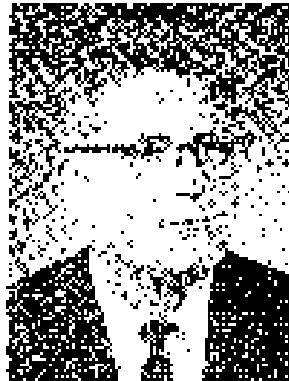

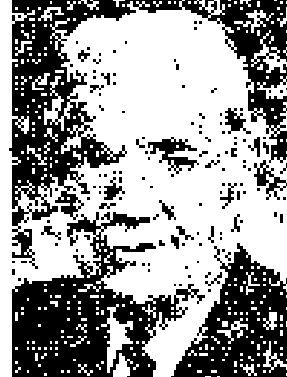

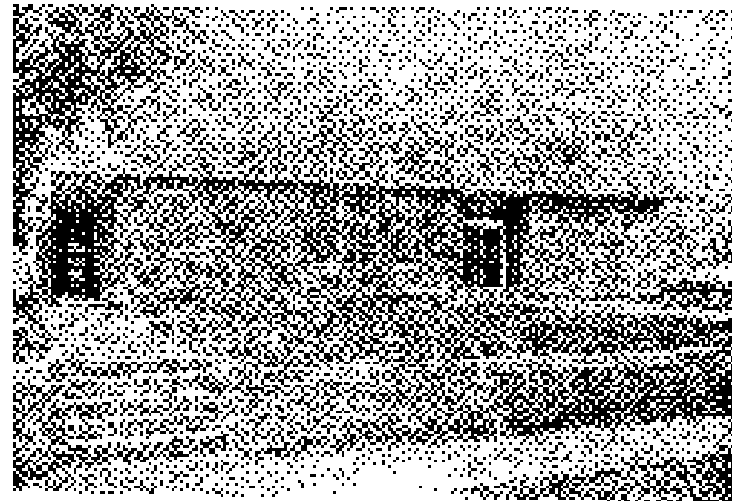

FOREWORD

The Year Book, published annually after the close of the school year, serves as an annual report of the Executive Secretary and does provide a narrative review of events in the school year of 1907-1938. All statewide events in which championships are determined are summarized and listed in the order they occurred.

By having year books, member schools could have a complete summary of the Association since it was formed in December 1905. This does not mean that a Year Book has been published each year since 1935. The first Year Book was published in 1937 and contained a summary of events from the beginning through the school year of 1936-37. The second such publication was in 1948, the third in 1950, again in 1952 and in 1953. Since 1953 the Year Book has been an annual publication.

Records of teams and individuals who have participated in or who have won statewide events are shown. Teams have been a few named, because of photographic failures, and this year is no exception, we have listed a few individuals. Their names, of course, will appear in the summaries.

We sincerely hope each school has been and will continue to be their copies of the Year Book as a rather complete history of the Association will be on file in each member school.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEMBERS

December 1905 to July 1, 1969

IN A "YEAR BOOK" printed in July of 1937, there is a complete list of Board of Control Members from the start of the South Dakota High School Athletic Association in 1905 to July of 1933. Starting July 1, 1967, R. A. Walcott was appointed Executive Secretary of the Association, with office space in the Department of Public Instruction in the Statehouse in Albany. Because of expansion in the Department of Public Instruction, and a consequent lack of space, it was necessary to move the SDEBA office. Space was rented in the St. Victor Hotel and the office was moved in January of 1968 where it remained until November, 1968. Then it was moved to permanent quarters in the SDEBA Building at 111 E. Capitol Avenue in Pierre.

With the Association changing from an "Artistic Association" to an "Educational Association," it was necessary to add additional help. G. W. Reynolds was named Assistant Executive Secretary July 1, 1962, and additional office space was secured in the SDEBA building.

Because of the increased activities of the SDEBA, the Board of Control decided to add another man to the staff and Chr. Linder, formerly Assistant Director at the Watertown High School, will be added to the staff on July 1, 1969. With the addition of Mr. Linder, additional office space was necessary and in June of 1969 the office was moved to the lower level in the SDEBA Building.

The new SDEBA building is pictured on page 2 of the "YEAR BOOK."

REVIEW OF SDHSAA EVENTS FOR 1968-1969

This volume of the "YEAR BOOK" contains complete summaries of the activities carried out for the business of the SDHSAA for the school year of 1968-1969. The annual audit of the Association's finances is not included because of the date of the year, but the audit is published each year in the Annual Meeting Bulletin which will be issued in mid-September.

1968-69 was the eighth year that the Association has been operated as an "Activities Association" and therefore the events mentioned and summarized are for all activities, not only athletics. Looking back over the year, we believe it was a good year, and we are quite proud of the progress shown in the many activities. There seems to be complete harmony existing, all conflicts caused by entirely eliminated, but we feel great progress has been made.

Even though all activities are directed from a central office, many activities could not be effectively administered without the use of committees made up of the dedicated people who are interested in seeing that the particular activity does go well. ATHLETIC

1968 COACHING SCHOOL

Huron, August 12, 13, 14, 1968

Over 250 coaches attended the 989 Annual Tuition-Free SDHSAA Coaching School and were well rewarded for their attendance. We believe the school was great and continues to be one of the best in the Nation. The tutors included Pepper Rodgers of Kansas, whose team won the 1969 "Orange Bowl," Larry Glaze of Northwestern (winner of the basketball end of the school), with "Chuck" Patton of the University of Northern Iowa handling the wrestling. In addition, Charles D. Stetson of Arlington and Ken Turry of Prookings, Coaches of our 1968 "B" and "A" Basketball Championship teams also were a part of the program.

