Executive Secretary, Assistant Executive Secretary, and Office Help; (9) Set up 10 girls track events, no girl shall run any event longer than 220 yards, and competition to be limited to three events; (10) Decided that for 1969 track, each of the three classes be divided into eight regions; (11) Decided to hold the "A", "B", and "C" State Track Meets; (12) Accepted Huron High Institute to host the 1967 State Track Meet; (13) Presented, and "1" term's Vice Chairman; (14) Appointed an extra member to Advisory Committee on track; (15) Will provide medals for Region and Teammarks; (16) Will provide additional trophies for State Meet and Tournaments; (17) Accepted several recommendations on girls' track, including Region and State Track Meets, and State Girls and Teams; (18) Appointed Dennis Roberts of Worrellburg as South Dakota's representative at NCSA meeting in Chicago; (19) Appointed new members to Advisory Committees for Activities, Council, Speech, Press and Music; (20) Appointed a new member to Merchandise Committee; (21) Changed girls' wrestling regulations; (22) Presented expense accounts for Council of Control, Executive Secretary, Assistant Executive Secretary, and Advisory Committees; (23) Increased expense allowances of conference and coaches to State Wrestling Tournament; (24) Made changes in distribution of student tickets to State 1st and 2nd District Tournaments; (25) Set up a rotation for schools to participating teams in the "A" sectional tournament; (26) Discussed the new appointments; (27) Appointed Supt. 

1968 TOURNAMENTS

The 1968 basketball tournaments are now history and while it may seem impossible, our tournament seems to get better. Games played are interesting and close, and the tournament management does improve with age. New innovations keep cropping up to make each tournament better than preceding tournaments.

The 1968 tournaments produced two fine championship teams—Arlington in the "A" and Brookings in the "B". Arlington defeated Clark in the first round of the "B" Tournament, in a fine game, and then beat Cindy Jr. in the semifinals in another real good contest, and then took a great Purdie win in the finale.

Brookings, the "A" Champion, got started by hand in the first round, and then eliminated Waller in the semifinals in a game that was close to the middle of the third quarter. In the finale they defeated Sioux City, Linn, a great team, in the closing parts of the game.

Our congratulations to the schools and their coaches—Pete Hennigan of Arlington and Ken Thors of Brookings. May all their teams stay in play.

On other pages of this YEAR BOOK you will find scores of all games in the two tournaments and pictures of all teams with their seasons' records.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The SDHSAA was organized in 1908 and from that time until 1922 competition was pretty much limited, on a statewide basis, to local and district. In 1911, with permission of the SDHSAA, Ponca College suggested a state high school basketball tournament, open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was continued annually to 1917, when, at the request of the College, the tournament was taken over by the Board of Control of the SDHSAA and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1931 when eight teams qualified. Since 1924 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs, with exceptions in 1930, 1940 and 1941 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was agitation for two classes, and in 1930 an "A" and "B" plan was tried. Under this plan the State was divided into 32 districts and the 32 district winners went to eight "A" Regions, and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 32 District winners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions, from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. This plan did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1937 an "A" and "B" plan was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 300 and over were classed as "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this system the top schools in the E.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the same division of the Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to advance into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1938.

With adjustments from time to time in the "A" group, including taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge, and taking away the privilege of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the E.S.D. Conference, the present plan was adopted for the 1941-42 season. During the period from 1936 to 1941 the four largest schools in four geographically areas were classed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1942 the present plan was started whereby the 32 large High schools, by enrollment, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up, and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" group is that, while enrollment might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

For the 1963 "A" Tournament a change was made in the method of qualifying teams to the State "A" Tournament. This change, briefly, was as follows: The make up of schools in the "A" Sections was left as it had been in recent years. However a double elimination Section Tournament was played with two teams from each section qualifying for the four "Sub-State" tournaments. Sections 1 and 3 formed Sub-State #1; Sections 2 and 4 formed Sub-State #2; Sections 5 and 6 formed Sub-State #3; and Sections 7 and 8 formed Sub-State #4. This placed four teams in each of the four Sub-State Tournaments; and again double elimination tournaments were played with two teams from each Sub-State tournament qualifying for the State "A" Tournament.

The 1961 plan for "A" tournaments was discarded in 1962 and qualification for places in the State "A" Tournament was done by single elimination tournaments in each of eight (8) "A" Sections. The winner of each "A" Section qualified for the State "A" Tournament. This method was continued for the 1968 and 1969 Tournaments.

Since the start of the "A" and "B" classification in 1936 there has been little change in the "B" set-up. We have continued to have 32 "B" Districts and 8 "B" Regions with the eight "B" Region winners qualifying for the State "B" Tournament. Of course there has had to be changes in districts and regions but the basic plan has been kept over the years.

Region Music Contests

High school music contests in South Dakota are held only on a regional level with no advancement to a state contest. Contests were held in all eight regions again in 1970-71. In six of the regions solo and ensemble contests were completed in February and were followed by large group contests either the last week end in March or early in April. Region IV held all its contests during a two-day event in April. Regions V and VI held their solo and ensemble contests in early April and the large group contests in May. Regions I, II, and V have separate vocal and instrumental contests in February.

Doland and Sioux Falls Washington Debaters Win State Titles

Debaters from Doland and Sioux Falls Washington took top honors in the state high school debate tournament which was held at the Association's speech program on the campus of Dakota Wesleyan University in Mitchell. The former part of March.

Doland won its fourth consecutive Class "B" debate title and eighth in 10 years by defeating Sioux Valley High School of Sioux in the finals. Both schools went into the final round undefeated in state tournament competition. Don Mende coached the Doland speakers and Mrs. Judith Orton, the winning Sioux Valley debaters.

Sioux Falls Washington won the Class "A" championship by defeating Brookings in the final round. Both schools went into the championship debate with one loss during state tournament competition. This was the second state title for Washington in three years. Thane Parker coached the winning Washington debaters and Janis Klassen, the runner-up Brookings squad.

Fifty schools competed in the Association's division tournaments contests. This included 26 in Class "C" and 2 in Class "B." Class "A" schools qualifying for the state debate tournament were Brookings, Sioux Falls Washington, Carroll Public, Rapid City Public, Watertown, Sturgis, Aberdeen Central, and Sioux Falls Indian. Contenders from Class "B" divisions included Salem Union, Avon, Delmont, Highmore, Vige, Sioux Valley, Newell, and Garretson.

The question for debate throughout the season and for the tournaments was Resolved: That Congress should establish uniform regulations to control criminal investigation procedures.

Results of the original oratory and extemporaneous speaking contests will be found elsewhere in THE YEARBOOK.

All-State Band

Dr. Leonard B. Smith, nationally known musician, conductor, and lecturer from Detroit, Michigan, was guest conductor of the 1968 All-State Band. Central High School in Aberdeen was host for the 1968 event, and E. Orville Evenson, Central's director of instrumental music, was general chairman.

One hundred and sixty-seven musicians from 74 high schools earned membership in the band through auditions conducted at eleven centers in the state. Auditions and the All-State event itself were planned and operated through the cooperative efforts of the South Dakota Bandmasters' Association and the SDHSAA.

Huron High School qualified the most performers for the band, nine. Aberdeen Central and Rapid City Public each qualified 8; Winner and Sioux Falls Lincoln 7 each; Clark, Flandreau, and Madison Central 6 each; Beresford and Hayti 5 each; and Canton and Vermillion 4 each. Thirteen more schools qualified members for the band than in 1967.