For the fourth year the South Dakota Medical Association provided the day-afternoon session of the Clinic with Dr. H. L. Bayle, of

Katon and Dr. Harvard Lewis of Mitchell arranging the session. They provided Dr. Paul Gustowski, Clinic Physician for the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, Omaha; and George Sullivan, Head Trainer at the University of Nebraska, whose four men did great jobs demonstrating and lecturing on "Statistical Records in Sports."

All sessions were in the amanditorium "The Ballroom" in the Marvin Hospital Hotel.

1968 FOOTBALL RULES MEETINGS

Since 1964, with the exception of a couple of World War II years, Football Rules Meetings have been held continuously. The 1968 meetings were held in Aberdeen, Brookings, Casson, Chad, Huron, Mitchell, Oelbeldge, Philip, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sturgis, Vermillion, Wagner, Yankton town, and Winner.

Three hundred thirty-five officials, 49 coaches, and 271 students interested in football rules attended the meetings which were conducted by Mr. Evans and Mr. Walcott. These meetings will be continued in 1969 at the same sites.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Sioux Falls—October 8, 1968

The first regular meeting of the Board of Control for the school year of 1968-1969 was held in Sioux Falls on the day prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association. Mr. Walseth and Mr. Evans made reports to the Board and routine matters were handled. THE ANNUAL SDHSAA MEETING

Lincoln Senior High School Auditorium, Sioux Falls

October 9, 1968

Thirty-five (35) member schools of the SDHSAA were officially represented by one or more delegates at the Annual Meeting of the Association. Reports of the previous school year, plans for the 1969 and an explanation of the budget were made by Executive Secretary R. M. Walseth.

One amendment to the Athletic By-Laws of the Association has been previously presented and this was made possible football championships in the future. This amendment was quite thoroughly discussed at the meeting. The amendment, as discussed at the meeting, was defeated in referendum balloting which followed the meeting.

Nominations for a Board Member to a new position on the Board of Control from a Division I school were made, and the nominees for this six year term were Richard Virgil Bell of Brookings and Principal Bruce Condit of Mitchell. The term will start July 1, 1969 and end June 30, 1975. By mail vote Mr. Condit was elected.

Nominations for a five year term, starting July 1, 1968 and ending June 30, 1971 were next made and the nominees to be "At Large" members, Supt. Deane Antoine of Dell Rapids and Supt. Warren Thompson of North Sioux County were nominated, and in final balloting following the meeting, Mr. Antoine was the winner.

Supt. Kenneth Hauge of Sully was the only member for election to an unexpired term ending June 30, 1970. Mr. Hauge was then declared elected.

1968 CROSS COUNTRY RUN

Brookings, South Dakota—October 18, 1968

Despite adverse weather conditions, the 1968 Cross Country Run was an outstanding event. For the second year the meet was run in three classes. Snow covered most of the course, water filled the low spots and a cold wind also hampered the runners.

One hundred two runners from sixteen schools competed in the Class "AA" event. One hundred twenty-six runners from 23 schools participated in the Class "A" event and 150 runners from 53 schools in the Class "B" event. This totals 338 runners from 81 schools.

Rick Erdin Grand of the Platteau Indian School was the individual winner in Class "AA" and the Platteau Indian School Team won the team event. Myron Young Dog of the Delta Community High School won the individual title in Class "A" with Cheyenne Eagle Tullie taking the Class "A" team honors. Loren Kaubestad of Bristol won the individual honors in Class "B" with Orchard the winner of team honors in this class.

The Meet was again managed by Creeth Aubrey Dosty of the State University. He and his staff crew did a fantastic job under very trying conditions. A complete summary of the three meets with pictures will be found on other pages of this "YEAR BOOK."

1968 BASKETBALL RULES MEETINGS

As for football, the SBTSSAA has had meetings on rules for basketball coaches, officials and others interested, approximately since 1954, with the exception of the World War II years. The meetings in 1968 were conducted by Executive Secretary E. M. Wiseth and Assistant Executive Secretary D. W. Adams in eighteen different cities. Meetings were held in Aberdeen, Chamberlain, Dupree, Hot Springs, Huron, Kadoka, Lake Arden, Lemmon, Madison, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Sioux Falls, Sisseton, Sully, Watertown, Winter and Yankton.

At each of the meetings, rule changes, old rules and officiating procedures were discussed. By the 1968 meetings, 12 officials, 902 coaches and 232 others, totaling 1918 attended the meetings.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Siox Falls—December 27 and 28, 1960

Because there were so many new members on the Board of Control, it was deemed advisable to have an extra Board Meeting, before our next meeting time. Much of the Meeting was spent explaining procedures and explaining the function and duties of Board Members, and getting business transacted. As previously mentioned in the news of the Annual Meeting of the Association, but one amendment was presented and discussed. This Amendment proposed a system of football playoffs. When the mail ballots were counted on January 3, 1961, the vote showed 60 for the Amendment and 114 against. Therefore, the Amendment was defeated.

For election of Board of Control Members there were two contests. For a six (6) year term starting July 1, 1961 and ending June 30, 1975, Donald Bruce Crockett or Mitchell (E. Faced P. 100) and Virgil A. Hall or Bookledge. These men were nominated from District 1 schools.

For a five year term starting July 1, 1961 and ending June 30, 1976, the candidates were from the "at Large" classification. Pope, Leonard Armand or Dell Harris defeated Supt. Warren Thomas of North Brown County (Fredricks).

For a one year term to finish the unexpired term of former Supt. A. H. Mortenson of Belle Fourche Supt. Kenneth Haug of Sisseton was the only nominee and was declared elected.

1960 NATIONAL ALLIANCE FOOTBALL RULES MEETING AND EXECUTIVE OFFICERS' MEETING

Atlanta, Georgia—January 8, 9, 10, 1961

Your Executive Secretary R. M. Walcott and Assistant Executive Secretary D. W. Evans, gave a total of eight delegates to these meetings. Mr. Walcott is a member of the Football Rules Committee and Chairman of the Equipment Sub-Committee of the Football group. He presided at this executive meeting. Mr. Evans is a member of the Game Administration Committee and South Dakota's official delegate to the Non-Athletic Section of the Executive Officers' Meeting.

1969 STATE WRESTLING TOURNAMENT

Huron—February 21 & 22, 1969

Weatherman, the state Wrestling Tournament created problems. Snow, blowing snow, and all that goes with such weather caused a great loss in revenue and several teams were disqualified for failure to arrive in time for the weigh-ins and the opening matches of the Tournament. Otherwise the Tournament was a decided success. Wrestlers seem to get better and there is greatly improved crowd interest. Handy coaches, wrestlers and fans were in Huron for this growing event.

Brookings won the team championship with 50 points. Closely following were Pierre, Rapid City, Watertown, Gregory, Millisak and Huron with 49, 47, 42, 40 and 38 points respectively. Thirty-five schools scored six or more points in the Tournament. Fifteen other schools participated in the Tournament and did not score.

Clyde Cotton, Athletic Director of the Huron High School, was the Tournament manager and he and his staff did a remarkable job.

Routine matters were discussed and handled and the 1970 Tournaments were again awarded to Stoux Falls. In addition, the Board met with representatives from Lincoln and Washington High Schools of Stoux Falls, and from Lennox High School. These schools were the schools which were not allowed to participate in the 1968 State Wrestling Tournament at Huron February 21 and 22 because of late arrival. There was lengthy discussion, and plans were formulated to take care of similar situations should they ever arise again in the future.

It was decided at the Saturday, March 17 Meeting to add another member to the SDI SAA Staff and to have a meeting of the 84 "A" Basketball schools in Huron on March 28 to set up the "A" Sections for the year of 1968-1969 and 1969-1970.

Finally, Mr. Lilevjen was unanimously elected. At a Board Meeting Saturday evening, May 17, Mr. Lilevjen met with the Board and many matters were discussed. Work assignments were partially given.

1939 STATE TRACK MEET

Rapid City—May 16 & 17, 1939

Rather cool and quite windy weather prevailed for the 32nd Annual running of the State Track and Field Meet, and the Meet was run for the first five in three classes. One thousand eight competitors actually took part. The Meet was also run for the first time on the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology new all-weather track. Spectators late in the Meet otherwise did not start the running events. All "A" records are new records and several "A" and "B" records were broken or tied, with new all-time state records set in the High Hurdle, 800 Yard Relay, 500 Yard Relay, Mile Relay, Shot Put, and Javelin Throw. The Javelin Throw of "B" class by George Amundson of Aberdeen Central, exceeded the National High School record by over eleven feet.

Frank R. Mc Lincoln won the "A" mile, with Aberdeen Central second. Del Rapids won the "B" mile, with White Halling second. Jefferson edged Griggs to win the "C" mile meet.

Carroll Meier of Rapid City and his able staff of assistants did a marvellous job of handling this large Meet.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Items—June 4 & 5, 1938

The 68th meeting of the Board of Control for the school year of 1938-1939 was held in Pierre on June 4 and 5, 1938. Regular routine business was conducted, a budget for 1938-1939 was adopted, and plans for 1939-1940 were made. The 1938 State Track Meet, the Golf and Tennis Tournaments were awarded to Rapid City and the Girls' State Track Meet and the Golf and Tennis Tournaments were awarded to Mitchell. Again, complete minutes of all meetings will be found in the September Annual Yearling Bulletin.

BOARD OF CONTROL ACTIONS

1938-1939

The duly elected governing body of the South Dakota High School Activities Association, known as the Board of Control, held three regular meetings and three special meetings during 1938-39.

During this school year, W. M. A. MCG. Yankton, served as chairman of the Board with Oscar Anderson, Dell Strada, serving as vice chairman. Other members of the Board for all or part of this period or a part of it included Harold Ashbaugh, Mitchell, acting chairman; A. H. Fontenot, Belle Fourche, acting vice chairman; A. A. Thompson, Pierre; Charles Haugland, Rapid; Leo Uken, Bridgeview; Don Plakas, Mission; and Kenneth Hauge, Sturgis.

Turnover in Board membership during the past two years has been greater than normal. When school opened in the fall of 1938 only Dr. Ashd, the present chairman, had been a member of the Board in the fall of 1937. More than the usual number of vacancies occurred during the past two years because of retirement of Board members from their school administrative posts.

Following is a summary of actions taken by the Board of Control during 1938-39:

- Authorized the 1938 State Track and Field Meet to Rapid City; adopted the recommendations of the golf coaches on the numbering of awards and medals and breaking ties; adopted recommendations of tennis coaches for 1939-Round seeding, point system, and awards.

- Authorized the holding of the First South Dakota Girls' State Track and Field Meet at Yankton on May 19, 1939, and adopted regulations governing the girls' track and field program.

- Revised state wrestling regulations to better control shifting of wrestlers from one weight class to another; adopted recommendations of Wrestling Advisory Committee for wrestling regulations and alignment of schools into districts and regions.

- Revised system for allocating student tickets at State Class "D" Basketball tournament; revised system for location of seats for holders of adult tickets at State "D" Tournament, limited adult ticket order to State "D" Tournament to two per order.

- Approved present method of selecting officials for state basketball tournaments; directed that a poll of basketball coaches be taken to determine consensus for making uniform basketball awards available through the Association of Coe, authorized plans for televising both state basketball tournaments at increased rates, awarded both state basketball tournaments to Sioux Falls.

- Approved members' services for Rapid City schoolteachers at State Class "A" Basketball Tournament; revised regulations for distribution of complimentary tickets to state basketball tournaments so that "A" committee members are eligible only for tickets to the "A" tournament and "B" committee members are eligible only for tickets to the "B" tournament.

- Adopted budget of \$58,087.50 for 1988-89, increased travel allowance for SEMI-SAL business, hydrogenator volumes to mean that a non-associated school could not retain its membership in the Association.

- Authorized secretary to hire high school coaches for the 1988 coaching clinic awarded the 1988 coach clinic to Mitchell; directed that advisory council may be set on a staggered five-year term and with one new member to be appointed each year.

- Reaffirmed Jefferson and Watonda High Schools as schools during 1988 football game which were considered departments to the high school athletic program.

- Reaffirmed policy that a group of students from one school contact and adjust a group of students from another school in organized drills or try out must be classified as a game, must be contested, and must be counted as part of the allowable schedule; director must a letter be sent to the superintendent of a member school as to exactly when constitutes a game.

- Authorized meeting of executive directors of member schools to formulate a set of policies to be followed in conducting the All-State Orchestra program.

- Agreed the membership of the Association into regions for competition in three classes in track.

- Reviewed action of executive secretary and wrestling committee in barring certain qualifiers for the State Wrestling Tournament from participation because of delayed arrival and set policy for such situations arising in future.

- Hired state wrestling with 31 Class "A" schools to be high basketball seasons for next two years.

- Hired Glen Heron, Watertown, as a third member of the Assoc. staff to be responsible for an assistant executive secretary.

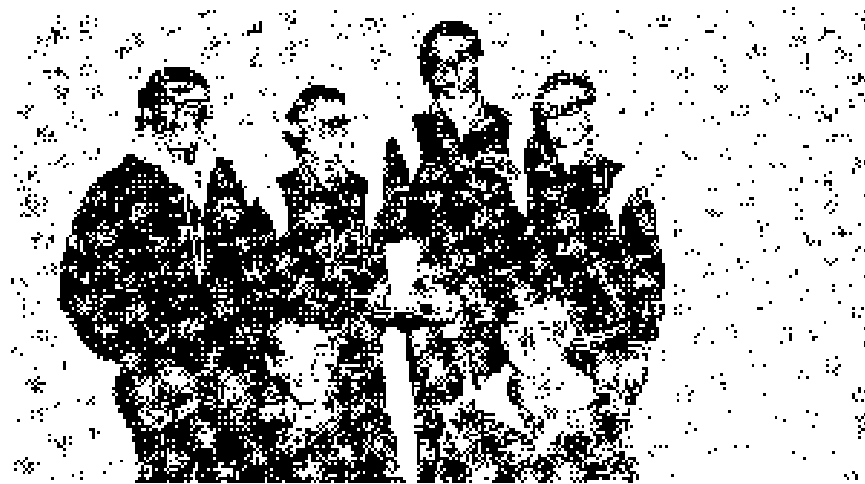

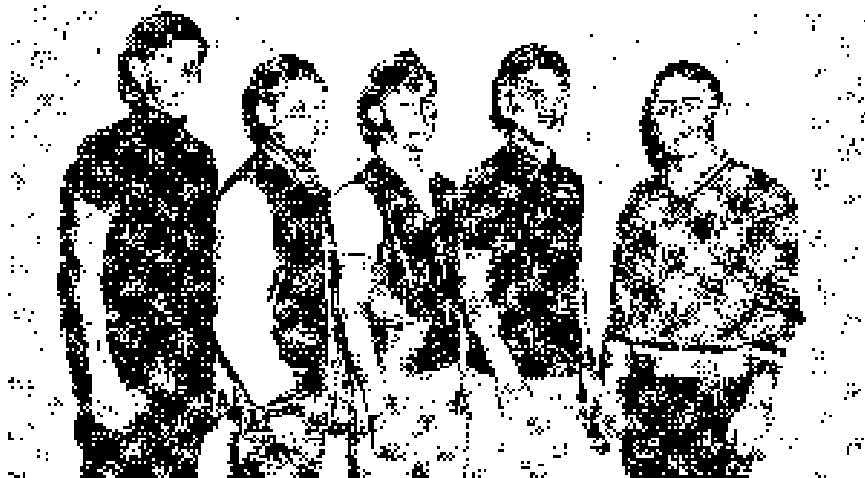

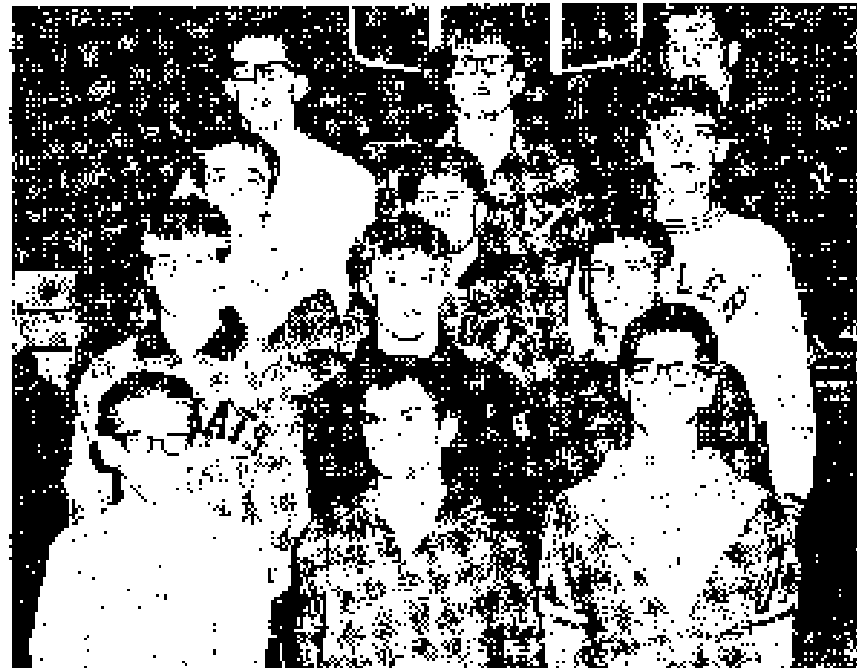

1980 TOURNAMENTS

At the conclusion of play in the 1980 state basketball Tournaments, two new champions were crowned and these teams were fine teams, well coached, physically strong, and each had the necessary desire and man-power. Ocala defeated a good Lakeland team in the first round, eliminated Tyrone in the semi-finals, before meeting De Soto in the finals.

Rapid City, the "A" champion, defeated Aberdeen Central in the first round, then took good care of Albion in the semi-finals, before meeting Brookings in the finals. The final game was a contest between two exceptionally fine basketball teams, each team blessed with outstanding individuals, and the game itself was one of the best final games ever in any State Tournament.

Our congratulations to the subjects and their coaches—Clay Kaska of Ocala and Dale Strub of Rapid City. These coaches had their teams ready to play.

The 1980 Tournaments are now history, and the tournaments continue to get better. The games were interesting, well played and the Tournament management continues to improve.

On other pages of this "YEAR BOOK" you will find scores of all games in the two tournaments and pictures of the teams with their season's records.

HISTORY OF BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The S.H.S.A.A. was organized in 1906 and from that time until 1912, competition was purely cross-busines, on a through-the-town, in track and debate. In 1912, with permission of the S.H.S.A.A., Horton College sponsored a state high school basketball tournament open to all high schools in the State. This tournament was conducted annually until 1917, when, at the request of the College, the management was taken over by the State of Control of the S.H.S.A.A. and has been under the supervision and management of the Board since that time. The number of teams in the State Tournament varied until 1921, when eight teams qualified. Since 1921 the State Tournaments have been eight team affairs with exception in 1924, 1925 and 1931 when the "A" Tournaments were four team tournaments.

During the 1920's there was competition for two classes, and in 1924 an "A" and "B" class was introduced. Under this plan the State was divided into 22 districts and the 22 District winners went to play "A" Regionals and the eight Region winners then qualified for the State "A" Tournament. The 22 District runners-up qualified for eight "B" Regions from which the eight winners qualified for the State "B" Tournament. A stipulation did not prove popular and was abandoned after the one year trial.

Agitation continued for two classes, and in the fall of 1925 an "A" and "B" class was developed. Under this plan High Schools with an enrollment of 100 and over were placed in "A" schools and all other schools were "B" schools. Under this system the top schools in the I.S.D. Conference qualified for the "A" Tournament, and the teams in the second division of this Conference played against the other "A" schools to determine the other qualifiers in the eight team State "A" Tournament. "B" teams with outstanding records were allowed to challenge into the "A" class for the right to enter the State "A" Tournament. The first "A" and "B" Tournaments were held in March of 1926.

With administrative time to spare in the "A" group including taking away the right of a "B" school to challenge and taking away the method of qualifying by being one of the top teams in the I.S.D. Conference, the present plan was casted for the 1931-32 season. During the transition from 1930 to 1931, the four thurst schools in four geographical areas were placed as "A" schools and in each of the four sections, two teams from each section qualified for the State "A" Tournament by a double elimination method.

In 1931 the present plan was started whereby the 22 largest high schools, by enrollment, made up the "A" group and eight "A" sections were set up and the winner of each of the eight section tournaments qualified for the State "A" Tournament. Also part of the present "A" system is that while enrollments might change, the teams were determined on the two-year basis, rather than having changes annually in each class.

In the 1931 "A" Tournament a change was made by the method of qualifying teams to the State "A" Tournament. This change, which was as follows: The make up of schools in the "A" Sections was left as it had been in recent years, however a double elimination Section Tournament was played with two teams from each section qualifying for the new "Sub-State" tournaments. Sections 1 and 2 formed Sub-State #1; Sections 3 and 4 formed Sub-State #2; Sections 5 and 6 formed Sub-State #3; and Sections 7 and 8 formed Sub-State #4. This placed four teams in each of the four Sub-State Tournaments and again double elimination tournaments were played with two teams from each Sub-State Tournament qualifying for the State "A" Tournament.

The 1931 plan for "A" tournaments was discarded in 1937 and qualification for places in the State "A" Tournament was done by single elimination tournaments in each of eight (8) "A" Regions. The winner of each "A" Region qualified for the State "A" Tournament. This method was continued for the 1938 and 1939 Tournaments.

Since the start of the "A" and "B" classification in 1930 there has been little change in the "E" series. We have continued to have 22 "E" Districts and 8 "E" Regions with the eight "E" Region winners qualifying for the State "B" Tournament. Of course there has had to be changes in Districts and regions and the same plan has been kept over the years.

1968 Press Convention and Publications Competition

The big event for high school journalists in South Dakota was the Annual Press Convention held on the South Dakota State University campus in Brookings on October 3. Dr. George Phillips and his staff at State planned and operated the convention in their usual efficient style. Highlights of the convention was the announcement of the results of the annual competition in school newspapers and yearbooks.

Spox Falls Lincoln High School repeated as winner of the yearbook award. Park in newspaper and its yearbook were voted on the top in the competition. Twelve other schools shared fourth All State honors with their publications.

Region Music Contests

Membership of the South Dakota High School Activities Association is divided into eight regions by conducting music contests. Actually, these contests are in the nature of a festival in that each individual or group is striving for a rating with no restrictions placed upon the judges as to the number of ratings which may be awarded in each category. There is no advancement to a state contest.

Contests were held in all eight regions again in 1969. In six of the regions solo and ensemble contests were completed in February and were followed by large group contests either the last week-end of March or the second weekend in April. Region IV held at its home

tests during a two-day event in April. Region VI held its solo and ensemble contests in early April and its large group contest in May. Regions I, II, and V had separate vocal and instrumental contests in February.

Brookings and Deland Debaters Win State Titles

Debaters from Brookings and Deland took top honors in the state high school debate tournament which wound up the Association's speech program on the campus of Dakota Wesleyan University in Mitchell the middle of March.

Deland won its fifth consecutive Class "B" debate title and 1969 in 11 years by defeating Salina Public High School in the finals. Earl Mendel coached the Deland speakers and Carl Swanson, the runner-up Salina debaters.

Brookings won the Class "A" championship by defeating Pierre in the final round. Pierre had defeated Brookings earlier in the tournament and went into the finals undefeated. Brookings proceeded to beat Pierre twice to win the title. Brookings last finished in the runner-up spot in 1958. Joe Barnhart coached the winning Brookings debaters and Herb Johnson, the alternate Pierre squad.

Other schools competed in the Association's Division Forensic contests. They included 94 in Class "A" and 96 in Class "B". Class "A" schools qualifying for the state debate tournament were Pierre, Sioux Falls, Washington, Sioux Falls Lincoln, Aberdeen Central, Madison, Sargus, Watertown, and Brookings. Qualifiers for Class "B" included Freeman Public, Tyndall, Deland, Acon, Highmore, Salem Public North, and Veiga Sioux Valley.

The question for debate throughout the season and for the tournament was Resolution: That the United States should establish a system of compulsory service for all citizens.

Results of the original oratory and extemporaneous speaking contests will be found elsewhere in THIS YEARBOOK.

All-State Band

Dr. Gene A. Braught, director of bands at the University of Oklahoma, was guest conductor of the 1969 All-State Band. Sturgis High School was host for the 1969 event, and Len Gotsche, director of Instrumental Music at the Sturgis school, was general chairman. Robert C. Mervitt, a Sturgis High School graduate and a student at the University of Denver, was guest soloist on the trumpet.

One hundred seventy musicians from 68 high schools earned membership in the band through auditions conducted at 11 centers in the state. Auditions and the All-State event itself were planned and operated through the cooperative efforts of the South Dakota Bandmasters' Association and the SDHSAA.

Aberdeen Central High School qualified the most performers for the band: 15. Clark 12; Handrean 10; Rapid City Public 8; Cheyenne 7; Webster 6; Brookings, Hayti, Redfield, Watertown and Winter 5 each; and Bristol, Mitchell, Yankton, Pierre, and Vermillion 4 each.

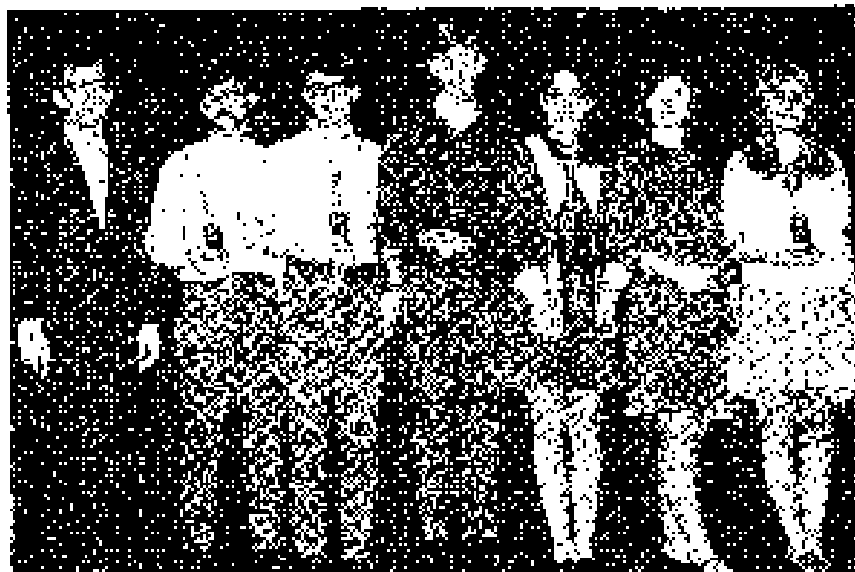

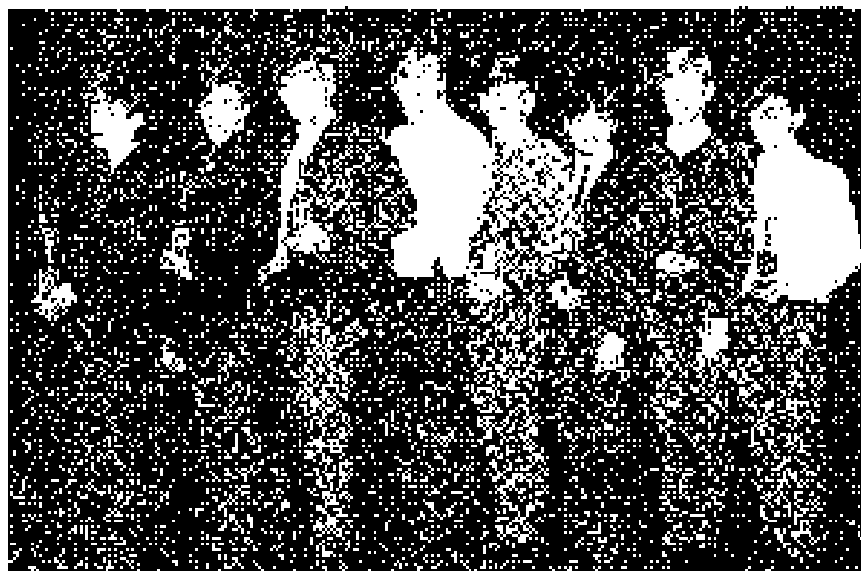

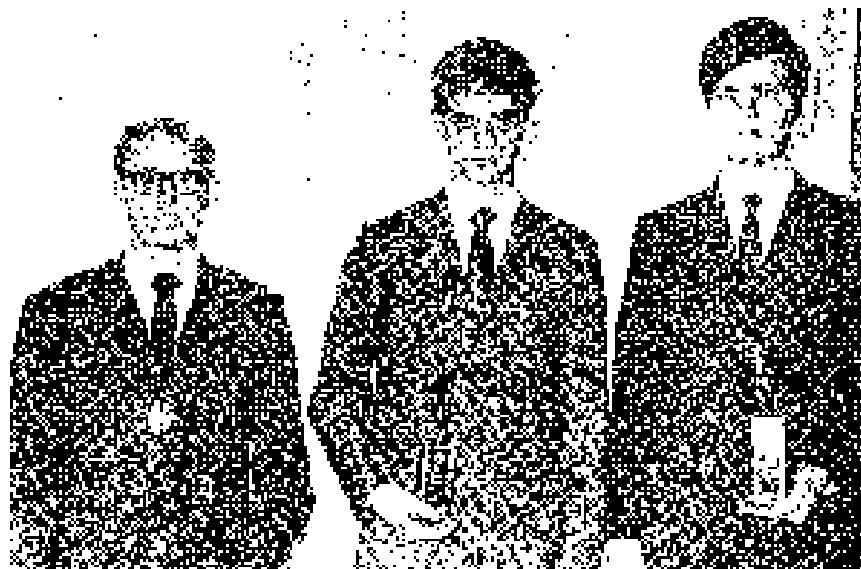

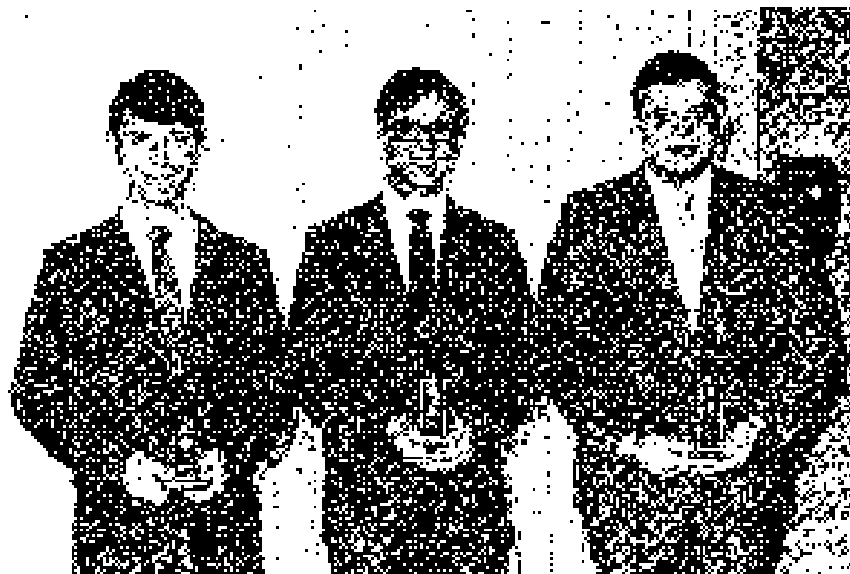

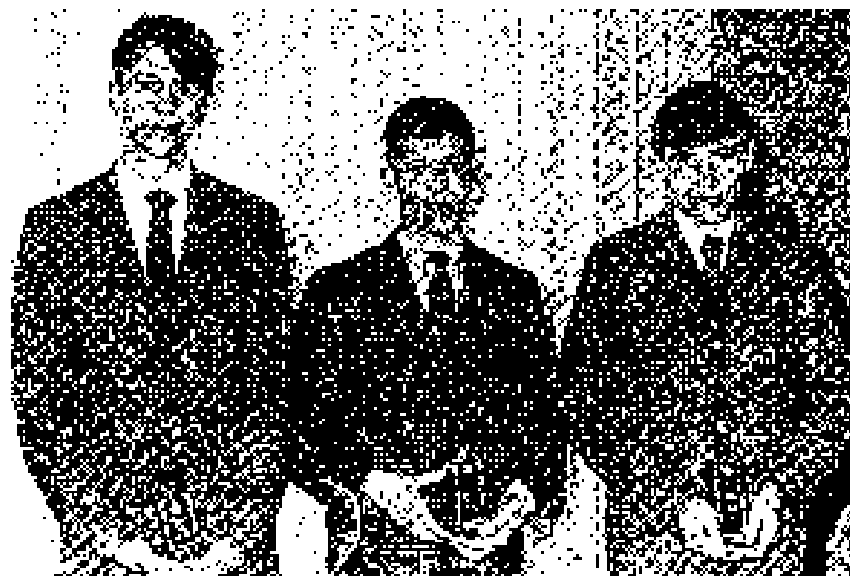

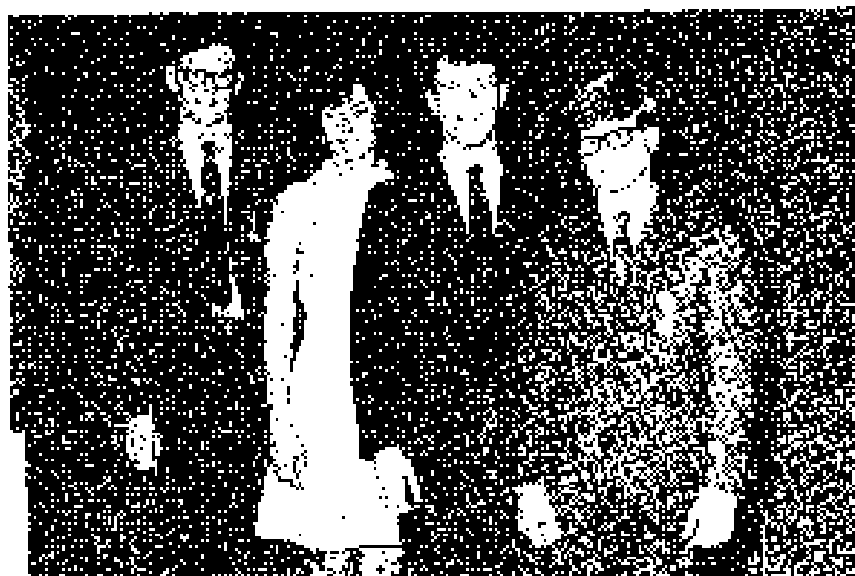

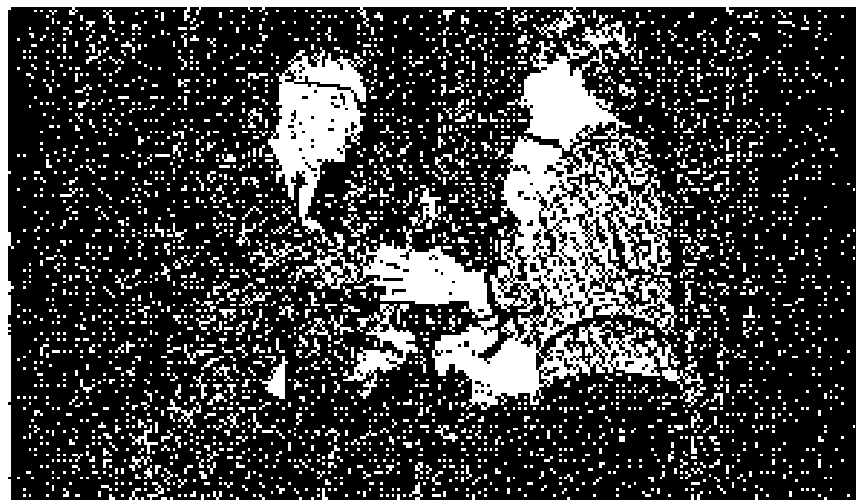
